

Asian Flu Epidemic Arrives in New York, Health Official Says

Outbreaks of Asian flu fever coincided with baseball fever in the World Series cities of New York and Milwaukee.
Dr. Roscoe Kandle, acting New York health commissioner, announced late Wednesday that more than 10,000 persons had applied to hospitals for treatment of respiratory ailments since last week end.
The Health Department said a doctor or nurse will be stationed immediately in all public schools to treat children who are stricken in classrooms. Parochial schools also will be staffed.
New York currently is host to

thousands of visitors for the first two games of the series between the Yankees and the Milwaukee Braves.
Fever Lasts 48 Hours
Kandle said the "long awaited epidemic of Asian flu has arrived" in New York and "large numbers of people are now being attacked by the Asian flu."
"The disease is behaving as was anticipated. It is mild, the fever lasting about 48 hours. Many who have been stricken have already recovered."
In Milwaukee, where the series moves after today's game in Yankee Stadium, Health Commissioner E. R. Krumbiegel said the baseball happy city is in the "throes of an Asian flu epidemic."

Krumbiegel said school absenteeism ranged from 60 to 157 per cent above normal because of the flu. He said the incidence of the disease among the adult population was more difficult to ascertain.

The health official estimated that about 20 per cent of Milwaukee's more than 600,000 population will contract the disease.

Cautions Against Alarm
The flu also made inroads in Chicago where more than 51,000 pupils were reported absent from schools Wednesday and 348 teachers were ill.

The outbreak began in suburban Oak Park, hitting more than 7,000 persons. Absenteeism also was high in several other suburbs, largely as a result of the flu.

However, one school principal added: "Don't forget World Series absenteeism!"

Chicago Board of Health President Herman Bundesen cautioned residents against becoming alarmed by the flu outbreak in the city since respiratory ailments normally are common at this time of year.

"Now it scares people because there's a new name—Asian flu," Bundesen said.

Cab Driver Convicted In Call Girl Racket

Portland — **Lawrence Leo, 34**, a cab driver, Wednesday was convicted of receiving the earnings of a prostitute by a jury which deliberated four hours after a trial which opened Monday.

Eight persons were indicted in connection with an alleged call girl ring and the two who preceded Leo to trial were acquitted. Five others still face trial.

Chief state witness was Stella Green, an admitted ex-prostitute who refused to testify at the first two trials, resulting in two jail terms totaling eight months for contempt of court. She testified without hesitation at the Leo trial.

Frightened Villagers See Volcanic Island Being Born at Sea

Angra Do Heroismo, Azores—A volcanic island was being born in the sea near here today to the accompaniment of violent explosions and the prayers of frightened people.

The island, shrouded in whitish yellow volcanic ash and sulphurous fumes, has risen about 120 feet above the sea and is nearly 1,000 feet in diameter. Each hour its size increases. The sea there is 40 fathoms deep.

Near Faial Island
The island is 70 miles west of Angra Do Heroismo and only a few hundred yards from Faial Island, whose 25,000 residents fear they will suffer the fate that befell Pompeii.

The birthpangs of the island started on Sept. 25 when severe earthquakes were registered near Faial. Two days later huge underwater explosions tore the surface of the sea, and some rocks and sand shot into the air.

Sgt. John Bradley, manager of the U. S. Air Force television and radio station at Lajes Air Base on Terceira Island, flew over the volcano and reported a towering pillar of white smoke jutting up to 1,700 feet from a black crater.

"As we got closer the air became saturated with the smell of hot sulphur," Bradley reported. "The water was very discolored and of a yellowish hue for two or three miles surrounding the phenomenon."

Villagers Evacuated
Last Sunday, when the volcano was first reaching the surface of the ocean, authorities evacuated 1,500 villagers from Capelos and another 1,000 from Norte, hamlets a few miles away.

In the streets of Horta, capital

of Faial at the opposite end of the seven by 11 mile island, people prayed in the streets. An image of the virgin of Fatima, patron saint of Portugal, was carried from a church in a procession from the threatened village of Capelos.

Sufficient Quantity Of Ore Found in IV

Cave Junction—A body of nickel ore in sufficient quantity and quality for mining on an extensive scale has been found in the Illinois valley, according to a report from Simard and Knight, engineering firm of Toronto, Canada, in charge of nickel exploration here.

A progress report furnished to stockholders of New Delhi, the parent company for Nickel Corporation of America, states that the ore body can be profitably worked with present methods and costs.

Trench work is not yet completed on Eight Dollar mountain, and existing excavations will be deepened in further exploration.

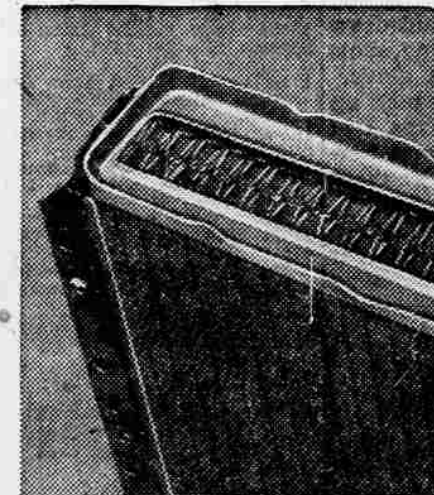
