#### NOTE TO PARENTS

Chicago — Two pediatricians who have spent 15 years studying 2,600 children Friday told parents to stop worrying about thumb-sucking. Drs. Alfred and Howard Traisman, a father-son team, said at the American Academy of Pediatrics meeting that "parents have been unduly alarmed . . . and should be reassured about the harmlessness of the habit." About 75 per cent of all babies suck their thumbs simply because they get pleasure out of it, the doctors said. It does not cause "overbite" or other dental disorders, they said.

## Is That So?

By establishing a fairly regular eating and sleeping schedule, about six people out of ten can rouse themselves from sleep at any desired hour of the night.

Expectation or anxiety quickens one's ability to wake quickly or at a specified moment. A mother will waken at the first whimper of an infant. A soldier will waken at the stealthy approach of an enemy. A fireman will leap from bed at the first tinkle of an alarm. A nurse can doze off and wake at regular intervals to administer medicine. And a child will wake long before dawn on Christmas day. Father will have no difficulty awakening on the day he goes fishing.

In contrast, unpleasantness may have exactly the opposite effect. Just try to wake up without an alarm clock for an early dental appointment. In fact, psychiatrists state that people who tend to oversleep consistently may be unhappy in some major part of their lives. A change of jobs, they add, may make an eager beaver out of a hibernating bear.

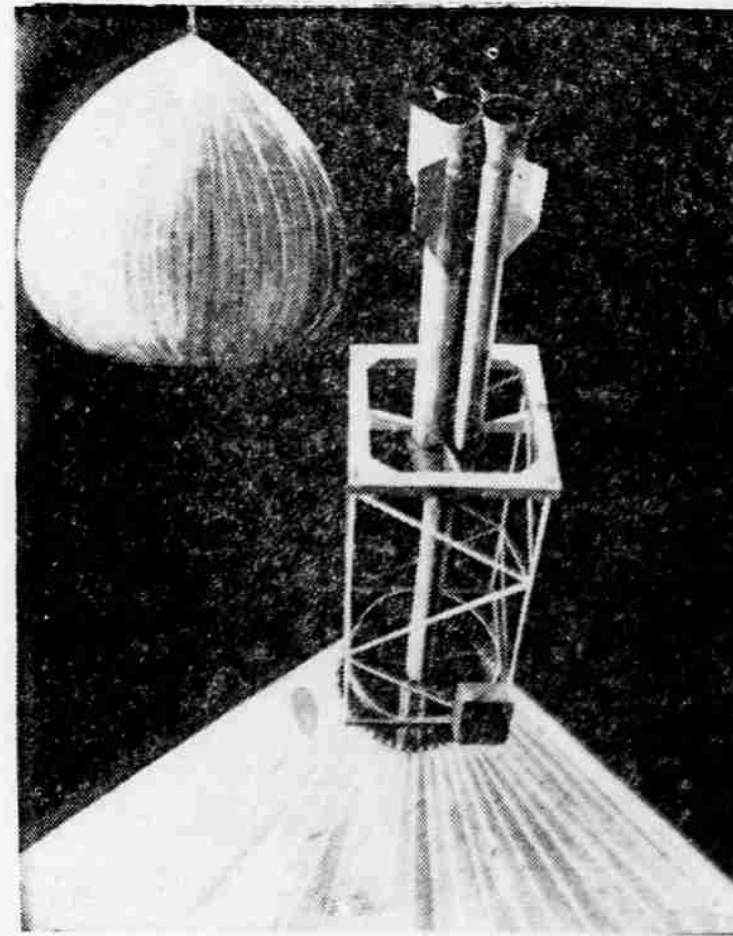
Awakening, states Professor Albert E. Conway, of Lafayette college, always comes in a three-stop sequence regardless of its cause. There is the initial awakening—when an internal or external alarm goes off; next there is a relapse when either the mind or the body snatches at sleep again; and finally re-awakening, the acceptance of the waking state. With some, these steps may be very close together—with others decidedly prolonged.

**Strain on Heart**  
However, leaping out of bed and hurrying to a cold shower, is not good—unless the motto is: "A short life and a merry one!" Doctors state this places a tremendous strain on the heart. The approved method is to lie quietly for a few moments, yawn deeply, stretch the limbs, then roll to the side of the bed and sit up—all in slow motion. Just as you would see a wild animal rouse itself naturally. Then the body is ready to start another 16-hour stretch. How best to induce mental

wakefulness in the morning? For early birds, often the best thing to do is to leave the shades up all night so the sun may stream in and waken them in the morning. For others, it is best to flip up the shade the first thing the alarm goes off—flooding the room with the sun's brightness. On dull, cloudy days an electric light tends to arouse mental awakening. As a last resort, cutting down on food the night before will help slug-a-beds tear themselves away from the blankets—hunger pains and the idea of breakfast can be powerful goads to lash one to life.

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
