Thornton said there was some question as to the constitutionality of the statute authorizing the pension, but said it was "not the prerogative of this office to make such a declaration unless such law clearly and unquestionably conflicts with the constitution in a manner that reasonable minds would not differ on the question."

Weather Interferes With Rocket Testing At Eniwetok Atoll

Washington — The Air Force admitted today that it has failed in four attempts to launch rockets which it hoped would reach a record altitude of 1,000 to 4,000 miles above the Pacific.

The Air Force said the failures were due "primarily" to unfavorable weather, and that there had been no malfunctions in the rockets themselves.

The project, known as "Far-side," is being conducted on Eniwetok atoll in the Pacific. The plan called for a rocket to be lifted to a height of 100,000 feet on a platform carried by a huge balloon. Then, under the plans, the rocket was to be fired to an altitude of more than 1,000 miles.

Adverse Temperatures
The Air Force said that in four launching attempts made since last month, extremely low temperatures found at high altitudes "have had adverse effects on the balloon, with the result that the rockets have not been properly positioned to achieve the desired results."
