

Elizabeth Returns To London After Charming Americans on Whirlwind Visit

London—Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip returned to London today from their highly successful 11-day trip to the United States and Canada. Their plane landed at London Airport at 4:02 p.m.

Her plane had left New York at 1:58 a.m. taking 10 hours and 40 minutes for the non-stop flight.

New York—Queen Elizabeth II left for home early today and it was almost as if a fairy queen had come and gone.

She and her prince charming for 10 days took Americans' minds off Sputnik, the Midwest and domestic headlines.

Elizabeth was many things to those who welcomed her and her husband, Prince Philip, wherever they went—Ottawa, James town, Williamsburg, Washington and New York.

To her own folks in Canada, where she paid her first call, she was a real personage, to be treated almost reverently.

In the United States, she became an earthy "Liz", "Liz" or "Hiyah, Queen." But she also represented the storybook queen of our childhood.

President Eisenhower saw the Queen as a "symbol" of the link between the two English speaking peoples whose interests are the same.

Mayor Robert Wagner, of New York, called her a "great queen, and a gracious lady."

A Celebrity To All

And wherever she visited, she was a celebrity the whole town turned out to see.

Monday was her greatest day—her first visit to New York, which she confessed she always had longed to see. In the last day of her 10-day North American visit, she crowded in plenty of rubbernecking, New Yorkers rubbernecked right back.

Police said 1,700,000 of them got to see real live royalty. Most of them lined the sidewalks to watch the traditional hero's welcome, a ticker tape parade up Broadway.

Their last day in the United States was so crowded that royalty, which most of the time you can set your clock by, began to be tardy. Not just a few minutes, but several.

The day included lunch with Mayor Robert Wagner and some 2,500 other guests; dinner with the Pilgrims and the English Speaking Union; and the final event in an eventful day, the Commonwealth Ball. This full-dress shindig was sponsored by the 58 associated Commonwealth societies. Some 4,500 persons packed the 7th Regiment armory to watch the Queen, in diamond tiara and jeweled evening gown, review honor guards from the United States and Canada.

Escorted to Idlewild

Shortly after midnight the bubble-topped limousine which President Eisenhower lent royalty for its visit pulled away from the armory. With motorcycle escort it headed for Idlewild airport.

The big silver ship—a BOAC DC7C—was one hour late in taking off.

This business of being queen is work, even if the reward is dazzling gowns, a multi-million dollar jewel collection and adulation. Most of us wouldn't last a week on such a schedule. Royalty always is "on" . . . although the minute the Queen hits the front door of her own quarters, off come her shoes.

They put in a nine to midnight work schedule every day, which left little time for sleep. They shook hands, in reception lines, with close to 9,000 persons. They made speeches, placed cornerstones, laid wreaths at memorials, attended church services, visited a thoroughbred horse farm, took in a football game, and visited a supermarket.

Word is, the Royal Couple will be back in 1959, this time bringing their two children, Princess Anne and Prince Charles. They're welcome any time.

Portland—Circuit Judge Donald Long Monday ordered two 12-year-old boys, who admitted causing \$500 to \$10,000 worth of damage to Girls Poly high school here, detained until a complete investigation is made.

The boys told the judge they could give no reason for the actions.

The incident occurred Saturday. Windows, doors, desks and cabinets were ruined, walls were blotted with ink, floors were blotted with paint and a typewriter was thrown through a glass showcase.

Classes were held as usual at the high school Monday but confusion was evident.

Bonneville Restores Interruptible Power

Portland—Improved Columbia river stream flows resulted today in temporary restoration of 60 per cent of interruptible power loads in the Pacific Northwest, Bonneville Power Administration announced.

But BPA said current industrial production based on interruptible power would not be affected since the restoration will merely displace 210,000 of the 276,000 kilowatts now being served by provisional power from Hungry Horse dam.

Affected industries will continue to receive about 66,000 kilowatts of Hungry Horse provisional energy along with about 73,000 kilowatts from thermal generation and other resources outside the area.

Dr. William Pearl, BPA chief, said forecasts indicate all area firm loads, secondary loads of the private utilities and the restored interruptible power can be carried through the rest of October from hydro resources.

Robbery Suspect Overpowered by Cops

Portland—A robbery suspect was overpowered by two policemen early today after pointing a gun at one of the officers following a hotel holdup.

Being held was William Reginald Davis, 38. Bond was set at \$13,000.

Helen P. Kelly, night clerk at the Nortonia hotel, said she was held up and robbed of about \$45 shortly after midnight. She called police and officers Ed Lesowski and Al Pacella arrived.

Pacella went inside to get more information and Lesowski checked the nearby area. He spotted a man in a doorway near the hotel who answered the description of the holdup man.

Lesowski said as he was leading the suspect back to the hotel he suddenly felt a gun being pressed against his stomach. He threw the man to the sidewalk and with Pacella's help the suspect was subdued.

Holmes Asks Survey Of Tax Structure

Salem—Gov. Robert D. Holmes today asked the council of state governments to recommend a tax research firm to make an independent survey of Oregon's tax structure.

In a letter to Frank Bane, secretary of the council which is comprised of all state governments in the U.S., Gov. Holmes said he was "anxious to have an independent survey made by an outside source, as I feel that this is the only way we can accurately determine the answer" to some of the tax questions.

The governor said there had been a great conflict of opinions for several years as to the impact of the state's tax structure on its economy and industrial expansion.

Money Not Believed Object in Kidnaping

Corvallis—A deputy sheriff said today he did not believe the person who kidnaped a 7-week-old girl from her crib here early Monday was after money. The child was found lying under a tree in the yard of her home.

Deputy Sheriff Wayne Yates said there was no apparent attempt at ransom and theorized that someone who wanted a child took Winette Marie Pope from her crib early Monday.

Authorities today were continuing their investigation.

C. V. Rue, a policeman called to investigate, said he heard footsteps running away behind the house shortly before the child was found. The baby is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Pope of south Corvallis.

Less Noise Promised For Jet Airliners

Baltimore, Md.—William M. Allen, president of the Boeing airplane company, said on Monday that Boeing has achieved a "substantial reduction" in the noise level of jet engines for commercial planes.

Allen heads the company which is building the 707-jetliner for many of the world's airlines. He said that a prototype of the new plane has been flying for many months with an effective noise suppressor.

Allen said that suppression of the jet-engine noise cost Boeing millions of dollars in research and resulted in a loss of engine thrust and an increase in fuel consumption.

He said the first production models of the 707 will be off the assembly lines before the end of the year, first deliveries will begin late in 1958 and the planes will go into scheduled service in the spring of 1959.
