Tax Statements to Be Mailed Soon, Schumacher Says

The annual mailing of property tax statements will begin in two or three weeks, County Assessor Ray Schumacher said today.

About 30,000 of the statements will be mailed to owners of property in Jackson county subject to taxation. Deadline for initial payment of taxes is Nov. 15, and Schumacher said it is planned to have all statements mailed out before the deadline. A discount of 3 per cent can be obtained by residents paying their taxes prior to the deadline.

Taxes can be paid either in a lump sum, for the entire year, or in four quarterly payments. In either case, the discount can be obtained for prompt payment. Penalties are imposed for payments more than three months late.

For the first time this year, the statements will be accompanied by a pamphlet in which is compiled material concerning all phases of property taxation, including the county's code areas, tax levies in mills, how taxes are determined, and so on.

Bus Service Set For School Pupils

Afternoon bus service from Medford High school, St. Mary's school, Hedrick Junior High and Roosevelt school will start Monday, Oct. 7, Evergreen Bus company officials said today.

The bus will leave Medford High at 3:05 p.m., St. Mary's at 3:08 p.m., Roosevelt school at 3:15 p.m., and Hedrick Junior High at 3:20 p.m., going east on East Main st. to White Oak drive and Acorn way. It will return to downtown on Black Oak rd., and Hillcrest ave.

Fare for the service will be the same as last year, officials said. They are \$1.25 for 10 tickets, or service will be operated for one month on an experimental basis to determine whether or not patronage will justify continuing the service, company officials said.

Results of a survey conducted by the bus company through the school system indicated that less than 40 tickets would be sold for a proposed morning and afternoon service at \$5 per month. The proposal was previously announced by the bus company. A minimum of 80 tickets would have been required for the other proposal, they said.

School Boards of County to Meet in Medford October 10

First Step in Two Changes in Board

Members of first class district school boards and the Jackson county rural board will meet in the cafeteria at Medford High school at 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 10, in the first step toward two major changes in operation of the rural school board.

The changes are authorized in the revised rural school law passed by the last legislature. It is the second bill which concerns schools. The other bill concerns reorganization of school districts.

The purpose of the meeting Oct. 10 will be to elect two temporary additional members-at-large to the rural board. There are at present five members on the rural board elected from zones in areas outside first class districts. The five first class districts are Ashland, Medford, Phoenix, Eagle Point and District 6C, which includes Central Point, Gold Hill and Sams Valley.

Law Explained

Also at the meeting, the new law will be explained and discussed.

The revised rural school law provides for two major changes in operation of the rural school board. They are:

1. Creation of a county-wide educational board to deal with all educational matters at the county level by including all area in the county in the rural district and adding two more members. At present, county educational matters are handled by several boards, the rural board, the non-high board, the boundary board, and in some counties a county high school board.

2. Provision for partial equalization of tax levies for school operational costs at the county level.

Appoint Superintendent

The county educational board will appoint the county superintendent, establish his salary and term of office. The first appointment will be made at the end of the present elective term, or when the office is vacated. The county board also will employ a professional staff for the superintendent's office.

The county board also will provide a county equalization fund on a uniform levy throughout the county which should amount to about 50 per cent of the estimated local school tax levies for operating purposes.

School officials said each district will determine its own budget, which will be approved by the district board, before it is submitted to the county board. Of the total budget, 50 per cent of it will be derived from a uniform levy throughout the county. Another 25 per cent of individual school district budgets will be derived from within the district, and the other 25 per cent from state funds.

Vote Own Levies

Each district will vote its own levies as first class districts now do. The existing tax base in first class districts is not affected, school officials pointed out. The county board will not have budget review as used under the present law.

The amount each district receives from the county equalization fund is certified directly to the assessor's office and becomes a tax offset against the district levy.

The county board will consist of seven members, five of which are elected from zones as determined by the boundary board and two elected at large. The term of office is three years. The two new board members elected at the Oct. 10 meeting will take office at the first board meeting.

Hoffa Backs Move To Purge Foes in Teamster Election

Lee, Hickey Absent On Candidate Slate

Miami Beach, Fla. — (AP) — James R. Hoffa, who apparently has the teamsters' presidential race in the bag, got behind a move today to dump candidates opposing him from their high posts in the union.

A slate of candidates for the various offices in the huge Teamsters Union was circulated at the convention. Conspicuously absent from the list were teamsters Vice Presidents William A. Lee and Thomas L. Hickey, who oppose Hoffa for the union's \$50,000 a year presidency.

"You are getting pretty hot," Hoffa told reporters when asked if the list conformed to his wishes.

Remember for Sacrifice

Guns and atomic weapons are not going to win this war or prevent it. Much more has to be done, and to explain why I say this, I am going to tell you as much as I was able to find out about what the Soviet Union is today.

I will begin by giving you my interview with Nikita S. Khrushchev, Chief of the Soviet Communist party. You may not agree with my conclusions, but I want to give you the basis for my thinking. So in these articles I will take you to see one thing after another that I saw. Then I will try to evaluate the price that is paid by the people of the Soviet Union for these things, and explain what they mean not only to the Soviet people but to the people of Asia, Africa, and South America as well.

On this understanding alone, I believe, can we have a policy which may save us from the war that the people of the Soviet Union feel cut off as much as we do. Felt Out Dead

Mrs. Roosevelt Finds Soviet Union Mass of Contradictions

New York — What is the Soviet Union really like? It is a mass of contradictions and it takes study and thought to understand it.

There is one symbol — the dove of peace — that you meet practically everywhere in Russia. I saw it painted on the side of a truck as I was riding through the streets; I looked down on it from the tower of Moscow university outlined in stone below me. A circus I attended ended with the release of a number of doves of peace. Everywhere this seems to be the symbol.

You might think that it was an effort to keep the people reminded of their need for peace. Heaven knows, they suffer enough in the war, and a traveler in Russia is soon aware of it.

But that is not why it is done. It is done to remind the people that they must sacrifice and work for peace because their great enemy, the United States, is trying to bring about a war.

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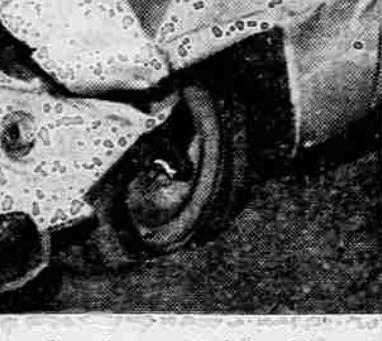
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Natwick Arrested For Second Time Within Two Days

Tommy Carlyle Natwick, 32, of 616 Palm st., was arrested by Medford city police last night for the second time in two days.

He was charged with driving while under the influence of liquor after the car he was driving collided with a pickup truck and later with a tree, police said.

Natwick, who was arrested Monday night on charges of disorderly conduct and failing to leave information at the scene of an accident, was again arrested by Patrolman H. Tomlin Furnas last night.

He was fined \$25 Tuesday for disorderly conduct and \$10 for failing to leave information at the scene of an accident. His Monday arrest came after his car hit two trees and he was later involved in a fight at the Yellow cab stand.

Natwick was charged with driving at a high rate of speed on Central ave. Tuesday night when he ran a red light at Jackson st. and struck a pickup truck driven by Floyd Edward Bubb, Paramo, Calif. Bubb said Natwick stopped only long enough to say he was going to move his car out of the lane of traffic, police said.

Natwick left the scene with water pouring from the broken radiator. Bubb told Officer Furnas, who was stopped while making a routine patrol on Central ave.

The Natwick car struck a tree in the alley. Natwick backed the car, which was on fire at the time, from the tree but before he could proceed Officer Furnas arrested him. The Medford fire department was called to extinguish the fire in the engine.

Police said his car was almost demolished after the two nights of accidents.

Driver Improvement School Cancelled Today

The scheduled session of the city's driver improvement school has been cancelled today evening, according to Police Capt. Clyde Fickler, instructor for the course.

The school will start again at a later date, Fickler said. A conflict in scheduling and an insufficient number of students were stated as the cause for the temporary suspension of the school.

Washington — (AP) — The deadlock between President Eisenhower and Arkansas Gov. Orval E. Faubus hardened today.

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Shortly afterwards, the governor said he was standing pat and that he had "given until it hurts."

The White House studied Faubus' latest statements but refused comment.

Earlier, the White House made public the President's "four guiding principles" on school integration and called on Faubus and "the good people of Arkansas" — and indirectly on the nation — to accept them.

They add up to: "Obey federal court orders" on integration. The wording of the principles made clear that Eisenhower intends to stand by his guns on the basic issue in the federal-state conflict: That the President must use federal force, when necessary, to enforce "final" court orders on desegregation in the face of local defiance or failures by local authorities to secure compliance.

Direct mediation efforts by a committee of four southern governors came to at least a temporary halt. Only one of them, Gov. Frank Clement of Tennessee, remained in Washington today. But he was not in contact with either the White House or Faubus.

However, the executive secretary of the Southern Governors Conference, Frank Bane, flew to Little Rock to confer with Faubus. Reports from the Arkansas capital said that Bane, who sat in on Tuesday's abortive White House compromise talks, would try to find a basis for reopening negotiations between the President and the governor.

Clement possibly was referring to Bane's mission when he said, without explanation, that "negotiations are continuing." At the same time, however, he cautioned against "false hopes" for a quick settlement.

If mediation efforts fail, Clement said, Eisenhower and Faubus should sit down together again as they did at Newport, R.I., and work out an agreement to insure that "our students are not reared in an atmosphere of loaded guns and bayonets."
