Shelving, Furnishings Are Planned in Talent Library

Shelving and furnishings for the nearly-completed library annex in the remodelled Talent community hall was planned at a recent conference of Mayor and Mrs. J. F. Christian of Talent and Miss Helen Webster, Jackson county librarian.

Mrs. Alta Estes, Talent librarian, who arranged the meeting, was unable to be present. The new library room has a separate entrance from the street as well as an entrance from the community clubrooms. Windows above the shelving on the north side will provide the type of reading light preferred for libraries; a view window on the east wall looks out towards Grizzly Peak. Floors will be of marbled asphalt tile and the ceiling of the acoustical material used elsewhere in the building. Much of the actual work of

construction has been donated by Mayor Christian.

Immediate Shelving
Plans call for immediate installation of full-height shelving to occupy the north, and long, wall of the room, with additional shelving to be built later as it is needed.

Those interested in the library are seeking a desk for the librarian, equipped with drawers for the necessary files and records and supplies. Persons knowing where such a desk can be obtained are requested to notify either Mrs. Estes or Mayor Christian.

While the Jackson county library provides books and supplies to the community agencies, the community bears responsibility for housing, heating, lighting, and furnishing its own library.

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50 Teachers Sign Up For Art Workshop

Eagle Point — Fifty teachers from Eagle Point and surrounding areas have signed up for the Art Workshop scheduled for Oct. 2, 3 and 4 at the Eagle Point Elementary school, according to Glenn Hale, school superintendent.

A free educational service will be provided by Binney and Smith, Inc., manufacturers of Crayola and other art supplies. The workshop will be conducted by Miss Clio Heller.

About 15 hours of the teacher's own time will be devoted to learning more about modern art education and some of its tools and materials. The teachers will "do it themselves" by trying out the technique which Miss Heller has planned, Hale said.

Water colors, poster paints, colored chalks, modeling clay and crayons will be on the program. Teachers will also work with paper and paste to produce three-dimensional effects. All of the portions of the program will be adopted to the classroom teaching.
