

Troops To Stay, Ike Says

Step Necessary
Unless Governor
Changes Stand
Court Orders Must
Not Be Obstructed

Washington — President Eisenhower said today that federal troops will have to remain in Little Rock unless Gov. Orval E. Faubus changes his stand on school integration and gives satisfactory and unequivocal assurance that law and order will be maintained.

There also must be assurance, the President said, that federal court orders on integration are not obstructed.

Sees No Possibility
The President said that for the time being he sees no possibility of assuring continued attendance of Negro students at Little Rock's Central High School without keeping federal troops there.

He said he thought Faubus was mistaken in what he was doing. He said Faubus was committing a disservice to the city of Little Rock and the state of Arkansas.

Eisenhower expressed his views at his first news conference since the Little Rock crisis developed.

Deplores Use of Troops
He deplored having to send federal troops to Little Rock in the first place. He said the use of such tactics was not good for the locality, not good for the troops, and certainly not representative of America except in the most extreme cases where force was absolutely necessary to uphold the orders of a court.

To permit unchecked defiance of a court order, Eisenhower said, would be to invite chaos and anarchy.

He counseled a display of patience and tolerance on both sides of the integration issue. And he called on citizens to remember America as well as their own private prejudices.

At the outset of his conference, the President was told that the situation in Little Rock seemed to have reached an impasse. He was then asked what the prospects were for some sort of agreement with Faubus and what the next step would be.

Governors At Work
The President replied that several things could happen:

—The committee of four southern governors who conferred here with the President Tuesday, are naturally disappointed that they could not reach the desired agreement with Faubus. But these governors are not completely hopeless and are pursuing the purpose for which their committee was established by the Southern Governors Conference.

—Federal troops could be removed when Faubus supplies satisfactory and unequivocal assurances that the orders of the Federal District Court to open Central High school to Negroes will not be obstructed and law and order will be maintained.

—The factual, gradual development of a peaceful situation in Little Rock in which local police could maintain control.

Hoffbuhr Reviews Work in Talent Project at Meeting

Ashland — Contracts totaling about \$4,100,000 are expected to be awarded in the near future for work on the Talent project, Walter Hoffbuhr, secretary manager of the Talent Irrigation district, told the Ashland Chamber of Commerce this week.

The new contracts will bring to about \$9,000,000 the work scheduled in the \$22 million project to furnish additional water for irrigation of about 5,000 acres of land not now under irrigation. About \$5,000,000 in construction contracts have so far been awarded for work in the project, Hoffbuhr said.

Walk Out At Central High; Burn Negro Effigy

Little Rock, Ark. — About 50 white students walked out of Central High school today and burned an effigy figure of a Negro student in an organized demonstration against integration.

A heavily reinforced troop guard promptly broke up the demonstration, dispersed the small crowd, and erected blockades to seal off the street in front of the high school.

The demonstration fell far short of the "mass walkout" of hundreds of white students which segregationist groups, including the so-called Central High Mothers' League, had sought to organize.

The vast majority of the nearly 2,000 students enrolled at Central High were sitting quietly in classes. School officials had warned in advance that anyone participating in the walkout would automatically be expelled.

Paratroopers on Duty
The demonstration took place about 9:10 a.m., less than an hour after nine Negro students had been escorted into the school under the heaviest armed guard since the first day of integration last Wednesday.

An hour before school began, a detail of 120 paratroopers marched up to the building. It was the first time paratroopers had been on daytime sentry duty since National Guardsmen took over Tuesday.

Sixty of them, armed only with billy clubs, took up stations inside the school, where a force of eight National Guardsmen Wednesday was unable to prevent several minor racial incidents. The other 60 paratroopers, armed with carbines without bayonets, stood guard at entrances to the school.

White Students Jeer
The Negro students arrived in their usual convoy, riding in an Army station wagon with Jeeps behind them, and walked to the building through the shoulder to shoulder corridor of troops.

The steps of the school, which open out to a wide porch just at the entrance, were filled with white students watching the arrival. There was a lot of screaming from this crowd. Reporters heard some hoots and jeers. They also heard other white students clapping and cheering lustily for the arriving Negroes.

No one attempted to block their path or to molest the Negro children.

Faubus Willing To Negotiate Further
Little Rock, Ark. — Gov. Orval E. Faubus said today he is willing to negotiate further with President Eisenhower on the Little Rock school integration crisis but he will not agree to a "complete and unconditional surrender."

Faubus told a news conference that he would be glad to have further talks with Eisenhower "on a basis of mutual trust and self-respect."

A reporter asked him if he felt that such an attitude prevailed at this time.

Faubus retorted: "I do not." "I think they want me to do the same thing that Eisenhower did when he demanded complete and unconditional surrender of the Germans," he said.

Worst Blight Season In 15 Years Reported

The 1957 fruit season was the worst year for blight in 15 years, according to Clifford B. Cordy, county horticulture agent.

Although he reported that most growers had done a good job in getting blight out of their orchards, checks should still be made for spots that were previously overlooked.

Cordy said that the present rainy weather following the fruit harvest makes trees susceptible to blight. It is during this period that cankers may spread to the larger limbs, Cordy said.

He stressed that the trees should be checked carefully, especially the short stumps of previous cutting, in case of "short cuts," when the entire blight was not removed the first time.

"The trees should not be pruned and checked for blight by the same man," Cordy said. The jobs to be done thoroughly should be done by different persons, first cutting out blight and then pruning.

Blight dope should be used after each cutting to sponge the cuts and the cutting tool, the agent said. The dope, which is poisonous, is made by adding two tablets of mercuric chloride and two tablets mercuric cyanide to a pint of water. The solution must be kept in a glass container.

Cordy said that the blight was reported along the entire Pacific coast this year. He added that isolated trees should be checked for dead leaves by the home owners. All infected branches should be cut as far back as there is any brownish discoloration.

Medford Firm Low Bidder for Road Job
Salem — Bids on seven highway projects totaling \$2,300,000 were received by the State Highway Commission here today.

Contracts will be awarded by the commission in Portland Oct. 31.

Apparent low bidders included F. L. Somers, Medford, \$142,875 for grading of the Windy Gap section of Galice county road about 16 miles northwest of Grants Pass.

Dulles and Gromyko To Talk Disarmament
Washington — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will attempt to smoke out Soviet intentions on disarmament and the Middle East when he confers this week end with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko.

Administration officials said today the two topics head the list of world issues expected to come up at the Dulles-Gromyko meeting.

Trading Stamps Ruled No Violation by FTC
Washington — The Federal Trade Commission ruled today that trading stamps are not an unfair method of competition and do not violate any laws it enforces.

On the basis of the finding, it said, it is not issuing complaints "at this time" to prohibit use of the stamps.

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Hickey Withdraws To Support Lee In Teamster Race

Anti-Hoffa Forces Join for Derailment

Miami Beach, Fla. — One of James R. Hoffa's three opponents for the Teamsters Union presidency withdrew today and threw his support to another anti-Hoffa candidate.

Shortly after a wild demonstration around convention hall for Hoffa, Vice President Thomas L. Hickey of New York pulled out of the race and declared for William A. Lee of Chicago in a last-minute bid to derail the heavy favorite.

Seen Sure Winner
Hoffa appeared to be a sure winner in the race for the union's top job. Elections are scheduled later today.

Hickey said he had "several hundred" votes he expected to go to Lee, although Hoffa claimed that all his rivals could muster only about 200 of the convention's 1,900 votes.

Hickey announced his decision after a meeting with Lee and Thomas J. Haggerty of Chicago, now the only other candidate opposing Hoffa.

Defy AFL-CIO Orders
Hickey said support of Lee "offers the surest way of achieving victory for our joint objectives." Hickey said he and Lee wanted to restore the good name of the teamsters and keep the 1,400,000-member union within the AFL-CIO.

Election of Hoffa, both men claimed, would lead to expulsion of the truckers union from the parent federation.

Shouting, stomping supporters of Hoffa staged a big show of strength a few hours before the balloting.

The vote, which is expected to defy AFL-CIO clean-up orders by electing Hoffa, is expected this afternoon, but could be delayed by other convention business.

French Continue To Strike; Premier Eyed

Paris — Nearly two million more French workers went on strike today, lending new urgency to President Rene Coty's efforts to select a premier before economic chaos strengthens the "draftee de Gaulle" movement.

General Charles de Gaulle, wartime leader of the Free French who is regarded by many Frenchmen as their liberator, slipped into town from his Lorraine province retreat to keep in closer touch with the situation.

Coty was reported to be considering former premiers Guy Mollet and Rene Pleven, but before calling in any prospective premier Coty was seeing Jacques Soustelle, the 45-year-old Gaullist who helped bring down the government of Premier Maurice Bourgès-Maunoury.

High School Lawn Damaged by Vehicle
The lawn in front of Medford High school was damaged last night by an automobile, according to police reports.

Police said Earl Leroy Barnes, 2585 JoJack rd., told them this morning that a car drove on the lawn on the Monroe st. side and made two complete circles, shearing off a large shrub.

Police said the car drove several blocks before stopping to untangle dragging shrub from the front end. Police said a witness was questioned.

Asian Flu Confirmed At Chemawa School
Portland — The State Board of Health said here today it was an Asian virus that sickened some 300 students and staff members with a flu-like sickness at Chemawa Indian school near Salem.

The announcement was the first positively identifying the Asian flu virus in an Oregon outbreak of influenza.

Snow Falls in Oregon Mountain Passes; Possibility of Frost in Western Oregon

Snow fell in Cascade mountain passes Wednesday night. Three inches was reported at the McKenzie pass summit and two inches at Santiam pass with more falling. Snow also fell at Crater lake, Mt. Hood, and Wilamette pass. The north entrance to Crater Lake park from Highway 97 was closed temporarily.

At Hermiston, a total of 3.63 inches of rain fell between 11 a.m. Tuesday and 3 a.m. Wednesday.

It was the biggest downpour there in a 16-hour period since the U.S. experiment station began keeping records in 1911. Storm sewers were blocked, water was two feet deep in some sections and highway shoulders were damaged.

BRAVES EVEN WORLD SERIES ON 4-2 SCORE

New York — Manager Fred Haney today named Bob Buhl, hard-throwing right-hander, to pitch Saturday's third game of the World Series for the Milwaukee Braves while Casey Stengel countered with fireballer Bob Turley for the New York Yankees.

New York — The Milwaukee Braves parlayed their power hitting, New York fielding lapses and Lew Burdette's pitching into a 4-2 victory over the Yankees today, evening the 1957 World Series at one game each.

Burdette, 30, a right-hander who often has been accused of throwing a spitball, turned back his old teammates on seven hits as a crowd of 65,202 in Yankee Stadium saw the National league champions come back from Wednesday's 3-1 defeat.

Burdette and left fielder Wes Covington shared the heroes' roles for the Braves as centerfielder Mickey Mantle and rookie third baseman Tony Kubek were the goats for the Yankees.

Spectacular Catch by Covington
Covington, with a spectacular back-handed catch to save two runs in the second inning, came up with the key hit when the Braves broke a 2-2 tie with a two-run, fourth-inning rally.

Those two runs stood up the rest of the way.

A sign of the course of the game so far as the Yankees were concerned, came as early as the second inning when Hank Aaron lifted a deep, high fly to centerfield. Mantle back-pedaled as though he had the ball all the time, but it fell just beyond his outstretched glove and Aaron raced all the way to third base, credited with a triple.

The Braves made the break pay off when big Joe Adcock singled to right center to score Aaron. Compounding his felony, Mantle bobbled the ball long enough to allow Adcock to go to second. This time Mantle was charged with an error.
