

Italians' Method of Handling Beverages Useful Information

New York—Because Italians are among the heaviest consumers of alcohol (in wine) in the world, it will surprise no one to learn that the average Italian thinks milk is only for babies.

But because Italians also have one of the lowest rates of alcoholism in the world, their ways of handling beverages could be useful information for countries where alcoholism is a problem—such as the United States.

Dr. Giorgio Lilli of Yale University and Dr. Pierpalo Luzzatto-Fegiz of the Doxa Institute,

Milan, Italy, are engaged in a scientific gathering of that information. Their newest finding—on questioning 1,453 representative Italians—concerns Italians and milk.

Milk Use Declines
“More than 85 per cent of the sample had been breast fed in infancy, and could discuss this experience with few or no adult inhibitions,” they reported. “The subjects continued to use milk amounts from early childhood to adolescence and early adulthood. At the same time, there was presumably a parallel decrease in the emotional attachments to milk which expressed the psychological needs of the individual.”

Among “the major factors” which have prevented “alcoholic excesses and alcohol addiction” in Italy, the scientists thought

“the appreciation of milk especially pertinent” because “milk is the first food to which the newborn child is exposed, a food which supplies not only physical nourishment but the protection and the security of a mother’s love.”

“It provides the child with mixed or blended or confused pleasures of body and mind. Most of the healthy, fundamental emotions which lead to adequate growth and social adjustment of the individual are linked with the experiences involving the use of milk by the infant, and to the resultant relationships between mother and child,” they said.

Whereas the average Italian thinks milk is for babies and wine, with meals, is for adults, “The attitudes and actions of an alcoholic are strikingly different,” they said. “To a certain extent, alcohol represents to the alcoholic what milk represents to the infant. Alcohol gives to the adult alcoholic a combination of physiological and psychological satisfactions which, in many ways, seem comparable to the gratifications supplied by milk to the infant.”

In the final stages of alcoholism, they added, “The alcoholic seems to be restlessly searching for alcohol in the same way the newborn infant searches for milk. This confusion is obviously uncommon among Italians, for the incidence of alcoholism among these people—notwithstanding their large use of wine

—is very low.”

Alcoholism Rate High
They pointed out that the alcoholism rate is high in countries where adult milk consumption is high. Nevertheless, “any notion that it is this use of milk which primarily determines the rate of alcoholism would be absurd and totally without foundation. It would be equally absurd however, to hope that alcoholism might be alleviated or prevented by such simple devices as increased consumption of milk by adults. Only identification of the underlying causes of alcoholism and their alleviation can be effective in this problem of mental health.”
