

Black Tornado Eleven Hosts Eureka Loggers Friday Night

Medford's Black Tornado faced a problem of thinning depth at the quarterback slot as it accomplished its final tuning today for the non-conference gridiron battle with Eureka high.

Tornado stalwarts entertain the longtime California adversary at 8:15 p.m. Friday night at the senior high stadium here.

Coach Fred Spiegelberg's Medford forces are down virtually to one replacement behind regular Quarterback Tony Brauner. Latest casualty at the position is Jim Clark, No. 2 man on offense and a regular defensive player. Clark has been bothered by possible torn knee cartilage. His doctor has told him he can play as long as the ailment does not hurt him too much but Coach Spiegelberg said that Clark has been bothered quite a bit this week by the injury.

It is possible that Clark will see duty against the Loggers but just how much is a matter of question. Spiegelberg could hold him back with the hope that his condition will be better for the Grants Pass engagement two weeks from now.

Konopasek Up
Ranks of quarterbacks began to thin out about a week ago when Tony Monroe voluntarily dropped from the squad. Then Bob Pond suffered a fractured ankle in the Klamath Falls game. Spiegelberg said he planned to bring sophomore Ray Konopasek up from the junior varsity for varsity reserve service. Fullback Bob Gee likely will take over defensive chores in place of Clark.

The head coach reported a good practice yesterday. There was individual work in blocking and tackling. The Tornado primed its defenses for the Loggers, dummy scrimmaged its own offense and drilled on extra point kick duties.

In Eureka the Medfordites will encounter a club which has had a rather bleak season but which will be out to follow last week's examples set by Purdue, Illinois and UCLA in the collegiate ranks. While there are no direct comparisons, season records establish the Black Tornado as favorite.

Six Lettermen
This year's Logger aggregation is built around six lettermen. It operates out of a T formation with ground and air attack fairly well balanced. There have been interesting results in some Eureka games. Logger loss to Del Norte was by the margin of a field goal with the final score 3 to 0. The Eurekans, after dropping a 19 to 20 verdict to Fortuna, came back to trim that club 12 to 0.

Crater, Ashland Bill Encounter on Friday

Central Point — Crater and Ashland High school renew a football rivalry dating from A-2 days when they clash here Friday night in a District 6 A-1 football conflict.

Each will be trying for its first Southern Oregon Conference victory of the season and each will have somewhat depleted forces for the battle with sickness and injury the principal reasons.

Coach Leonard Warren reports good practices this week with a lot of hustle but with a shortage of manpower in the Crater Comet camp.

With Lee Gossett put out of action in the Grants Pass mix and Kerman Bennett a doubtful player because of injury in the Medford game, Warren had a big problem in filling the fullback post. Both men have knee injuries. He could use a couple of sophomores, Jim Eldred and Don Gillaspay, at the spot or could shift Halfback Allen Barnes to full and put John Burns in the right half position.

Sickness of Leslie Kellow and Mike Martin means more work without rest for others at the guard positions and eye injury to Ron Gillaspay in a jayvee game has hampered the Comet backfield strength. Just 22 players were on hand for Wednesday workout.

Warren has indicated that Crater has made some defensive revisions for the Ashland mix. Both its pass offense and pass defense have got attention.

At Ashland Coach Al Simpson said his club was back to fundamentals after the loss to Grants Pass. Most of his squad is on hand after a seige of flu but Simpson reported a number of key players missing. One starting end, Doug Fitch, has moved to Colorado. The other, Jack Tobasson, has dropped football because of a shoulder injury.

However, Halfback Al South and Tackle Frank Conley are back in shape. South dislocated an elbow in the Yreka game. Quarterback Pat Simpson is lamed by an ankle injury.

Hasz Replacement
In the event Rodoni hasn't returned he will be replaced at right halfback by Jim Hasz. Hasz, a 155-pound senior, is playing his first season of football. He is primarily a track man and basketball player but manages to do a commendable job on the gridiron. Mike Minor, a junior, and Olson round out the starting backfield. Minor is an average passer and fair runner from his quarterback spot. He replaced Don Wilson after the first two weeks of the season as the starter.

Starting left halfback is Allan Eubank, a 150-pound junior. Eubank is potentially a fine ball carrier, but needs to develop the knack of following his interference.

Possible starters in the line are McFarland and Gene Gage, ends; Loren Anderson and Krupka, tackles; Ken Van Duzen and Gaylor Carter, guards, and Fred Lundblade, center. Lundblade, 195, and Krupka, are the only linemen listed over 180 pounds among the starting seven.

Top Defenders
Olson and linebacker Ed Peterson rate as top defensive men on the squad. Peterson had a field night recently against Arcata.

Possible starters for the Tornado tomorrow are Tom Hamlin and Mike Russell, ends; Tom Morris and Frank Albert or Dick Sorenson, tackles; Tom Merton and Dick Corum, guards; Jim Funston, center; Brauner, quarterback; John Jones or Gerry Lyons, left half; Ron Reich, right half, and Bob Gee, fullback.

Pete Rasmussen may replace Russell and Larry Brown may go in for Reich to open on defense.

Oregon College of Education invades Ashland Saturday to meet Southern Oregon in what many feel will be a showdown battle for the Oregon Collegiate conference football championship.

The two teams are deadlocked at the top of league standings with 2-0 records. Each has lost a close game to Linfield, defending Northwest Conference champion.

In other league action, Eastern Oregon returns to its home field for a game with Portland State. The other conference member, Oregon Tech, plays host to Dixie Junior College Saturday night in Klamath Falls.

Wolves Have Edge
OCE holds the edge in total offense among OCC teams with 309.6 yards per game. Southern Oregon is second with 268. Fullback Ron Maurer of SOC leads conference rushers with 455 yards and Larry Buss of OCE is second with 355. One yard back is Wyman Gernhart, also of OCE.

OCE's Jim Bowlen took over the passing leadership with 31 out of 62 for 551 yards. Lance Locke of SOC is second with 29 for 71 for 297 yards.

Elk Hunting Looks Good In Douglas

Portland —P— The weekly report of hunting conditions prepared by the State Game commission.

Southwest: Elk hunting should be good in Coos and Douglas counties. Waterfowl hunting remains only fair to poor on Coos Bay and pheasant hunting remains good in Douglas county.

Central: Columbia district —Pheasant and quail hunting good in Jefferson county. Pheasant and quail in Sherman and Wasco counties fair to good. A peak flight of geese is resting on the Columbia river.

Bend area: Fair duck hunting on the upper Deschutes, provided the weather is on the stormy side. Good quail hunting in the central Oregon area mainly in brushy areas bordering irrigated farms. Klamath areas —Pheasant hunting good. Duck hunting on upper Klamath lake poor; some five million ducks and geese are on the Tule lake refuge and there is good jump shooting on irrigation ditches. Goose hunting poor.

Northwest: North Coast —Prospects fair for bull elk in Clatsop county. Willamette Valley—Waterfowl hunting is slow. Pheasant hunting should be good throughout the valley. Some 400 adult roosters have been released in Marion county and in Yamhill county near Dayton.

Northeast: Best elk hunting in Union county will be the north half of the county near Elgin and Tollgate and the upper Grande Ronde river near Starkey, Mt. Emily, North Powder, and Meacham will be good. Roads in good shape; fair success in Morrow county expected; Wheeler county will be poor in either-sex season; Blue mountains should be good; pheasant shooting fair to good with dogs; hunting poor in Grant county with only local ducks available. Southeast: Pheasant hunting good in Snake river valley, Malheur river and Jordan valley area of Malheur county; about 60,000 geese and 15,000 ducks present in Warner valley area; pheasant hunting better than usual in Lake county; quail hunting excellent; Summer lake area poor.

Harris Says UO Admission Requisites Over Minimum

Eugene —P— Leo Harris, athletic director at the University of Oregon, said today he was certain that both Oregon State and Oregon were observing minimum admission requirements for out-of-state students, both athlete and non-athlete, as required by the State Board of Higher Education. But he said Oregon's requirements were higher than the minimum.

Harris said he was "surprised" by a recent report to the state board of higher education regarding admissions policies at OSC and Oregon "which intimated that charges had been made that out-of-state athletes were given preferential treatment at Oregon State."

Chancellor John Richards said earlier that an investigation had found Oregon State had not violated rules regarding admission of athletes.

Harris said "As far as I know, no newspaperman who questioned us, or any member of our staff, has ever said that out-of-state athletes as such were ever admitted to any of our state schools on any basis other than those which applied to all students."
