

# Brownell's Resignation Seen As Welcome To Many in South

Resignation of U.S. Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. was welcome news to many of his longtime critics in the South. "I am encouraged and delighted," commented Georgia Gov. Marvin Griffin. "I do not know the qualifications of his proposed successor, Mr. William P. Rogers, but it will have to be an improvement."

Rogers, who has been serving as Deputy Attorney General, will take the top Justice Department post when Brownell's resignation becomes effective in about two weeks.

"Brownell's resignation means the principal architect of the Eisenhower reconstruction era has bowed out in the middle of the

mess he helped create," was the reaction of Louisiana State Sen. William Rainach.

South Carolina Gov. George Bell Timmerman Jr. said he was "not at all unhappy" about the resignation, but charged it is "merely an attempt to whitewash the use of troops in Little Rock."

"It is a pity he didn't resign earlier," said Georgia Attorney General Eugene Cook.

Meanwhile there were these other integration developments: Sen. John C. Stennis (D-Miss.) said "thousands of other 'Little Rocks' are inevitable throughout the South unless there is a change in the policy of the Eisenhower administration."

—Segregation leaders apparently have failed in an effort to block a nationwide television interview with the Rev. Martin Luther King, Negro minister who led the Montgomery, Ala., bus boycott.

Virginia officials had new hope for the state's pupil placement law, which was struck down this week by the U.S. Supreme Court. State Attorney General Kenneth Patten said in his opinion "the law has not been rendered inoperative in all instances."

—Crosses were burned in front of five Negro homes in Prattville, Ala., but authorities said they could find no apparent motive.

## Government Not To Commit Itself on Home Mortgages

Washington—The government announced this week it no longer will commit itself in advance to buy new home mortgages carrying the veterans administration rate of 4½ per cent interest.

The announcement was made by the federal national mortgage administration, a federally controlled corporation. The administration buys government-backed mortgages from banks and loan companies to supply these lenders with additional funds for home loans.

The FNMA has been giving commitments for a year in advance that it would take over mortgages on home builders planned to erect. With such assurance, a bank would be more likely to advance the builder money for construction and later accept the mortgage on the house.

**No More Commitments**  
However, the FNMA said it no longer would make such standby commitments to purchase 4½ per cent mortgages. The agency will continue to buy 4½ per cent mortgages which are presented for sale, but at a lower price, the announcement said.

Lenders who hold 4½ per cent mortgages may continue to present them to FNMA for purchase, but they will receive a price which makes the transaction less attractive.

A spokesman said the change was necessary because "it's not good business to take 4½ per cent mortgages when we have to pay about 5 per cent for our money." FNMA is borrowing \$750,000,000 for the public on eight-month notes which carry 4½ per cent interest, the highest rate ever paid on an issue of FNMA securities.

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## Official Says World Problems May Be Answered in Christian Talks

People, perhaps, ought to look to Christian gatherings instead of to the halls of Congress, the committee rooms of the United Nations or the chancelleries of Europe or Russia to find the answers to world problems, Dr. Eugene Carson Blake brought out yesterday in a talk to Medford Kiwanis club members.

Dr. Blake, president of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States, addressed Kiwanians at their noon luncheon at Rogue Valley Country club. His topic was "The Tiber's Banks and the Galilean Hill."

Pointing to the conference being held here today and Friday on use and understanding of the Bible, the church official declared that it may be that classrooms such as the ones here will do more in long range to answer questions on world matters.

**Pictures Emperor**  
By way of illustration Dr. Blake pictured Roman Emperor Claudius Tiberius Caesar pondering problems of his realm from his palace on a hill in Rome and portrayed Jesus 1,500 miles away on a Galilean hill telling of the wise man who built his house upon a rock and the foolish one who built his house upon the sand.

Claudius Caesar had great military and political power and was thought of as a god in the empire while Jesus was at the time an itinerant preacher with no personal prestige.

As time has passed, however, the church official said, the hill above the Tiber has shrunk in the perspective of the human eye but "the very strange hill" in Galilee grows larger and larger in human experience. The unknown peasant, now spoken of with bated breath, has grown in significance while his contemporary has become less significant. This should "give us pause" while we think of our contemporary situation, Dr. Blake declared.

**Morals Problem**  
The problems of morals, morale, economics, religion and questions of the future for the Roman empire that might have been in the thoughts of Claudius Tiberius Caesar were mentioned by the speaker. He pointed to similar problems facing this country today.

What church leaders are doing to bind Christians into one world-wide church may be the most important things that are happening but people tend to look by them, Dr. Blake said. "We may be looking to the wrong place for the answers to our problems," he concluded.

Dr. Blake was introduced by Dr. D. Kirkland West, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, where he spoke last evening to keynote the conference on use and understanding of the Bible.

Speaking to a crowd of 400 last night, Dr. Blake asked the question, how big is your church? Not in terms of membership, budget or building, he stressed, but in terms of usefulness. No church is so large, he said, that it can afford to be independent of the other churches in the community.

God made the world a sphere, he explained, so there is no center of religion.

**Immature in Thinking**  
Asking the audience to visualize their church, he reminded them that "the majority of people are slightly immature in their thinking. They are apt to look at what is before their eyes, he added, and commented that to many Christians a church means only where they

go to church or stay away from."

Our forefathers in the 18th century defined the church as universal, he explained, for all persons in every nation and their children. Naturally this multitude cannot meet together in one place so it is only reasonable they be divided into individual churches. But, he added, one should begin their thinking with the whole and then break it into parts.

The freedom to interpret religion came when the Bible was translated into the language understood by the majority. Then scholars, starting research into the Bible's background, came to know each other. Thus they found that no one had a monopoly on truth. Research started the tide of churches growing together, he explained.

**Difference in Churches**  
Despite the many difference in churches today, Dr. Blake explained, there are more similarities than differences in many of them.

Guests were introduced at both Wednesday meetings. Included were Dr. Gerald A. Larue, national council western division director; Dr. J. Carter Swain, director of national council department of the English Bible; the Rev. Dean Collins, western area executive of the American Bible society, and the Rev. Raymond Schaefer, chairman Oregon Bible committee for the national council, and a number of Medford ministers.

Both the chancel and Westminster choirs of the First Presbyterian sang at the evening meeting.

Today's program for the use and understanding of the Bible started with a breakfast at First Christian church attended by 19 ministers and committee members. A registration of 300 persons was reported by Dr. West, chairman of the conference, this morning at the workshops which started at 10:30 a.m. and which will continue through Friday.

**Bible Hymn Festival**  
At 7:30 p.m. today the Bible hymn festival will be held at the Medford High school auditorium. Choirs from the Ashland Presbyterian and Methodist, Jacksonville Presbyterian, and seven Medford churches will participate plus the High school choir. Medford church choirs include First Methodist, Presbyterian, Church of the Brethren, St. Mark's Episcopal and Eastwood Baptist. The program will be directed by Lynn Sjolund.

Hymns scheduled for the evening's program include "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," "He Leadeth Me," "O Worship the King," "Come, Thou Almighty King," "Faith of Our Fathers," and "O God, Our Help in Ages Past."

Dr. Swain will be principal speaker at the festival and Dr. George G. Roseberry, First Methodist church, will present an award to the owner of the oldest Bible submitted in a contest.

**Workshops Scheduled**  
Workshops scheduled Friday will include God and the Bible, group dynamics in studying the Bible, the power of the word of God, use of the Bible with children, and an audio-visual workshop.

The breakfast meeting Friday at 8 a.m. will be held at First Christian church for ministers and a women's luncheon will be held at the First Methodist church at noon. Dr. Swain will

address the group. He also will conduct the closing worship service at 4:30 p.m. Friday.

Other guest leaders for the workshops include Miss Josephine Lillemoe, director of Christian education, First Baptist church, Grants Pass, and James McDonald, director of audio-visuals, Jackson county schools.
