Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Oregon conference has awarded a \$250 scholarship to Rachelle Ann Dawson, it was announced at the last meeting of the executive committee in Portland. She plans to be a dietitian and has entered Oregon State college for this training.

A renewal of a similar scholarship was made to Evelyn Crowe who entered Portland State college this fall for her senior year in elementary education. The two scholarships are awarded annually to students of minority races and are supported by local Woman's societies throughout the state.

Two County Women Given Altrusa Vocational Grants

Two Jackson county women have been awarded vocational scholarship grants to complete their teacher education training. It was announced this week by Mrs. Enid Rankin, president of Medford Altrusa club. The club has sponsored such grants for four years, awarding them to older women in need of retraining themselves for employment after some years away from the business world.

Mrs. Mildred Marshall, Rogue River, a senior at Southern Oregon college was given a "Founders fund grant" of \$250 from the vocational aid committee of the Altrusa International at the request of the local club's vocational committee, head by Mrs. Maisie Daly. This grant will enable Mrs. Marshall to complete the next year's studies to obtain her bachelor of arts degree and her teaching certificate.

Mrs. Helen Little, Central Point, was awarded the local vocational grant for 1957, covering tuition for the summer and fall terms at SOC where she is studying to prepare herself for teaching. Both these women had one year of college before their marriage and had planned to teach.

Mrs. Marshall, a widow, has raised seven children and has one son in high school. Mrs. Little has three teen age children to help support.

Six Jackson county women have been given vocational grants to refrain themselves for employment since 1954 when the first \$250 grant was offered by Medford Altrusa club. The funds to support this project have been earned by publishing yearly an Altrusa place mat, which has on it a recreational map of Jackson county with the business addresses of more than 100 interested local firms. This mat is a gift to tourists, and is also given away, 10,000 copies each year, to county organizations, churches, granges and clubs to use at large dinners or in any other way desired.

Mrs. Finley states that the new mats printed locally, will be off the press early next week. Altrusa club, a classified service club for business executives and professional women, points out that the firms who have sponsored this place mat during the last four years, have made it possible for six older women to retrain themselves for teaching, nursing and business. Because of the local interest, three women have received "Founders" fund grants from the international office of Altrusa, amounting to \$750, in addition to the local fund.

Other national projects of Altrusa are the grants-in-aid given to Latin American women and Asian women who are doing graduate work in American Universities and colleges.

An international dinner with foreign foods will be held by Medford Altrusa club, Thursday, October 10 at Mon Desir at 7 p.m. This will be first of two meetings this month with a United Nations and international relation program.

Guest of the international relations committee will be Miss Margareta Larsson-Aulin, exchange student from Sweden living this year with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bash, Medford. Mrs. Julie Tummers, co-chairman of the committee is in charge of the two programs this month. The student will talk informally on the customs of her own country and will learn about the life of business and professional women and their service clubs in this country.

Mrs. Tummers will be assisted by her committee, Mrs. Virginia Sherwood, Miss Ruth Kilbourn and Mrs. Francis Schuchard. Hostesses are Mrs. Edith Baker and Mrs. Edna Mole.

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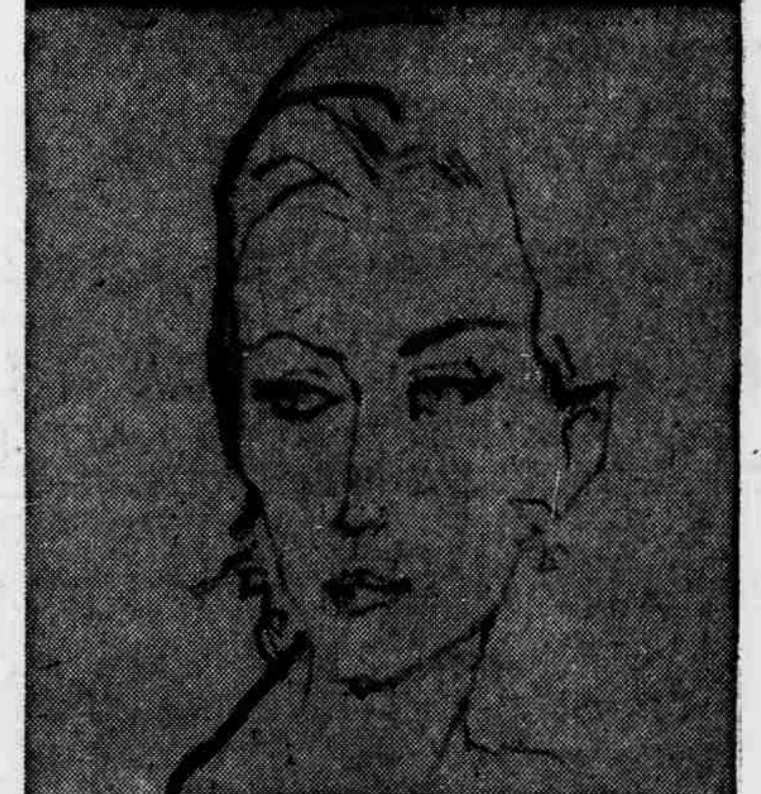
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
