Vienna, Austria — The great iron gate at the cemetery entrance in the provincial Hungarian town of Magyarovar was bound shut with a heavy chain Wednesday.

It was a precaution the Communist regime of Budapest took to stop the dead from infecting the living with the spirit of a new fight for freedom.

Wednesday was the first anniversary of the start of a desperate struggle by the Hungarian people for release from oppression and fear and Communism—a struggle crushed by Russia's Red Army.

And 90 of the thousands slaughtered in that battle a year ago are buried in the Magyarovar cemetery. The Communists refused to let the living visit those graves today.

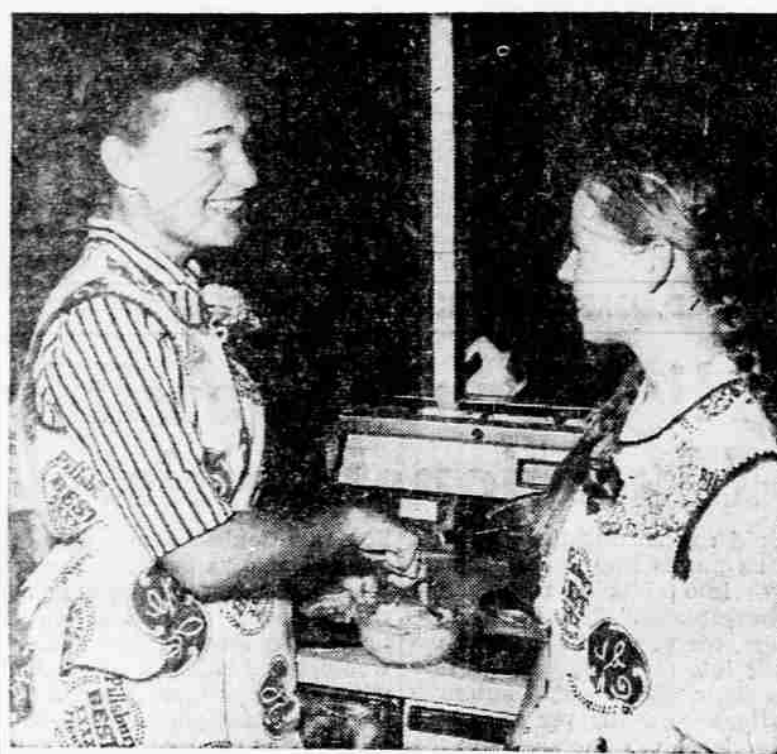

In Prize Winning Recipes

We do not ordinarily talk about brand name products, but when Pillsbury Mills in cooperation with General Electric stage their famed Bake-Off here on the west coast, in the Beverly Hilton hotel, instead of at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York, it is food news. We went, we saw, we were mightily impressed with those 100 General Electric ranges and 100 prize-winning bakers and cooks, all intent (the bakers and cooks, that is) on winning \$25,000, or at least honorable mention.

The West Coast region has proven itself the national leader in the creation of prize-winning recipes, according to an analysis of Grand National Bake-Off entries. Five out of the nine grand prize winners are from the west coast. Ten other area housewives have garnered division prizes. In all, the region has produced 118 Bake-Off contestants, more per population than any other region in the United States.

Our special interest was the Junior Division and most particularly our two West Coast Juniors, Misses Barbara Iglehardt, 17, of Oakland, and Donna Reed, 12, of Los Angeles, who were among the 15 finalists in this division. These young ladies are fortunate, indeed, we think, to have had a head start in the cooking field. After all, the odds are in favor of their marrying men who like to eat, and it is a well known fact that practice gives one the ability to use imagination in cooking. Now for a couple of recipes from the Juniors.

Mocha Nut Crunchies

This mocha-nut cookie was a prize winner for 12-year-old Donna Reed. She was the youngest winner in the Junior Division. It really goes without saying that it is easy enough for a child to do.

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 1/2 to 2 teaspoons instant coffee
1/2 cup instant chocolate mix
1/2 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
1 tablespoon light cream
1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/3 cup pecans

Cream butter or margarine thoroughly. Combine instant coffee, chocolate and sugar; gradually add to butter, creaming well. Blend in cream. Add flour gradually and stir until thoroughly mixed. Roll out on floured board or pastry cloth into a 14 by 10 inch rectangle. Slice pecans and sprinkle over dough; press in firmly. Cut with pastry wheel or knife into two-inch squares. Bake in moderate, 350 degree, oven 9 to 12 minutes. Makes 35 cookies.

Ruby Red Apple Cake

This delightful cranberry-apple topped cake was thought up by 17-year-old Peggy Stewart Marks of Camden, N. J.

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
3 tablespoons sugar
3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup cream
1 slightly beaten egg
Jellied cranberry sauce (about half of a - pound can)
3 apples

1/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons melted butter
Sift together into mixing bowl flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Whip cream; blend in beaten egg. Add to dry ingredients, mixing with fork until dough clings together in a ball. Spread into well greased nine-inch square pan. Cut cranberry sauce into nine quarter-inch slices; place in rows on dough. Pare, cut in quarters and remove core from apples. Cut each quarter into three slices; arrange in parallel rows on cranberry sauce, pressing slices through to dough. Sprinkle with combination of cinnamon and sugar. Drizzle butter over all. Bake in moderately hot oven, 400 degrees, 30 to 35 minutes. Serve hot or cold with cream, if desired.

French Dressing

Salads are wonderful . . . Wonderful to look at. Wonder-

Spicy French Dressing. Prepare spiced vinegar and use in preparation of basic recipe. To make spiced vinegar, beat vinegar and add one tablespoon mixed pickling spices. Tie spices in cheese cloth, if desired. Let spices stand until vinegar is cool. Strain or remove bag of spices.

Florentine Dressing: To basic dressing add four tablespoons finely chopped raw spinach and one-half teaspoon onion juice.

Cheese Dressing: To basic dressing add one-fourth cup crumbled Roquefort or blue cheese.

Apples, donuts and Halloween have been go-togethers for a long time. Trick-or-treaters love them, so have plenty on hand plus some icy cold or steaming hot apple cider to take care of the supposedly unexpected ghosts, goblins, ballet dancers and characters from the wild west.

Apples are at the peak of perfection, fresh from the orchard to you to help celebrate both Halloween and National Apple week is scheduled this year from Oct. 24 to Nov. 2.

Donut Crumb Pudding

We suspect you will have some donuts as well as apples left over the following day so here is a recipe utilizing them in an elegant fashion.

1 cup dry donut crumbs (cake donuts, not raised)
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
1 cup sugar
4 egg yolks, beaten
1 cup peach preserves
1 cup chopped nut meats
1/2 cup heavy cream

Soak donut crumbs in enough milk to moisten; amount will depend on softness of crumbs. Cream butter; gradually add sugar and cream well. Blend in beaten egg yolks. Stir in crumbs. When well mixed add preserves and nut meats. Turn into greased 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Bake in slow oven, 300 degrees, until firm. About 40 minutes. Serve with whipped cream, sweetened or not as desired. A bit of brandy added to the whipped cream is a party touch. Makes 6 delightful servings.

Spiced Apple Rings

Fried apple rings add a festive touch to breakfast . . . perk up appetites. In this case they'll add a bit of spice to the start of the day.

Jonathans are perfect for this. Core apples and slice crosswise into one-half-inch rings. Dip in a mixture of sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Fry until golden and tender in butter. Turn only once and do it carefully. Serve hot with sausage patties.
