

Text Of Ike's Statement On Crisis At Little Rock

Washington—Text of the White House statement issued after President Eisenhower's meeting with the four Southern governors:

"The President today met with four members of the committee representing the Southern Governor's Conference. These members were Gov. Leroy Collins of Florida, Gov. Luther Hodges of North Carolina, Gov. Theodore McKeldin of Maryland and Gov. Frank Clement of Tennessee.

"At the meeting, the governors informed the President that the governor of Arkansas had authorized them to state that he is prepared to assume full responsibility for maintaining law and order in Little Rock and in connection therewith will not obstruct the orders of the federal courts.

"The President stated that upon a declaration on the part of the governor of Arkansas that he will not obstruct the orders of the federal courts, and will in connection therewith maintain law and order in Little Rock, the President will direct the secretary of defense to return the command of the Arkansas National Guard to the governor. Thereupon, as soon as practicable, all federal troops will be withdrawn."

Washington — Text of President Eisenhower's statement in reply to Gov. Orval E. Faubus of Arkansas:

The statement issued this evening by the governor of Arkansas does not constitute in my opinion the assurance that he intends to use his full powers as governor to prevent the obstruction of the orders of the United States District Court.

Under the circumstances the

President of the United States has no recourse at the present time except to maintain federal surveillance of the situation.

I want to commend the governors representing the Southern Governor's Conference for their cooperative attitude at the meeting today. I hope that they will continue their efforts, as will the federal government, to bring about a peaceful solution of the crisis at Little Rock and for the orderly carrying out of the orders of the district court.

Negro Students Enter School at Little Rock Without Troop Escort

Little Rock, Ark. — Nine Negro students entered Central High school without a troop escort this morning. They were greeted by jeers and catcalls from some 40 white students who had assembled on the school steps.

The Negroes, six girls and three boys, were driven to school as usual in an Army station wagon preceded and followed by Jeep-loads of National Guardsmen.

The students got out and walked unescorted across the campus. Instead of walking up the front steps, as on previous days, they veered and entered the building through a side entrance on the ground level.

A group of 40 to 45 white boys and girls stood on the steps awaiting their arrival. Such a group has been on the steps each morning since integration began.

As it became apparent that the Negro children would not walk up the steps through this crowd, some of the white youths shouted "chicken" and made jeering noises.

The Negroes entered the building without further incident.

Mrs. Lucius C. Bates, Arkansas president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said the Negro students had "a terrible day" at school Tuesday.

Mrs. Bates said that pencils, papers and pebbles were thrown at the children. She said the girls were shown knives and guns.

Athletic Coach's Car Kills Idaho Youngster

Parma, Idaho — A nine-year-old boy was killed Tuesday morning while waiting for a school bus when a car driven by a high school athletic coach struck him on Highway 20, about 15 miles from the Oregon-Idaho border.

Dead was Steven Blain Mangum, of Parma.

Driver of the auto, Coach James Nally of the high school at Nyssa, Ore., told Canyon county, Idaho, sheriff's deputies he had swerved, attempting to avoid other children on the highway, and struck the Mangum boy. Deputy Ed Hester said there were seven children waiting for the school bus.

Hester said the Mangum youngster was from a family of 12.

An inquest was to be held.

Senior Molalla Area Citizen Dies

Molalla — Ralph M. Holman, a senior citizen of the Molalla area and one of its leading residents, died Monday in a Portland hospital. Funeral services were held here today.

The 73-year-old son of pioneer parents was born in Portland in 1884 and was a graduate of the old Portland high school. He had operated a garage business here since 1920 and up to the time of his last illness.

Survivors include the widow, Birdie, and three sons, Dr. Charles N. Holman, Portland; Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman, Oregon City, and Paul B. Holman of Molalla.

Columbia River Highway Open To One-Way Traffic

Troutdale — The scenic Columbia River highway, closed by a slide Sunday, was reopened to one-way traffic just west of the upper Sandy river bridge late Tuesday.

Highway Commission Gets Combined Bid

Portland — The State Highway Commission, meeting in special session here Tuesday, accepted a combined bid for \$20,600,000 in highway construction bonds.

Successful bid was submitted by Bankers Trust Co. and Harris Trust and Savings Bank, both of New York. First National Bank of Portland and 61 associated banking houses. The bid carried an effective interest rate of 3.172 per cent. Two other bids were offered.

Proceeds from the bond sale will be split, \$12,600,000 for the coast highway in Curry county as ordered by the Legislature, and eight million dollars for matching funds in the federal highway program.

Russian Effort For Chinese Reds Beaten at Vienna

Vienna — The West beat off an attempt by the Soviet bloc today to railroad Red China into the world's first atom-for-peace organization in the role of observer.

The move to bring in the Red Chinese was made in a Communist Cerebralistic motion providing that any countries not yet members of the International Atomic Energy Agency could send observers to the present conference if they so desire.

The Communists Chinese were not mentioned by name in the motion, nor at any time during the debate that developed. But the purpose of the Czech motion was clear. It was to let the Red Chinese in with observers.

The Peiping government was ready to take immediate advantage of any such move, say there is a group of Chinese Reds here in Vienna in the guise of a "trade delegation."

But the West rallied in its forces against this obvious maneuver and defeated the Czech motion by a vote of 35 to 12, with one abstention.

Western delegates made no attempt to hide their indignation at the propaganda larded message from Soviet President Klement Voroshilov read at the opening meeting Tuesday.

Voroshilov reiterated the Kremlin's demand for a "no-strings" ban on nuclear bombs. The West insists that such a ban must be accompanied by proper safeguards.

Some delegates saw Voroshilov's message as a warning that the Russians may seek to hamstring the new organization by using it for propaganda tirades against the West.

Veterinarian Given Redmond Assignment

Salem — Dr. John Schmidt, Salem, has been transferred to Redmond to serve as district veterinarian for Deschutes, Jefferson, Crook, Klamath and Lake counties, the State Agriculture Department reported today.

Dr. Schmidt is the first of four veterinarians to receive a permanent assignment in a district of Oregon. Agriculture officials hope the district plan will reduce costs.

Under Dr. Schmidt's control will be meat inspection, reaction market disease control and brucellosis and tuberculosis eradication programs.

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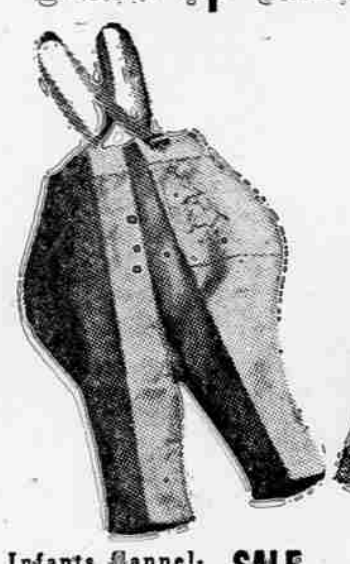

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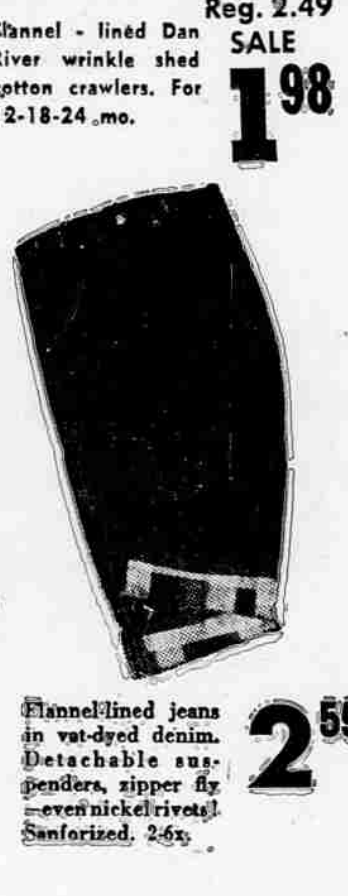
