PTA Committee To Study Program of High School

Appointment of a committee to study the high school educational programs offered in Jackson county schools, and in schools in communities of comparable size, was directed by members of the Jackson County Council of Parent-Teacher associations at a meeting in the Medford YMCA October 16, states Mrs. Owen Kunkel, council president.

The request for the committee came as an outgrowth of a school evaluation program conducted during the past few months in the Ashland school system by administrators and interested parents. Council members expressed the feeling that the alarming number of "drop outs" among high school age students—approximately one-third between sophomore and senior years in this area—might be alleviated by a broader technical program in addition to the outstanding academic program and limited vocational program offered by the high schools in our county.

Chairman of the committee will be Mrs. Leigh Gustison, school education chairman of the council, and committee members will be representative of the several areas of the county. The committee will attempt to evaluate the extent of the need for a wider vocational program, and to determine how other communities of comparable size have met similar needs.

Mrs. H. S. Morris, hospitality chairman, and Mrs. Thomas Eaton, first vice-president, led a discussion group on the value of the room representatives in a local PTA unit. Mrs. E. J. Lindstrom, membership chairman, Mrs. Lewis Dusenberry, magazine chairman, and Mrs. John Benson, publicity chairman, took the theme of "Teamwork" for their discussion group.
