

State Board Approves OSC Admission Policy

Portland — Oregon State's admission policy for out-of-state athletes had an official stamp of approval today after an investigation by the state board of higher education.

Chancellor John R. Richards said the probe found no evidence whatsoever that exceptions have been made in favor of prospective athletes.

Richards had been asked on October 8 by President A. L. Strand of OSC to conduct the probe after published reports indicated admission requirements

for out-of-state students were less at OSC than at the University of Oregon.

Richards added that he intended to set up a committee of Oregon State and Oregon representatives "to compare in detail the admission practices of these two institutions." He said a report on this would be made later to the board of higher education.

There have been complaints that Oregon has been too tough on out-of-state admissions.

Statement Issued

In his statement Tuesday Richards said:

"In recent weeks there has been some newspaper discussion of admission practices at Oregon State College and at the University of Oregon, particularly as they involve prospective athletes.

"Two years ago it was decided to admit to our undergraduate institutions only those nonresident freshmen who ranked as upper half. And starting in 1955, residents of Oregon who are in the lowest third of their high school classes will be admitted only after satisfactorily passing an examination.

Rules 'Might Vary'

"It has been the policy of the board of higher education to allow the various faculties to administer directly the procedures for admission and retention of students. The institutions should enforce uniform minimum standards given to them by the board. I would advise, however, that you the board continue to permit faculties to set up special requirements above the minimums as they deem these to be necessary and advisable. This would mean that requirements might vary between institutions and even between programs within the same institution.

"At President Strand's request, I have studied carefully recent admission records at Oregon State College. I have found that the faculty committee on admissions and the admission staff should be praised for a record of painstaking effort and great competence. Specifically, I found at Oregon State College no evidence whatsoever that admissions exceptions are being made here in favor of prospective athletes."

Indiana Alums Suggest Firing Director Allen

Indianapolis — Some Indiana university alumni suggested today that Athletic Director Frank E. Allen be fired as the first step in the school's uphill battle for prominence in Big Ten football.

A group of high school coaches, most of whom played for the Cream and Crimson, were virtually unanimous in blaming Indiana's sorry plight on its athletic department.

One coach polled by United Press suggested that I. U. President Dr. Herman B. Wells "either run in the United Nations or run his university." Wells, for years active in governmental affairs, is a delegate to the U.N.

"It's about time Allen gets out," said some of the coaches. One said an athletic director has no business taking a "defeatist attitude."

Allen said in Chicago this week Indiana's football fortunes have reached the "dilemma" stage. "We are getting worse and worse."

Pugilist Goes By Other's Name

Portland — Promoter Tommy Moyer said today that boxer John Medlock of San Francisco had used another fighter's name—Doug Garrett—here October 8 in an eight-round bout won by Denny Moyer.

The bout originally was scheduled with Garrett but it was understood Garrett declined to make the trip north without his manager. Moyer said he accepted the substitute because he knew Medlock was a better fighter.

He said he had been forced to make a change in his main event the previous week and did not want to confuse fans with another switch the following Tuesday.

Red Raiders Drilling For Wolves Fray

Ashland—Homecoming festivities at Southern Oregon College this week will be climaxed Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. when the SOC Red Raiders meet the Oregon College of Education Wolves in what could prove to be the deciding game of the Oregon Collegiate conference. Both teams now boast unblemished 2-0 records for conference competition.

Dropping the Oregon Tech Owls last Saturday night by a margin of 33 to 12 the Red Raiders moved into a tie for first spot in the OCC with OCE, which crowned its homecoming by walloping Portland State college 31 to 6.

Coach Al Akins was well pleased with the Red Raiders performance against the OTI club, as the red and black warriors shook off a bad first quarter to cross the Owl's end zone five times. "Roaring" Ron Maurer sparked the SOC victory as he stole an OTI pass early in the second period to sprint 76 yards for the TD.

Two Klamath Falls gridders may have earned themselves starting positions in the SOC backfield by combining talents to insure the win over OTI. Lee McGill, freshman speedster from Klamath, scored twice against the Owls on a 52-yard screen pass and again on an 11-yard dash into the end zone. Pitching to McGill on the scoring pass was Larry Yarnell, reserve quarterback from Klamath. Yarnell completed three of five passes in the OTI ball game to rack up 82 yards, and two tosses into the end zone.

Hoping for a repeat of last year's 12 to 7 win over the Wolves, the Red Raiders ran through a long workout Tuesday afternoon correcting mistakes from the OTI fracas. With the possible exception of tackle Dick Smith, who was struck by the flu Monday, the SOC ball club should be at full strength for the OCE scrap. Halfback Lee McGill, quarterback George Stavros, and guard Tom Findlay missed the Tuesday afternoon workout due to minor injuries received in the OTI tilt, but are expected to be back in uniform to meet the Wolves.

Activities for the Southern Oregon college homecoming will open with a variety show Friday night, with the big event being the clash of the two top teams in the OCC Saturday on Fuller field on the SOC campus.

Jack Mollenkopf Coach of Week

Mollenkopf, a chunky man of 52 who was a football end and baseball catcher at Bowling Green of Ohio, attributed the stunning Purdue victory to line play, sticky fingers and desire.

Casanova also moved Bob Heard, a reserve guard, to center to help bolster the position.

North-South Golf In Second Round

Pinehurst, N.C. — The sixth annual North and South Seniors Golf tournament swung into its second round today with Parran C. Jarboe of Cape Elizabeth, scheduled to meet J. Wood Platt of Philadelphia in the top match.

Jarboe, of Ft. Smith, Ark., 6 and 4 in Tuesday's first round of match play, while Platt, two-time runner-up in the tourney, defeated David Clarke of Bryn Mawr, Pa. 4 and 3.

Fred Wright of Watertown, Mass., one of two medalists in Monday's round, rolled up an easy 5 and 4 win over USGA President Richard Tufts of Pinehurst, but Arthur S. Lynch of Scarsdale, N.Y., knocked off medalist Maurice Smith of Kansas City, 4 and 3.

The second round matched right against Joseph M. Wells of Newell, W. Va., and Lynch against Benjamin Krafft Jr. of Titusville, Pa. In the opening round, Wells beat Paul Coste of Chestnut Hill, Pa., 2 and 1, while Krafft downed Carl S. Herrud of Grand Rapids, Mich., 1-up.

Pastrano Victor In London Bout

London — Willie Pastrano's easy victory over lumbering Dick Richardson of Wales today moved the New Orleans boxing master into a position to challenge any of the world's top three heavyweights.

The 21-year-old Pastrano won't improve his No. 4 rating off his 10-round decision over the rugged-but-inert Welshman but he obviously is ready to shoot for the "big dough." Pastrano's victory was so decisive that Richardson raised Willie's hand in token of the win before the official verdict.

There were no knockdowns but the 180 1/2-pound Pastrano slapped his 199-pound opponent around like a TV private eye handles the villain and might have finished him off if he had been willing to close in. But Willie stayed at long range, content to cut Richardson's face to ribbons.

Wilson, Lebaron Top Pro Circuit

Philadelphia — Tommy Wilson of the Los Angeles Rams and Eddie Lebaron of the Washington Redskins top the National Football League rushers and passers, respectively, today for the second week in a row.

Wilson, with a 42-yard output last week end, hiked his ball carrying total of 392 yards in 46 carries, an average of 5.1 yards per carry, and held a 61-yard lead over second place Hugh McElhenny of the 49ers.

Clyde Conner, 49ers end, was in first place among the pass receivers with 19 completions, followed by John Carson of the Redskins and Jim Mutscheller of Baltimore with 17 receptions each.

Lebaron completed 38 of 59 passes for 627 yards and six touchdowns.

George Blanda, of the Bears, with a touchdown, nine extra points and five field goals and the Bears' Willie Galimore, with five touchdowns, were tied at 30 points behind Mutscheller.

The defending champion Boston Celtics appear today to be taking up right where they left off last spring in the National Basketball association.

The Celtics, who won the Eastern division regular-season title and the division playoffs before whipping St. Louis in the championship playoff series, opened the 1957-58 NBA season by defeating the Hawks, 115-90.

Pro basketball returns to Detroit after an absence of several years tonight when the Detroit Pistons, formerly of Fort Wayne, Ind., entertain the Celtics, while the New York Knickerbockers play the Hawks in the other half of the twin-bill.

Friday night, the Syracuse Nationals open their home season against the Philadelphia Warriors.

Corvallis, Ore. — Oregon State worked on offense Tuesday in an effort to retain its scoring punch against Washington Saturday.

The Beavers scored only one touchdown while losing to UCLA 26-7 last week. OSC Coach Tommy Prothro said his team was "outplayed, outcoached, outstudied and outnewsperated," in its first loss of the season.

Portland — Bill Zapp, top rebounder for the Portland Pilots last season, changed his mind Tuesday and turned out for basketball practice. Zapp earlier indicated he would not play this season.

Winters Leader In College Stats

New York — It's Bob Winters by air and Bob Stransky by land in the race for the major college individual total offense championship.

Winters, a senior quarterback from Yakima, Wash., has rolled up 809 yards in Utah State's first five games to take a 14-yard lead over Stransky, Colorado University halfback from Yankton, S.D. Winters has gained all but 52 of those yards passing while Stransky has picked up all but 160 yards by rushing.

Behind the two leaders in the total offense department came Don Allard of Boston College with 750 yards and Bob Newman of Washington State with 646 yards.

Winters, of course, leads in passing with 57 completions in 108 attempts for 757 yards and five touchdowns and Stransky leads in rushing with 635 yards in 92 tries. Billy Baker of Furman ranks second in passing with 43 completions in 75 attempts for 417 yards and four touchdowns and Don Perkins of New Mexico is second in rushing with 567 yards in 73 cracks at the line.

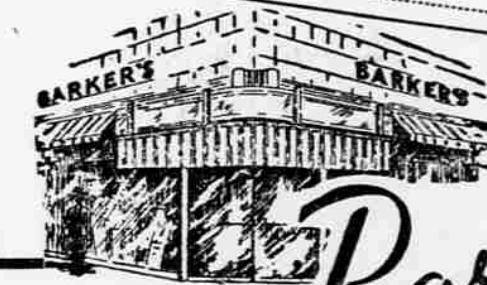
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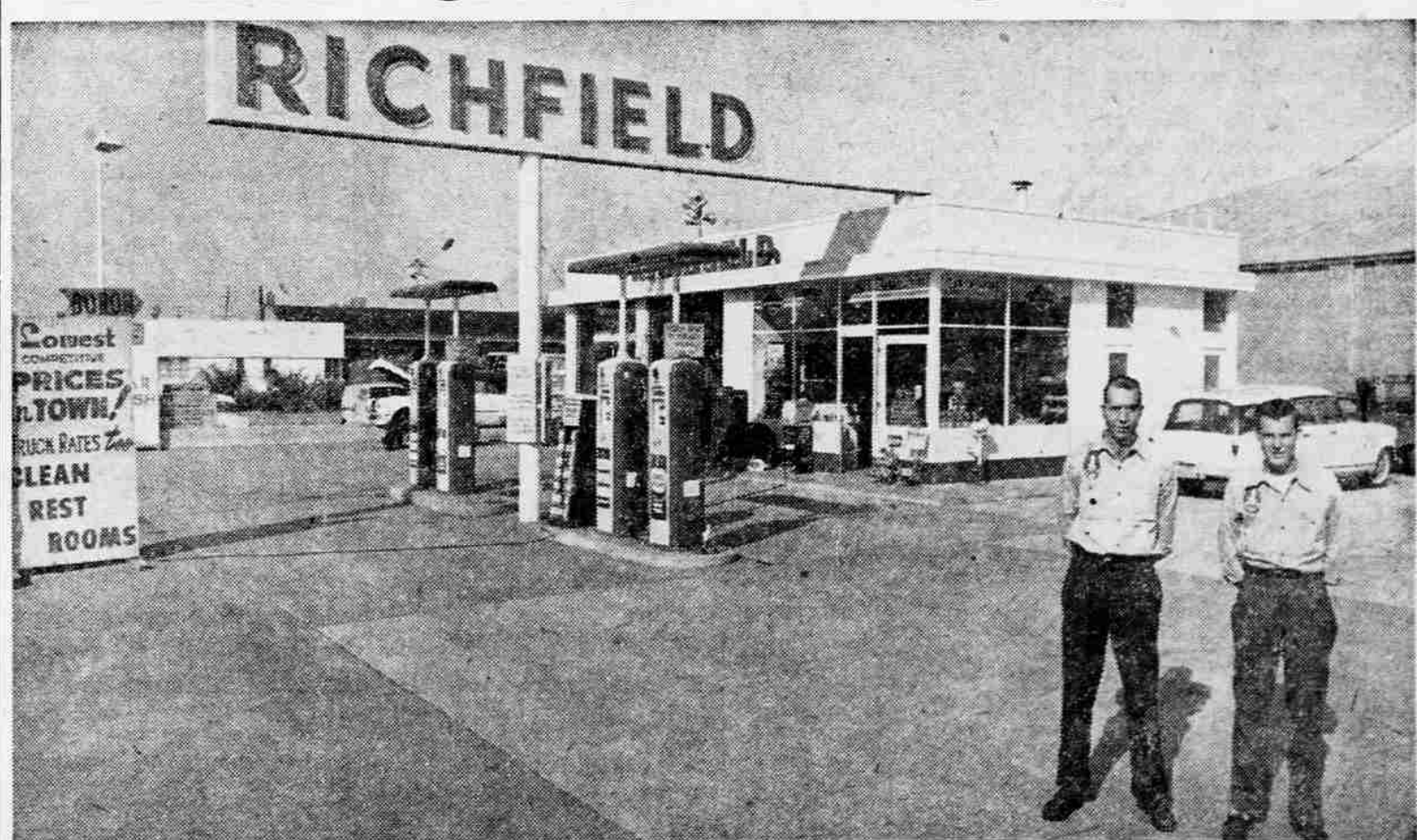
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
