First Commercial Air Trip Completed To Antarctic Region

McMurdo Sound, Antarctica — The Pan American clipper America landed today at McMurdo Sound, completing the

first commercial aircraft flight to Antarctica. Capt. Ralph Savory, veteran of 23 years of arctic flying, lifted the 73-ton Pan American Strato-clipper from the Christchurch runway at 10:25 a.m. (12:25 p.m. PST) Monday and set his course for McMurdo Sound.

Ambassadors on Flight
Passengers on the 2,400-mile history-making flight included U.S. Ambassador to New Zealand Francis H. Russell; New Zealand Labor Minister J. K. McAlpine, and 36 U.S. Navy officers and men assigned to Geophysical Year scientific stations.

The crew had two pretty stewardesses, reputedly the first women ever to reach such a southerly point on the "white continent" as the Ross Island Navy Station on McMurdo Sound.

They were dark-haired Patricia Hepin-stal, 25, former model for I. Magnin, San Francisco, and a native of Houston, Tex., and blonde Ruth Kelly, 28, former school teacher from Holyoke, Colo., who resembles Princess Grace.

To Judge Beard Contest

Both are based in San Francisco and are probably the most thrilled members of the plane's complement. They were to ride in an American versus New Zealand dog sled race and judge a beard-growing contest among the men at McMurdo.

Seabees and other Navy specialists had a last fling with card games and steaks 21,000 feet in the sky. In a few more hours they would spread to seven scientific stations for 18-month tours of duty on the blizzard-beaten continent.

Wall Street Sees Good, Short Rally From Present Level

New York — Wall Street, which has been unwilling recently to make short-term predictions, reversed itself today and said (figuratively) that is:

"The market should stage a good rally from this level."

The rally, the market experts said, could go on for a week, a month or three months. They didn't look for a long one, however, because many will want to sell stocks when they can get out even or with a little profit on the way up.

One thing that is certain as the trading starts the specialists' books are cleaned out.

Thin Market for Stocks
With no buy orders or sell orders listed around the market level the chances are there will be wide swings that reflect a thin market for stocks, the brokers explain.

Last week's market brought some interesting comparisons with the period following President Eisenhower's heart attack.

Friday with sales at 4,460,000 shares was the biggest since Sept. 27, 1955, the second day of the heart attack market.

2. Last week with sales volume of 15,575,710 shares was the biggest since the week ending Sept. 30, 1955.

3. The market met support Friday at 434.15 in the Dow Jones industrial average. That was less than a point above the 433.19 (intraday) where it met support after the heart attack.

The latter came on Oct. 11, 1955, and has not been touched since.

Those figures came into the record picture because the market went down on active trading and they may have no more significance than that.

Not a few of the brokers believe that there will be a new decline later, and some think the 43.15 of last week will be violated.

Stock Market Recovery Goes To Third Session

New York — The recovery movement in the stock market went into its third session today with the industrials scoring their best rise since Sept. 12 and started last Friday.

The rise started last Friday, too late to recoup all the wide losses of the day, gathered a bit more push Monday—the first Monday advance since July 8—and seemed to be much more buoyant today.

This recovery movement got its start when the U. S. successfully launched a Thor missile and knocked some edge off the Russian satellite propaganda Friday. The missile makers, most of them aircraft companies, spurred them and they have been rising since.

Turks Learn To Live With Soviet Threats, Russell Jones Declares

Editor's note: UP correspondent Russell Jones has arrived in Turkey, target of Russia's latest propaganda campaign in the Middle East. This is his first dispatch.

Ankara, Turkey — Soviet threats are a fact of life every Turk learns to live with.

Communist Party Boss Nikita Khrushchev's recent rocket-rattling remarks received less attention here than they did in the United States.

And the news of the dispatch of Egyptian troops to Syria drew from Turkish Defense Minister Shemi Ergin the calm statement that Turkey had followed Syrian

developments "step by step" and will take all precautions to defend the frontier.

"Any aggressive action will be broken into pieces by Turkey's strong army," he said. "To busy oneself with Turkey is to play with fire."

Country in Face-Lift

The press and public here are far more interested in the upcoming elections Oct. 27 and in Premier Adnan Menderes' construction program. Russians — whether imperial or Communist — have been threatening Turkey throughout history, but it isn't every day a country gets a face-lifting.

Hignite Held for K. F. Grand Jury

Klamath Falls — Baxter Hignite, 27, was bound over to a grand jury here Monday on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of a middle-aged Merrill, Or., couple Saturday.

Hignite, charged with the death of Mr. and Mrs. James Flaugh at their home, waived preliminary hearings in Klamath county district court and was held without bail.

Sheriff Dal Reed said Hignite had visited the Flaugh home, where his estranged wife and 2-two-year old daughter were living, and demanded to take the child with him. The Flaugh's refused, and he allegedly shot them.

New Era Entered, Neuberger Says

The Dalles — Launching of the Russian earth satellite has "thrust civilization across the frontier of a new era in which use and conservation of every energy resource assumes added importance." Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) told a luncheon meeting of business and civic leaders here today.

"The new moon that whirled about the earth heralds a future in which energy, and the ability to marshal it, may mean the difference between national survival or deterioration," the senator said.

Neuberger said the amount of energy required to boost the Soviet satellite into its space orbit was "enormous," and that we must expand and accelerate our own progress for opening energy sources.

He stressed the abundance of falling water in the Pacific Northwest and urged a hastening of "our efforts for development of new power sources."

Attorney Sentenced on Income Tax Conviction

Portland — Leroy L. Lomax, Portland attorney, Monday received a six-month sentence on a conviction of failure to file federal income tax returns for 1953 and 1954.

While all sources say the only military activity in South Turkey is the regular autumn maneuvers, it doesn't mean the Turks wouldn't like an excuse to teach the Syrians a lesson.

The Turks have contempt for the Syrians and figure they could take Damascus in 24 hours—exactly the time Khrushchev said Turkey would last against Russia.

Restraints imposed by NATO and the Baghdad Pact make any Turkish move highly unlikely, but observers believe Syrian attempts to harass the Turkish border will be met by the strongest local action.
