Portland—The fire that destroyed the main mill of the Linnton Lumber Co. at Linnton was believed caused by defective wiring, the fire marshal's office here said today.

Fire Investigator Bob Young said damage was estimated at \$200,000. The three-alarm blaze originated in the central part of the mill building.

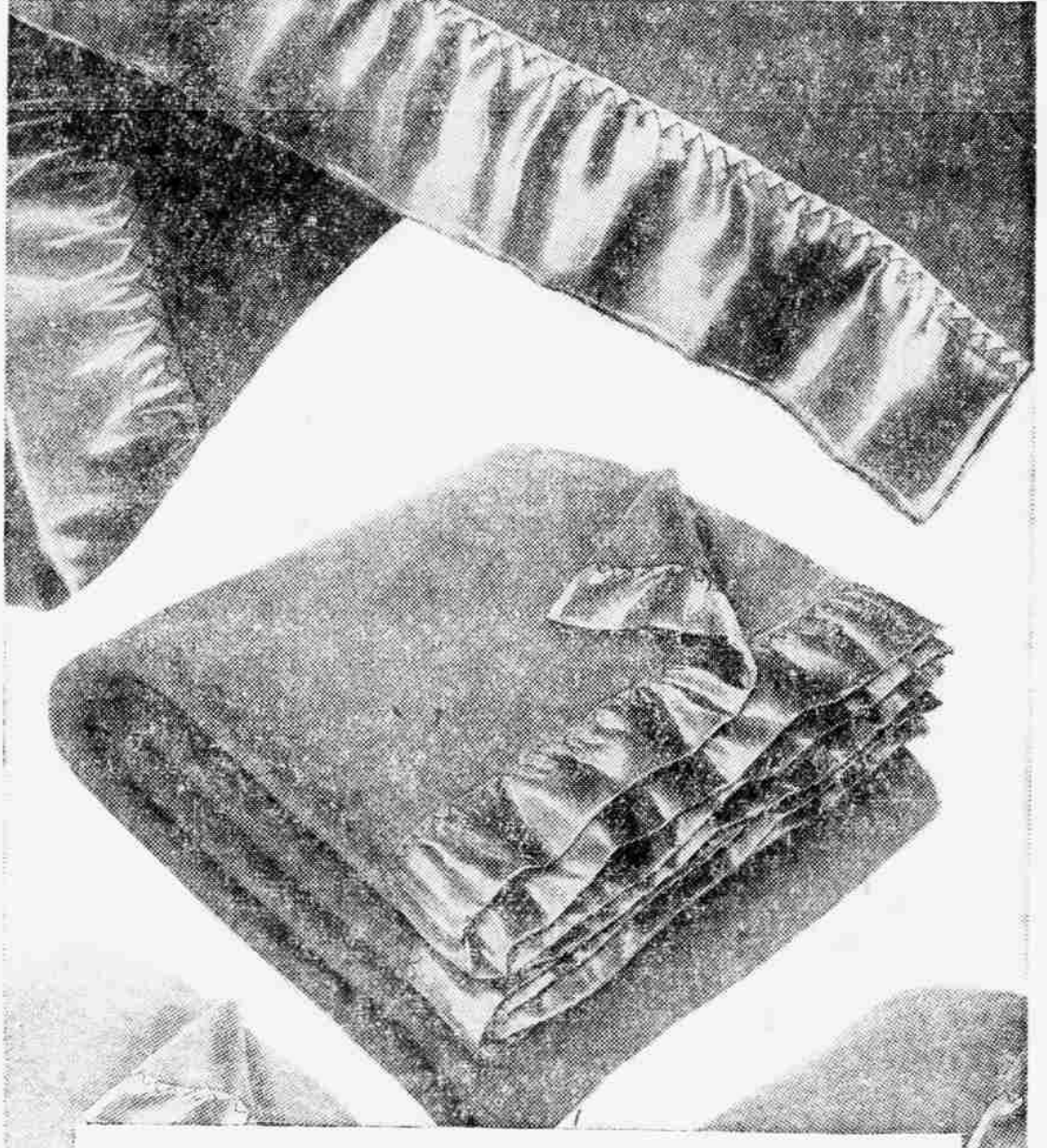
