

UCLA Expects Battle When Meeting OSC

Los Angeles — UCLA expects to meet the toughest opponent on its schedule Saturday when the Bruins play Oregon State in the Memorial Coliseum, says Coach Henry Red Sanders.

The Bruin coach told the Southern California Football Writers association Monday that Tommy Prothro's team is far better than the one that went to the Rose Bowl last year.

"About the only weakness our scouts found in the Oregon State squad was in its third team," Sanders said. "I would place them fourth or fifth in the nation."

Prothro, who was Sanders' chief assistant at one time, has formed his team in the same mold as UCLA's single wing, reducing chances that either squad will spring many surprises.

However, Sanders said, "Even if we know what to expect it's a case of what can we do about it."

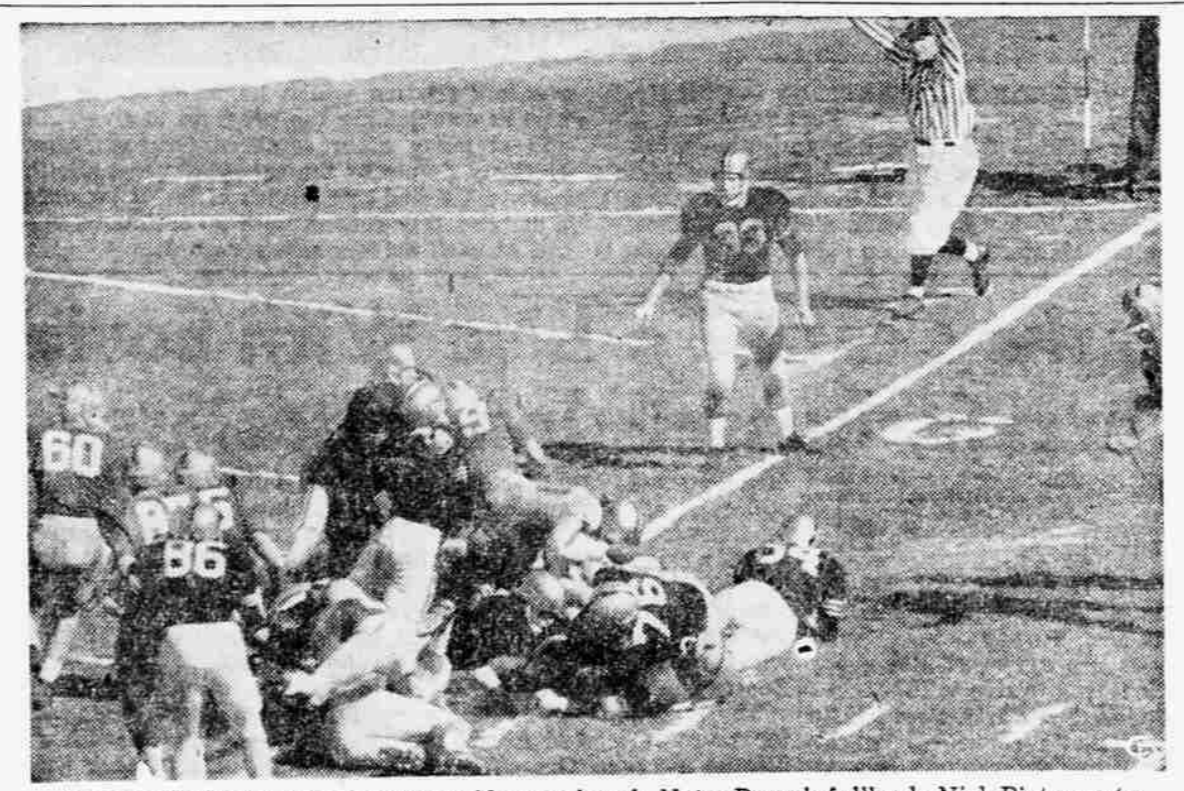
Crater of the Southern Oregon circuit and Illinois Valley of the Rogue loop have a non-counter skirmish at Cave Junction on Friday.

Medford's role of favorite against the Pels hinges on the physical status of its squad. Three players who normally see quite a bit of duty missed the Crater game because of illness and several others who played were not up to par physically.

The underdog Klamath club will be fired by the desire to keep up its jinx against the Black Tornado. Not since 1945 when the score was 51 to 0 for Medford, has the Tornado defeated the Pelicans on Modoc field in Klamath Falls. Since that time Klamath on its home turf has recorded three wins over Medford, 21 to 6 in 1949, 13 to 12 in 1951 and 26 to 18 in 1953. Two games have been tied, 0 to 0 in 1947 and 13 to 13 in 1955.

"We have reached a fluid situation where several solutions to the problem have been suggested," said Bowers. "We are continuing on an optimistic basis."

After a five-hour session Monday, representatives of the Guild and the tracks appeared to be bending a bit in their offers and demands.

"We have explored various and several solutions to the problems," said Bowers. "I gather from our conversations so far that we are not wasting our time. We discussed several alternatives to some of the propositions."

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MS Spartans Top Oklahoma In Weekly Gridiron Rates; OSC, Duke Exchange Places

New York — Michigan State, rolling up better than 500 yards a game, grabbed the number one spot today in the weekly college football ratings of the United Press Board of Coaches.

Notre Dame and Arkansas, two unbeaten who turned in last-quarter upsets over sectional powerhouses last week, crashed the top 10 ratings by 35 leading coaches.

Michigan State displaced Oklahoma as the national leader for only the second time in two years. The Spartans, who won the 1952 national championship, rolled to a 35-6 win over a Michigan team good enough to rate No. 5 last week. Meanwhile, Oklahoma won its 43rd straight game with a 21-7 triumph over Texas but had their hands full.

The coaches gave Michigan State 321 of a possible 350 points, based on 10 points for a first-place ballot, nine for second place, etc. Oklahoma dropped to 308 points and second place.

Eighteen coaches rated Michigan State No. 1 while Oklahoma drew only 12 votes for the rating. Minnesota drew two first-place ballots and Iowa, Duke and Arkansas had one each.

Notre Dame, a 23-21 winner over Army in the renewal of their colorful rivalry, jumped from an 11th place tie to eighth place. Arkansas, a 20-17 victor over Baylor, advanced from 13th to 9th place. Michigan and Army dropped out of the top 10.

Behind Oklahoma, shooting for its third straight national title, came Minnesota up one notch from last week. That dropped Texas A&M to fourth place. Iowa leaped from ninth to fifth. Duke was sixth and Oregon State seventh, switching their positions of last week. Auburn again was ranked 10th.

Coach Says Morris Good

Eugene — Coach Len Casanova told members of the Oregon Club Monday that fullback Jack Morris is the man who "makes our offense go."

Casanova said that the senior fullback from Medford "did the finest job of blocking against San Jose State that I have ever seen."

Morris, besides his blocking, also has a 5.6 yard per try average in 21 carries and is the second leading scorer with 17 points.

The University of Oregon Webfoots continued to work on their plans for next Saturday's meeting with the explosive Washington State Cougars.

Scout Jerry Frei told Webfoot coach Len Casanova Monday that it would take "near-perfect defensive effort by Oregon to contain the Cougars next weekend."

Man O' War Voted Into National Racing Shrine

Saratoga Springs, N.Y. — Man O' War, regarded by most experts as the greatest thoroughbred who ever lived, today was enshrined in the National Museum of Racing along with nine other champions of the 1910-1930 era.

"Winner of 20 of his 21 races, 'Big Red' was the unanimous choice of a national committee of sportswriters for racing's shrine along with Equipoise and Exterminator, two of the greatest weight carriers of all time."

Rain Extra Fight Fan In Honolulu

Honolulu — Two thousand rain-drenched fight fans watched former Philippine flyweight champion Danny Kid win a split decision over Billy Peacock of Los Angeles Monday night in a 10-round battle at Honolulu stadium.

Peacock, the ninth ranked bantam, came in at 119½ to Kid's 118½. On the strength of the victory, the 2-1 underdog gained serious consideration for a title shot.
