County Study By League Announced

A "Know Your County" study concerning Jackson county government structure and administration has been undertaken by the Medford League of Women Voters, according to a decision made at last Saturday's general meeting of the League.

The project's aim is to "gather readable, factual and helpful information so that the average citizen or student can find his way around in Jackson county government," Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter, co-chairman for the study, reported.

It is planned that the two-year survey will provide knowledge which will make citizens "feel comfortable in knowing the functions and services of each county department," she said.

Preliminary steps in the "Know Your County" survey began with interviews with the county court and with Mrs. Beret Hopkins, county clerk. All expressed their wholehearted support of the program and plan to help provide information for the study.

The decision to undertake the project followed a study of the need for more understanding of county government, Mrs. Carpenter declared. Leagues throughout the United States work on similar studies, using the non-partisan, objective approach of the organization.

Numerous suggestions concerning a need for such an objective record of Jackson county government have been made to

the League. Mrs. Carpenter said that there is a noticeable shortage of county government information.

Because the Medford library is not set up to care for the expensive and specialized field of documents, there are no archives available there.

The first section of the study, related to the historical background and the economic and geographic aspects of this area, is to be compiled this fall.

Later sections will include the

county in relation to the state constitution, its political organization, electoral process and other material.

League members expect to make the information available for use in schools and other agencies, as well as in League study units.
