Satellite Exploited, Army Secretary Says

Yorktown, Va. — Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker accused Nikita S. Khrushchev Saturday of exploiting the Russian satellite in a propaganda "scare campaign" aimed at intimidating the free world.

In a speech prepared for delivery at dedication of the Yorktown Battle monument, Brucker said Russia's Communist party boss "has already threatened Turkey and is trying to bully our allies by his claims of military might."

The Army Secretary praised Secretary of State John Foster Dulles "for his forthright challenge to such outrageous conduct."

"Secretary Dulles has the support of every right-thinking American when he warns Khrushchev that America doesn't scare easily, and that the United States intends to stand with its allies in seeing to it that the Kremlin keeps the peace," Brucker said.

War Incitement Charged Russians

Washington — Sen. Mike Mansfield said Saturday that Russia's "absolutely untrue" charges of a U.S. plot against Syria constitute "an incitement on the part of the Soviet Union to a possible World War III."

The Montana Democrat said he is "appalled and shocked at the deliberate prevarications" issued Friday in Moscow. He was particularly incensed by a Soviet charge that the Senate had refused to investigate U.S.-Syrian policy and actions.

"This is a dastardly attack upon the integrity and the honor of the Senate," said Mansfield, who is his party's assistant leader in that body and one of its most influential foreign policy spokesmen.

"If there were or are any 'criminal preparations for the unleashing of war against Syria' they cannot be attached to either the Senate or the Government of the United States," Mansfield said.

Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev has asserted that John Foster Dulles sent Deputy Undersecretary Loy Henderson to the middle East to create friction.

The purpose of Henderson's trip, Mansfield said "was not to incite aggression of war but rather to use all possible means to keep that area at peace."
