The dissension allegedly stems from remarks by Athletic Director Frank Allen who said the school was "through making alibis" for the Hoosiers' poor record. Two players missed Tuesday's drill, Bob De Marco and John Meegan, and it was speculated they had left school.

Gaspar Ortega Edges Gavilan

Los Angeles—Gaspar Ortega, in a surprising late finish, won a split decision victory over bolo-punching Kid Gavilan in a scheduled 12-round welterweight elimination bout for the vacant title Tuesday night at Wrigley field.

The split decision stunned most of the ring-side press who had Gavilan in front by a wide margin. The United Press card favored the Kid by four points, 116 to 112.

Ortega's win evened the score with Gavilan. The 31-year-old Havana, Cuba brawler had defeated Ortega on July 31 in Miami, Fla. Gavilan, the sixth ranking title contender, scaled 146 as did his seventh-ranked opponent.

Jug Takes Back Seat Saturday

Minneapolis — Tradition and the "Little Brown Jug" take a back seat Saturday when Minnesota meets Michigan with the Big Ten title and Rose Bowl hopes hanging on victory.

The game is more a "must" win for Michigan than for the Gophers, since Minnesota plays eight conference games. But each club already has lost once in conference play and another defeat would seriously endanger any chance for the title.

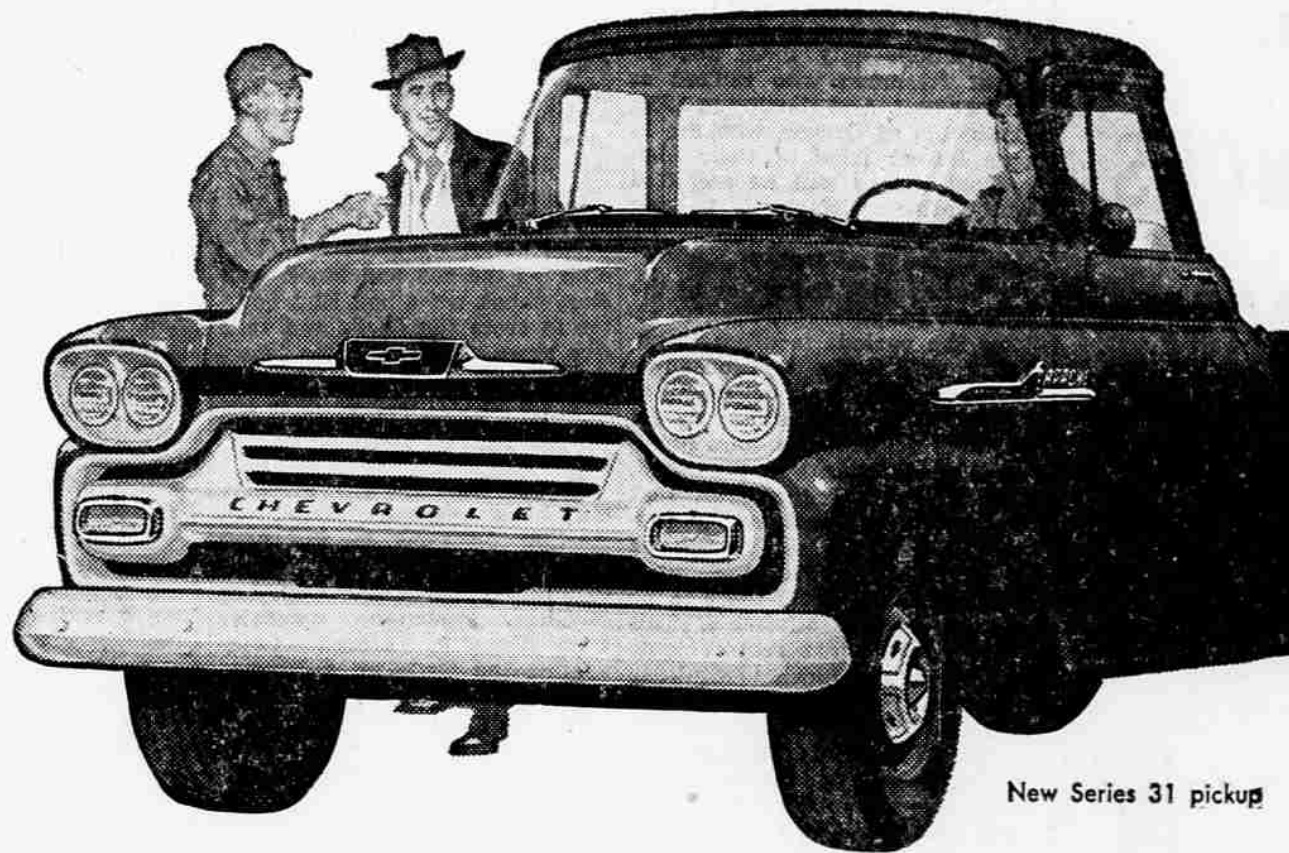

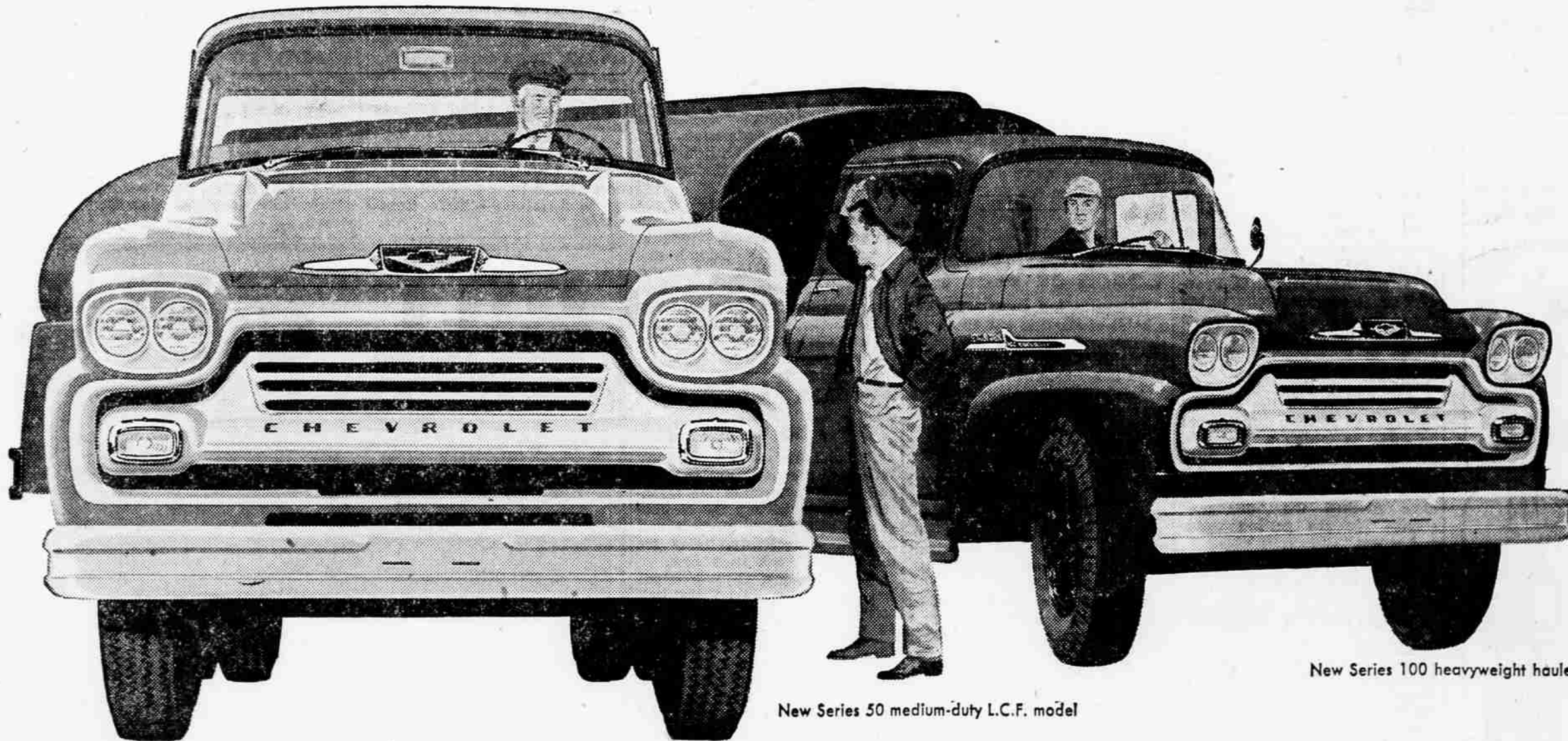
