Flu Deaths Near 400; New York, Pennsylvania Lead

Deaths from flu or its complications neared the 400 mark today.

New York state reported 125 flu-caused deaths and Pennsylvania 73 for more than half the nation's total of 397.

An epidemic at the Pennhurst School for the mentally retarded near Philadelphia claimed three more victims during the week end to bring the total at the institution to 20.

Two Die at School
Deaths of two children at the Rainier State School, Buckley, Wash., brought to three the number of deaths this autumn at the institution for the mentally retarded and attributed to influenza or its complications.

Elsewhere Michigan had 32 deaths, California 31, Louisiana 21, Illinois 20, Ohio 14, Iowa 13, Utah and Wisconsin 11 each; Colorado 10, Hawaii 9, Kentucky 6, Connecticut 5, Indiana 4, New Jersey and Washington 3 each, and Arizona, Maine, Minnesota, Oklahoma, Oregon and the District of Columbia 1 each.

A flu epidemic at the Pennhurst school claimed its 17th victim during the week end with the death of an 11-year-old boy.

Two new flu fatalities were reported in Illinois institutions during the week end, including an 11th victim at the Dixon School for Mentally Retarded.

The other death was a woman, 49, at Kankakee State hospital.

A third flu death occurred at the Southern Colony Training school near Union Grove, Wis. Several outbreaks of flu also have occurred in state institutions in Oregon and California.

A flu epidemic at Yemassee, S.C., struck nearly one-fourth of the community's 900 population, including its only two physicians who were hospitalized with the ailment. Authorities said nearly every family had at least one person stricken by the disease, believed to be Asian flu.

Funeral Scheduled For News Director

Hollywood — A funeral service was pending today at Forest Lawn for Robert M. Wagoner, well-known newsman and assistant news director at radio station KJH in Hollywood.

Wagoner, a native of Galesburg, Ill., where he attended Knox college, died Sunday in his apartment of a heart attack. He was 53.

Wagoner started his news career with the Galesburg Register-Mail. He later worked for both United Press and International News Service before serving in the Army during World War II.

He is survived by his brother, Ronald W. Wagoner, Pacific Division news manager of United Press in San Francisco. His wife, Gladys, died last August.

Central Point Man Gets B.A. Degree

Lt. Col. Claire Alfred Pelton Duffie (USAF), son of Mrs. R. Bosworth of route 2, Central Point, received a master of business administration degree from George Washington university in Washington, D.C., at the university's fall convocation, Oct. 19, 1957.

Lt. Col. Duffie also holds a bachelor of science degree which he received from the United States Military academy in 1942.

He is currently on active duty with the United States Air force in Washington, D.C., and lives at 9 Perrott court, Little River Hills, Fairfax, Va.

Finnish Freighter Damaged at Portland

Portland — Crewmen said today it probably would take two weeks to repair the Finnish freighter Korsholma which suffered a smashed bow in a collision with a railroad bridge protection pier.

No one aboard the 5961-ton vessel was injured when the ship struck the pier late Saturday night. The collision bent the bow of the vessel to a 45-degree angle and splintered it with wood from the pier.

The vessel struck the SP&S railroad bridge protection pier in the Willamette river near St. Johns. Damage to the vessel was estimated in excess of \$10,000.

REDS ATTACK BISHOP

Berlin — East German Communists called today for a renunciation of Evangelical Church leaders. The newspaper Neues Deutschland accused church leader Bishop Otto Dibelius of smuggling East German marks to West Germany and then trying to smuggle them back during the Oct. 13 currency exchange. The attack, most violent of many the Communists have aimed at Dibelius, raised the possibility the Communists might try to split the still unified Evangelical church into eastern and western parts.

Effort To Unseat Dooley Abandoned

Salem — A move to unseat House Speaker Pat Dooley was abandoned by a Republican House caucus today "in the interest of harmony and economy," a Republican spokesman said.

The Republicans met at breakfast at a Salem hotel. No Democrats attended the session.

At a caucus Sunday night it was proposed that Rep. Richard Groener, Clackamas county Democrat, be proposed as speaker at the special session in place of Dooley. Other candidates, all Democrats, included Rep. Norman Howard, Portland, and Rep. George Annala, Hood River.

The Republican spokesman declared that the Republican House members had enlisted enough Democratic votes to insure the replacement of Dooley. But he added that Republicans felt that a speakership fight would unduly delay the opening of the session and for that reason it was decided not to go forward with the plan.

Phoenix Co. Wins Case From State

A circuit court jury Friday evening returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in a complaint brought by the Phoenix Sand and Gravel company against the state of Oregon highway department. The company was awarded \$3,356.32.

According to the original complaint filed with circuit court the company asked \$4,211.59, balance payment they claimed due them from the state for services and materials furnished.

The complaint stated that the Phoenix company was requested by the state to furnish services and materials between Aug. 1, 1956, and Oct. 8, 1956, for embankment repairs at the Torrence Creek section of acific highway in Jackson county.

The defendants held that they paid \$7,080.50 and claimed that a \$4,945 balance remained to be paid.

Attorney for the plaintiff was Sidney E. Ainsworth, Ashland.

Sputnik Rocket Said Seen Over Portland

Portland — The rocket of the Russian earth satellite, Sputnik, was reported seen by several Portlanders at 6:15 p.m. Sunday.

Clifford Moulton, scientist for Tektronix, Inc., said Portlanders may be able to catch a glimpse of the rocket about 6:08 p.m. today by looking west toward Venus and low on the horizon.

NO WORK IN RAIN

Toledo, Ohio — A man, who identified himself as a "worker tired of working in the rain," called police Saturday to report a bomb in the garbage can of City Manager Russell W. Rink. An investigation failed to turn up anything except 17 garbage cans on the city manager's front lawn. Rink is in a dispute with trash collectors over forcing them to work when it rains.

Graham Asks Ike To Tell Position

New York — Evangelist Billy Graham called on President Eisenhower Sunday night to "tell the American people exactly where we stand" on the prospect of war.

"I was told last week on good authority that there is a strong element within the Kremlin that believes that Russia should attack the United States within the next two years," he said in a sermon at the wind-up rally of his New York crusade.

He did not indicate the source of his information and did not elaborate on his statement.

Graham warned that war "seems more possible now than at any other time in the last 10 years."

"It would be most unfortunate if the President in his forthcoming speeches should say anything that would give the American people a false sense of security," he said.

"He should go on television and tell the American people exactly where we stand. He should call on us to tighten our belts and to make any sacrifices necessary to meet the challenge of world Communism."

Boy's Clothing Set Afire by Youngsters

Elizabeth, N.J. — Three youngsters doused a 14-year-old boy with kerosene Sunday and set his clothing afire.

James Kulpa suffered second degree burns on the thigh and legs.

Police said the three youths who attacked the victim and his brother, Joseph, 11, were strangers in the area.

After his clothing was set afire the boy rolled on the ground in an effort to put the blaze out. His brother wrapped his coat around him. The youths responsible fled.

NAVY STUDYING PENGUINS

Moorestown, N. J. — The U. S. Navy is seriously trying to find out how a lady penguin keeps her eggs warm, the deputy chief of naval research told a men's club here Sunday. Capt. A. A. Metzger said Naval research believes the answer may give a clue to protecting men from the bitter cold of polar regions and high altitudes.

The Navy also is studying desert birds which live on "little if any water" in order to learn more about how men stranded on life life rafts can survive, he said.
