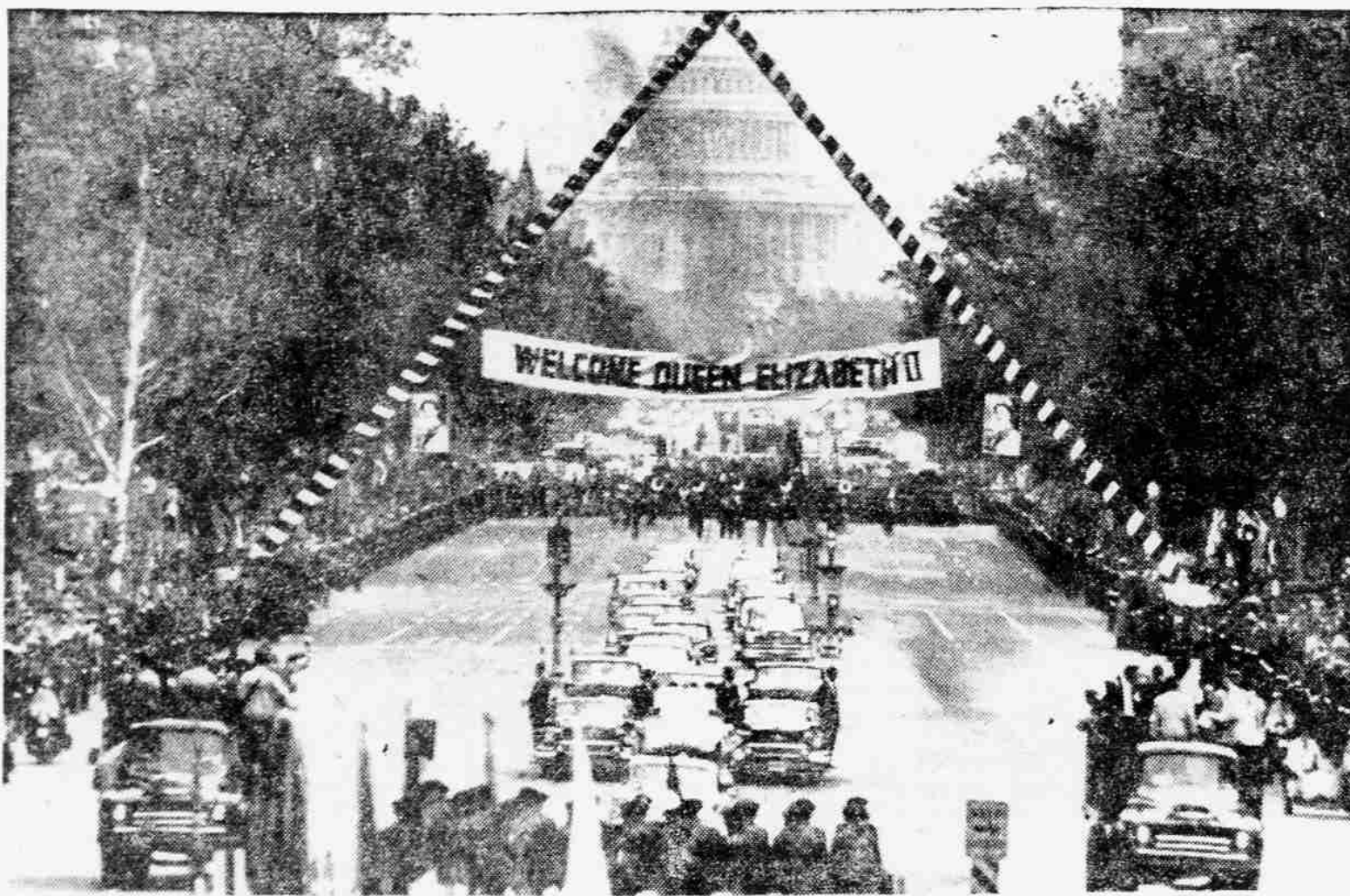
Anyway, that's Courand's theory, ladies.

Eastern Oregon Trees Described in Booklet

How to identify the trees in Eastern Oregon woods is told in simple terms in an illustrated folder, "Western Pine Region Timber," just published by the Western Pine association. Ten major softwood trees of the region are described. Closeup drawings of trunk, crown, bark, twig and seed cone help make it easy to tell them apart. Trees covered are Ponderosa pine, Sugar pine, Douglas fir, White fir, Engelmann spruce, Idaho white pine, Lodgepole pine, larch, Incense cedar and Red cedar.

The folder also reports state by state statistics on the region's timber supply, forest land acreage, lumber production and other phases of the economy based on the timber resource.

Copies of the free folder can be obtained from the Western Pine association, Yeon Building, Portland 4, Oregon.
