Serviceman Slain By Estranged Wife

Denver, Colo. — The estranged wife of an Air Force sergeant flagged down her husband's car, got in and shot him to death Thursday night at Lowry Air Base.

The alleged slayer, Mrs. Norah Anette Lloyd, 26, was arrested shortly afterward and held at the air base.

Authorities said Mrs. Lloyd arrived Thursday by plane from Chicago and went to the apartment of her husband, S. Sgt. John Lloyd Jr. He was not there. Mrs. Lloyd left their three-month-old child with a neighbor and went to the air base where she spotted Lloyd's car, stopped it and got in.

Moments later, authorities said, the car swerved off the road and crashed into a fence. Mrs. Lloyd emerged uninjured. Lloyd had been fatally shot. The FBI immediately entered the case since the shooting occurred on government property and a civilian was involved.

Son of Oregonians Killed in Jet Crash

Elgin Air Force Base, Fla. — Air Force officials today identified two test pilots killed Thursday when an F100F jet fighter exploded in flight near here.

Maj. John W. Farrow, 32, of headquarters, Tactical Air Command at Langley Air Force Base, Va., and Capt. Gerald King, 29, of Eglin, died in the explosion.

The plane crashed in the woods nine miles north of Niceville, Fla., but cause of the explosion was not immediately known.
