New Upper Applegate Hall Dedicated By Official

Approximately 250 visiting grangers, members, and friends from Jackson and Josephine counties and distant points heard State Grange Master Elmer McClure on Sunday afternoon dedicate the new Upper Applegate Grange hall. The speaker pointed out that whatever the grange undertakes inevitably benefits all. Reminding his hearers that government begins on the community level, he dedicated the building to the solving of new community problems as they arise.

"The Grange has a record of ninety-two years of service to the nation, and there is no method to evaluate all of the good accomplished," the speaker asserted. "We are writing history for the future," he continued, emphasizing that the Grange as an organization, must be flexible to meet the challenges of the present day.

Accompanying the State Master to the dedication were his wife, and state home Economics Chairman Pearl Dental. The three were en route to California to attend sessions of the California State Grange in Paso Robles.

Presenting a history of Upper Applegate Grange under the title, "A Backward Look," Christine Harr told of its organization in a little log schoolhouse on Beaver Creek in October 1935, with 45 charter members. "The log cabin is typically an American institution," she said, "and so in true pioneer fashion, the grangers built their first hall with logs, with each member being assessed 12 uprights, 2 joists, and 2 rafters." members in the actual construction in which the women also participated.

Declaring that the Grange is an institution which transcends buildings and physical properties, she described its paramount work as "the conscientious, intelligent study of current issues which affect mankind, and the taking of appropriate action for the benefit and betterment of all. She concluded with the reading of the same poem, "THE BUILDERS," which she gave at the first dedication 19 years ago.

Thirteen of the original 5 charter members were present at the ceremonies, as were also the first two couples whose weddings occurred in the old hall. Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Ritchey, and Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Williams, all of Medford.

Two hand-made gavels, the work of Robert E. Cook of Gold Hill, were presented on behalf of Gold Hill Grange for the use of Upper Applegate Grange in its meetings.

Distinguished guests present in addition to the State Master and his party included State Steward Roscoe Roberts of Roxy Ann Grange, Jackson County Pomona Master Robert Bitterling of Eagle Point, and subordinate grange masters Joe Smith of Redwood Grange in Grants Pass; Hal Bishop, Gold Hill; Dee Hendrickson, Phoenix; Velda Mang, Central Point; Frank Malan, Bellevue; Al Sims, Roxy Ann; and Caroline Harding, Upper Rogue. All were accompanied by delegations of their members.

The afternoon concluded with the serving of refreshments, and a social hour.

Other heavily traded issues included Boeing Airplane, General Dynamics and General Tire.

Portlander Slays Wife, Takes Own Life After Quarrel

Portland — (UP)—A man shot his wife to death in front of her two terrified daughters and then fatally wounded himself after a domestic quarrel Sunday night, police reported.

Dead were Myra Conner Graham, 59, and his wife of less than a year, Matilda Graham, 49. Mrs. Graham was dead on arrival at a hospital and Graham died about three hours after the shooting.

Jeanne Lisenbury, 16, and Barbara Lisenbury, 14, daughters of Mrs. Graham by a previous marriage, told police they ran screaming from the house after Graham shot their mother. One of the girls was scratched by flying glass as Graham fired a shot through the door glass after them, police said.

Berated Wife

The girls said Graham had berated his wife for reportedly going to a tavern Sunday afternoon and because he was not satisfied with the evening meal she had prepared.

Graham was a section gang foreman for the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroad. Police records showed he was sentenced in 1945 from Clark county, Wash., to a life term in the Washington state prison on a morals charge. He later was paroled.

State Prison Farm Escapees Captured

Springfield, Ore. — (UP)—Two escapees from the state prison farm at Salem were apprehended by a Springfield policeman in a residential area here early Sunday after they had "walked away" from the farm Saturday morning.

Patrolman Robert Miller said he spotted the pair Norman George Smith, 20, Springfield, and Lawrence Lee Reeves, 19, about 2:32 a.m. They offered no resistance.

Smith is serving two years for forgery from Lane county, and Reeves two years for burglary from Linn county.

Five Youths Killed As Car Misses Curve

Waukegan, Ill. — (UP)—Five Chicago teen-agers were killed and a sixth critically injured when their souped-up car left the road on a curve, plowed through a row of mail boxes and crashed into a tree.

Police said the car, a 1937 model with a four-barreled carburetor, shot off Johnsons Road 20 miles west of here Sunday while travelling at about 100 miles per hour.
