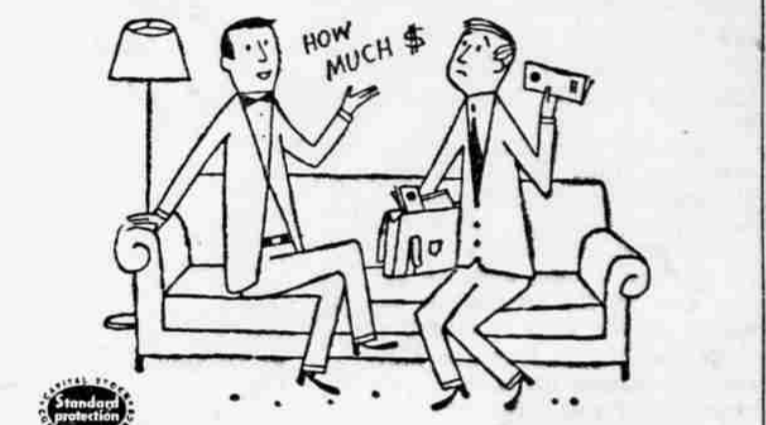

Also to be asked of Congress was \$360,000 for an 18-mile stretch of road from Deadwood to Keno for the 1959 proposed budget, Keating said. Also meeting with the joint committees was Congressman Charles O. Porter.
