

Black Tornado Posts 33-14 Win Over Klamath Pels

Medford, GP Favored in Title Quest

Medford high's football whirlwind smashed the Modoc field hex to smithereens on Friday night—And how!

A devastating blast of single wing might carried the Black Tornado to a crushing 33 to 14 triumph over the Klamath Union High school gridders, ending the 12-year long jinx Pelican teams have had on Medford aggregations on Modoc turf. It was the first victory at Klamath for Medford in six conflicts since 1945.

Medford's convincing verdict turned the Southern Oregon conference campaign into a two-way fight between the Tornado and the Cavemen of Grants Pass. The GP club overpowered Ashland 41 to 6 at Ashland on Friday. Results gave Medford and Grants Pass each two wins against no defeats in the league and District 6 A-1.

Rip-slashing play of the line-men and hard running and charging by the backs were the elements of the Tornado's sharp moving offense. Rock 'em, sock 'em defense held the Pels to minus yardage in the first half.

Reaching pay soil each of the first three opportunities it had to go on the offensive, Medford bombarded to a 20 to 0 halftime and touchdown twice more before Klamath picked up its pair of counters in the concluding quarter.

Halfback Gerry Lyons romped 28 yards for the first Medford yards for the second and Half-TD. Fullback Bob Gee drove six back Skip Bennett swooped six yards on a bootleg for the third. In the second half Gee smacked the middle for five yards and a TD after the 43-yard ramble by Halfback Ron Reich had set up the scoring play. Halfback Johnny Jones capped the Tornado touchdown-making with a three-yard slant.

Tackle Mike Murray kicked three extra points.

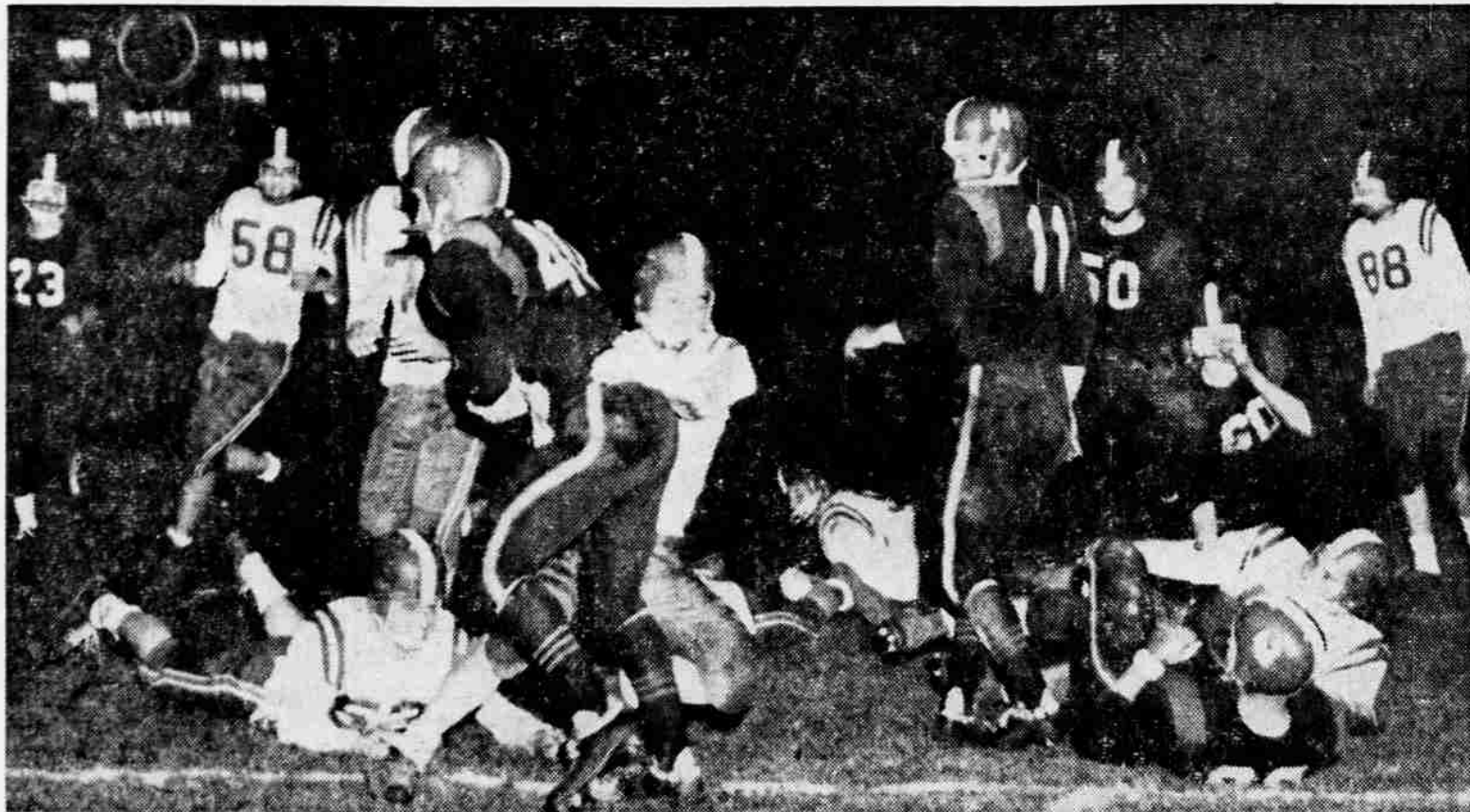
A pair of quarterback alternates, in the backfield at the same time, combined for the 17-yard shot that was Klamath's first score. Frank Ballard chucked to Tom Ankeny. The same combination clicked for a nine-yard pass and the second touchdown after a 25-yard run by Halfback Doug Van Buskirk on a statue of liberty play put the ball within striking distance of the goal. End Bill Santo booted both conversions.

KF Has Deficit

The Tornado's battering ground attack rolled up 201 yards in the first half. Meanwhile with such stalwarts as Tom Morris, Dick Corum, Gary Winetrout, Jim Funston, Tom Hamlin and Tom Merton repulsed Pel ball carriers and throwers with such murderous effectiveness that Klamath Falls was held to minus one yard from scrimmage.

Klamath advanced the ball for a total of 28 yards, 19 on one pass but Tornado defenders threw the Pelicans for losses totalling 39.

Medford had 344 yards and 14 first downs for the last evening while Klamath recorded 94 and seven. The Tornado gained 41 of its yards on completion of two of six aerials. Klamath's passing was a constant threat. The

Pels made 71 of their yards in the air completing six of 24 throws. Two other tosses picked up 15 yards apiece on penalties when Tornado players were charged with pass interference. Jim Funston, Jim Corum and Ron Reich each intercepted KUHS passes for Medford.

Halfback Reich started the first TD march when he ran the opening kick-off back 32 yards to the Medford 47. Lyons made 15 yards in two packs. Gee gained four and Lyons went six to the 28 to set up his scoring jaunt. He went over left guard and cut right to spring loose to the goal.

Drive From Midfield
Opening the second drive, Jones returned a Bob Drake punt 10 yards to midfield. The end zone was reached in nine plays. Longest gains were 11 and nine yards by Reich. For the final six the overpowering Medford line shoved forward and Gee went up the middle.

For a second panel TD Medford went 88 yards in 15 plays, set back at one spot by a 15-yard clipping infraction. Reich broke loose for 24 yards on a counter play and Jones had a pair of 11-yard gains. For the final yards, Medford's blocking backs swept to the left and Bennett slipped over the right side of the line.

Medford got the sphere on its 32 in the third stanza and a procedure penalty put it back on the 26. Five plays later the Tornado was into the KF end zone. Quarterback Tony Brauner kept and gained 11 yards. Gee made seven and Jones five to the Klamath 48. Then Reich took a pitch and went around the flank. A key block by Gee opened the way and Reich got to the five-yard stripe. Gee tallied from there.

A 53-yard surge collected the fifth touchdown. The ground was covered in six plays with a pass, Brauner to Reich, eating up 36 yards. Jones' poke for the last three yards was on fourth down.

Motion and clipping penalties and an eight-yard loss put the Tornado back on its 10 in the last quarter. Brauner's punt was

McLoughlin Thumps KF Grid Eleven

McLoughlin Junior high ninth grade, despite 24 players on the sick list, including six first stringers, rolled over Klamath Falls 46 to 14 in a football engagement here Friday.

The Bulldogs got a two touchdown jump in the first quarter when Dennis Bauman scored on a 12-yard end run and Phil Humphreys passed to Bob Quinney for a touchdown. Al Funston ran an extra point.

In the second canto John Fontaine blocked a Klamath punt. Bauman tallied on a 38 yard run and Funston again ran the point.

Another blocked punt by Phil Baird got the Bulldogs deep in KF territory. McLoughlin lost the ball but Jim Sever got it back with a pass interception and Mike Hood ran 20 yards for a touchdown. Dick Ragsdale sneaked the extra point for a 27 to 0 halfway standing.

In the third quarter Jerry Winetrout stole a KF pass and ran 40 yards to the 12-yard line. Ragsdale scored from there on a 12 yard run and then got another TD in the panel with a short sneak.

Klamath crossed the goal on 80 and 30-yard runs in the 4th period and Hood scooted 88 yards to a McLoughlin touchdown on a kick-off return. Bill Charley packed over on the conversion.

Coach John Reed juggled his line-up much because of the inroads of sickness on the squad. Charley, regularly a fullback, was used at guard and performed capably. Others doing well on the line were Chuck Holt, and defensive ends Richard Connolly and Humphreys. Funston turned in a fine game at line-backer.

Dragsters Contend In SOTA-UMC Races

Two of the valleys hot rod clubs will be out to beat each other by seeing who has the fastest "dragster" today when Southern Oregon Timing association conducts the last racing state of the year with all proceeds going for charity.

During the last few months the two clubs have been constructing the racing machines as joint club projects and today will mark the first time that both have appeared on the local strip. One is owned by the "Road Knights" of Ashland and was not completed until the regular season was over.

Club members are hoping that the sleek little machine will reward them well for all the work and effort that went into its construction.

Has Hit 112
The other dragster was built last summer by the "Swiftens", a hot rod club here in Medford, and although didn't perform up to expectations in the championship drags last month did quite well in the Northern California championships by walking off with the top awards of the meet.

To date the top time recorded by this machine has been 112 miles per hour but club members have indicated that this record will be broken today if no unforeseen difficulties are encountered.

Hot competition is expected between the two entries with club honors being at stake. All proceeds from the days activities are tagged for the United Medford Crusade and the Ashland-Talent United Fund. Originally the program had been scheduled for last Sunday. However rain forced cancellation of activities until today.

Trials at 10 a.m.
Trophies will be given in all classes under rules of the National Hot Rod association (NHRA) and a top eliminator award will be presented to the days outstanding car. Time trials open at 10 a.m. with eliminations set for the afternoon.

The races will be held at the SOTA strip in West Camp White seven miles north of Medford on the Crater Lake highway. Signs will be posted from the "Y" in North Medford to the strip. Spectators are invited to come out and watch the activities, according to association officials.

The Medford Junior Chamber of Commerce will operate the concession stand and assist the timing association in the operation of the charity benefit program today.
