For many years Mrs. Alta Estes, the Talent librarian, has worked cheerfully to give the best library service possible under difficult circumstances. An attempt to keep the library open for the convenience of students and business people who can visit it only during evening hours was especially trying since the room was used at the same time for youth activities.

In the new room readers will have their own quiet place; the books will have more attractive and convenient shelves; and, in time, the librarian will have an office desk with drawers for her supplies and files. Erasing of Police Tire Markings Legal

Pasadena, Calif. — Those marks traffic officers put on the tires of cars so they can tell how long they've been parked don't mean a legal thing to Municipal Judge Donald R. Wright.

The judge dismissed a case Wednesday against Frank P. Livingstone, a 39-year-old citizen charged with obstructing the work of cops by erasing tell-tale chalk marks on his tires.

There's nothing in the California Vehicle Code which makes it illegal for a car owner to wipe the tires of his car, Judge Wright ruled.

And, furthermore, the jurist said he could find nothing in the code which gave cops the right to mark up a citizen's car.

Diplomats Discuss Hamarskjold Trip

United Nations, N.Y. — Western diplomats held final consultations Friday on a plan to let Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold investigate the crisis between Syria and Turkey.

The Turkish delegation today circulated a joint Turco-Saudi communique issued at Dahrán, Saudi Arabia, on Wednesday. It said Turkish Minister of State Fatih Rüstü Zorlu arrived there by air Wednesday morning and had a 3½-hour talk with King Saud with a promise that the conversation would be resumed the next morning.

The 11 Arab countries called another private meeting to persuade Syria to accept the mediation offer of Saudi Arabia's King Saud before the United Nations General Assembly resumes debate on the Syria-Turkey dispute. Turkey already has accepted the offer.

Polish Red Leader Attacks Opponents

Warsaw — Polish Communist Party leader Wladyslaw Gomulka bitterly attacked his Stalinist and revisionist opponents in a speech released today.

He recommended a drastic clean-out of party ranks of both the extreme left and the extreme right.

"The unity of action of our party has been considerably impaired," he said. "It is high time to put an end to this."

Gomulka's speech was made Thursday to the Central Committee of the Polish Workers' Party, but was not released until today.

JAPANESE TO BE FREED

Tokyo — Russia has promised to release 45 Japanese fishermen seized on charge of violating Soviet territorial waters from prison early next month, it was announced today. Soviet Charge D'Affaires E. G. Zabrodin advised the Foreign Office that the Japanese captives will be released during the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution.
