

# 1st Place Deadlocks In Both Divisions of Pro Football Circuit

Brilliant Sunday performances by Bobby Layne, Howard Casady, Sunny Jorgensen, Y. A. Tittle and Charley Conerly produced first-place ties in both divisions of the National Football League.

The Lions set up a three-way tie for first in the Western division by rallying from a 27-3 deficit to edge the Baltimore Colts at Detroit, 31-27. Layne climaxed Detroit's 28-point second half spree with a 29-yard touchdown pass to Casady with only 50 seconds to play.

Three-Way Tie  
Taking advantage of Baltimore's first defeat, the San Francisco Forty-Niners tied the Colts and Lions for the Western lead as Tittle fired two touchdowns passes and scored himself in a 24-14 victory over Green Bay Packers. The three leaders had 3-1 records.

Jurgensen, a rookie quarterback from Duke replaced the injured Bobby Thomson and helped the Philadelphia Eagles pull the day's biggest upset. He threw a touchdown pass and plunged for another as Philadelphia downed the Cleveland Browns, the only other previously unbeaten club, 17-7. The Eagles had lost 14 straight games, including exhibitions, and took a 24-7 whipping at Cleveland last week.

Conerly threw two touchdowns passes to Bob Schmeckel as the New York Giants, defending league champions, shut out the Pittsburgh Steelers, 35-0. The Giants, playing like titheholders for the first time this season, boosted their record to 3-1 and tied Cleveland for the Eastern lead.

Gallimore Scores Four  
Individual stars also sparked the other two games. Willie Gallimore's four touchdowns helped the Chicago Bears—defending Western division champions—score their first 1957 victory, a 34-26 triumph over the Los Angeles Rams. Lamar McHan threw three touchdown passes and scored on a plunge to lead the Chicago Cardinals to a 44-14 victory over the Washington Redskins.

John Unitas threw two touchdowns passes to Jim Mutscheller and two to Lonny Moore to give Baltimore a 27-3 lead in the third quarter. Tobin Rote then raised the hopes of 55,764 Detroit rooters with a 14-yard scoring pass to Steve Junker.

Cassidy, enjoying the biggest day of his two-year pro career, caught a 26-yard touchdown pass from Layne to open the fourth period. Detroit scored twice in the last 90 seconds. Cassidy caught a 25-yarder from Layne to set up John Henry Johnson's one yard plunge and caught the game winner after Yale Lary recovered Moore's fumble on the Colt 29.

Cassidy's Game  
"It was Cassidy's ball game," said Coach George Wilson of the Lions. "It was the greatest finish I've seen in pro football."

Jurgensen completed a 46-yard scoring pass to Rocky Ryan and plunged a yard to score after Chuck Bednarik

came up with one of four interceptions the Eagles registered. Jim Brown scored on a one-yard plunge late in the game for Cleveland, which had allowed only 22 points in its first three games.

Frank Gifford's 18-yard pass to Kyle Rote, Jim Patton's 50-yard run with an intercepted pass and Bob Clatterbuck's 27-yard pass to Ken MacAfee produced New York's other three touchdowns at Yankee stadium.

"New York definitely is the best team we've played and probably is the best in the league," said Coach Buddy Parker of the Steelers.

Tittle threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to Billy Wilson, a 12-yarder to Clyde Connor and scored himself on a plunge against Green Bay at Milwaukee.

Gallimore, a rookie from Florida A&M, scored on dashes of 18, 46, 16 and one yard for the Bears at Chicago. Norm Van Brocklin completed a 66-yard scoring pass to Jon Arnett and scored on a plunge for the Rams.

Ward finished two seconds ahead of Bryan with Jud Larson, Hickman Mills, Mo., third.

Ward set a new track record of 1 hour, 5 minutes and 57.58 seconds for the 100 miles on the mile-long dirt oval. He also set a track record with a qualifying time of 99.36 miles an hour.

Bryan's show moved him into first place in the national championship picture. He went ahead of Jim Rathman, Miami, Fla., who did not place, with 1450 points to 1390. George Amick, Venice, Calif., was third nationally.

The Sacramento race was the next to the last of the 12 races which determine the national championship. The final event is scheduled for Phoenix, Ariz.

Eugene — A noisy, happy reception for Oregon's victorious Webfoots was dampened Sunday with the announcement that blocking and line-backing co-captain Norm Chapman, who suffered a dislocated ankle early in the game with Washington State Saturday, will probably be lost for the rest of the season.

Coach Len Casanova said he thought the Ducks did a good job of keeping defensive action tight against WSC. Oregon kicked the Cougars 14-13 at Pullman, Wash., to stay atop the Pacific Coast Conference heap.

Casanova said sophomore Bob Peterson will undoubtedly replace Chapman on the first squad.

New York — Lightweight contenders Paolo Rosi and Johnny Busso meet at Madison Square Garden next Friday night in a TV-Radio 10-rounder that features this week's boxing schedule.

Rosi, formerly of Italy but now living in New York, is favored at 8-5 over Busso because of his punch. Rosi is rated fifth among 135-pound contenders; Busso, ninth.

Rosi, 28, has a 26-4-1 record that includes 11 knockouts. Twenty-three-year-old Busso's 20-5-1 list includes 14 kayos. Their bout will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC.

Boyd Scraps  
Wednesday's TV fight brings together middleweight contender Bobby Boyd of Chicago and Franz Szuzina of Germany at the Syracuse, N.Y., Auditorium. Boyd, ranked ninth, is favored at 9-5. His 45-7-2 record includes 22 knockouts. Szuzina, unranked, also registered 22 kayos in his 41-16-13 career. Their 10-rounder will be televised by ABC.

In an excellent non-televised fight, welterweight contenders Gaspar Ortega of Mexico and Kid Gavilan of Cuba will meet in a 12-rounder at Wrigley Field, Los Angeles, Tuesday night. Ortega is ranked seventh; ex-champion Gavilan, eighth.

Also Tuesday night Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach, third-ranked heavyweight contender, meets Dick Richardson of England at Harringay Arena, London, in an international 10-rounder.

## College Gridiron Powers Have Back-Yard Loop Tilts

The nation's college grid powers—the few still unscathed and the walking wounded from Saturday's waves of upsets—plunged into "back-yard" conference play Saturday as the season passes the halfway point.

The highly attractive schedule is featured by key games in the Big 10, Atlantic Coast, Southwest and Ivy leagues.

The seasons most spectacular successions of upsets claimed no fewer than four of the country's top 10 teams Saturday as Purdue whipped first ranked Michigan State, 20-13. Illinois beat third-ranked Minnesota, 34-13. UCLA defeated seventh-ranked Oregon State, 26-7, and Texas stunned ninth-ranked Arkansas, 17-0. Second-ranked Oklahoma, meanwhile, romped over Kansas, 47-0, for No. 44 in a row in a strong bid to reclaim the top ranking.

Need To Bounce Back  
Both Michigan State and Minnesota face the necessity of bouncing back next Saturday against formidable Big 10 opponents. Michigan State 2-1 in the conference plays Illinois, 1-1, and Minnesota, 2-1, faces Michigan, 1-1. Iowa and Ohio State, tied for the conference lead with 2-0 records, play Northwestern, 0-2, and Wisconsin, 1-1, respectively.

The big one in the Atlantic Coast conference will pit sixth-ranked Duke against North Carolina State in a game that probably will decide the title. The Blue Devils romped over Wake Forest, 34-7, Saturday while N. C. State played a scoreless tie with Miami, Fla., Friday night. Duke is 4-0 and N. C. State 3-0 in conference competition.

In the Southwest conference, fourth-ranked Texas A&M, 1-0, plays Baylor, 0-1, in what could be the key game. Baylor can scramble the picture by winning because Texas A&M, 7-0 victor over TCU Saturday, is currently tied with Rice and Texas, who play each other next week end.

Eugene — The University of Oregon Webfoots, unbeaten and standing in first place in the Pacific Coast Conference, today was warned of new strength in its opponent for next Saturday.

The Ducks meet California at Eugene this week following its skinny 14-13 win over Washington State Saturday at Pullman.

The victory put the Ducks in first place in the conference standings and carried them a vital stride closer to the Rose Bowl, a never-never land for Oregon teams since 1917.

They earned the win by throwing a blanket-like defense against Washington State's vaunted passing attack. The Ducks in turn used passes at crucial points to keep control of the ball most of the game.

## Beavers Eye Husky Fray

Corvallis — A humiliated Oregon State squad drilled with new determination for its game with the University of Washington next Saturday. Over-confidence was blamed here for the Beavers' humiliating 26-7 defeat at the hands of UCLA Saturday.

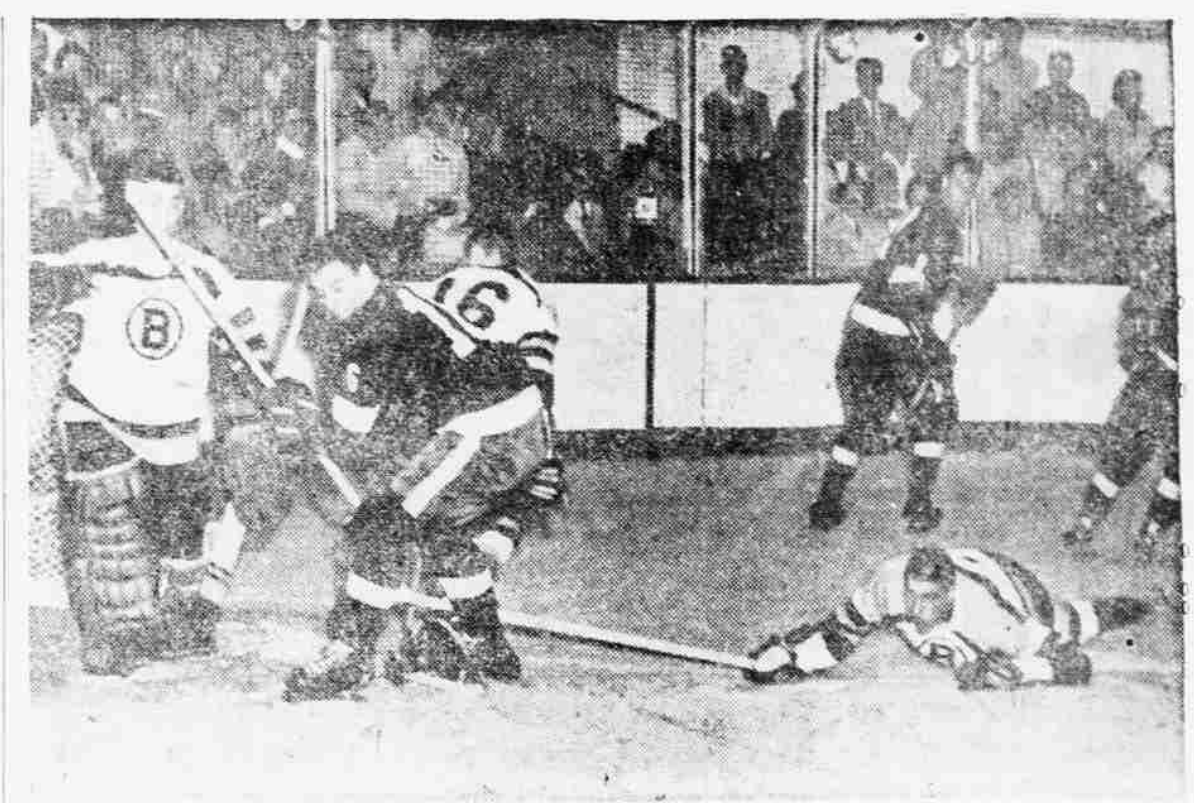
