The meeting was previously scheduled for this week and was postponed due to illness.

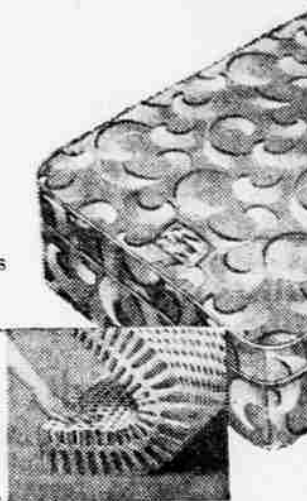
