Highway Case Rule Given By Thornton

Salem — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said Friday that members of the legislative assembly are not prohibited from acting as attorneys for defendants in state highway right-of-way condemnation proceedings.

The state constitution prohibits members of the Legislature from acting as attorneys in prosecution of claims against the state, but a federal court decision was held that right-of-way cases are not "claims" in the sense expressed by the constitution.

The opinion was asked by the State Highway Department. The Oregon Supreme Court also held in 1955 that lawyer-legislators who acted as attorneys for plaintiffs in prosecuting accident claims against the State Industrial Accident Commission were not violating the same provision of the state constitution.

Secrecy Often Breaks On New Model Cars

Detroit — The auto industry tries hard to keep its new models under wraps until they are introduced in dealerships throughout the nation, but there are usually a few slips each year such as the appearance this week of a 1958 Ford on a used car lot at Muskogee, Okla.

The new Fords aren't scheduled to go on public display until Nov. 7.

An industry spokesman pointed out it is mandatory that new models reach the dealers well in advance of introduction so the dealers have a good supply of cars to show to the public.

"Occasionally, a dealer will take it upon himself to sell a new car to a used car lot for a premium price," the spokesman said.

"There isn't much the companies can do about it since, under law, each dealer is an individual businessman and can conduct his business as he sees fit."

The spokesman said dealer franchises contain "gentlemen's" agreements, but it was doubtful any court would recognize the agreements if a company tried to take away the franchise of a dealer for selling a new car to a used car dealer prior to introduction.

A new Edsel appeared on a used car lot in Cleveland several weeks before that car made its public debut last month and the company traced the sale to a New York dealer.

The company contacted the dealer who agreed to send telegrams to all other Edsel dealers apologizing for selling the car before introduction day.

"Some used car dealers thrive on 'bootlegging' practices," the spokesman said. "They know

new cars attract crowds and try to buy them for display purposes both before and after introduction."

Premature Publicity a Problem
 The sale of new cars to used car dealers or any other unauthorized persons is referred to as "bootlegging."

Another problem which besets the auto industry is the publishing of stories and photographs before release dates.

For example, one magazine, Popular Science, reached subscribers this week and contained photographs of several 1958 cars which have not yet been introduced.

"There are usually one or two cases each year when a magazine will hit the streets with photographs of the new cars before they are introduced in dealerships," the spokesman said. "It happened once last year, and chances are it will happen next year, too."

Spy Charges Set On Master Sergeant

Washington — The Army Saturday prepared to move against an Army master sergeant who admitted selling U. S. military secrets to Russia under the stimulus of sex and vodka.

Confinement of M/Sgt. Roy A. Rhodes, 40, was disclosed by the Army following the conviction Friday in New York of Russian spy Rudolf Ivanovitch Abel.

Rhodes was a government witness in the trial of the Russian secret police colonel, who faces a possible death penalty for masterminding an espionage ring that slipped U. S. atomic and military secrets to the Soviet Union.

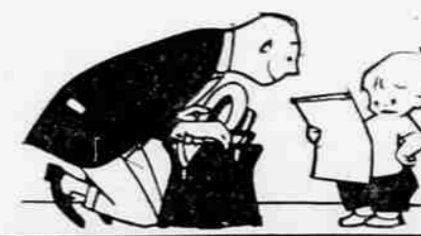

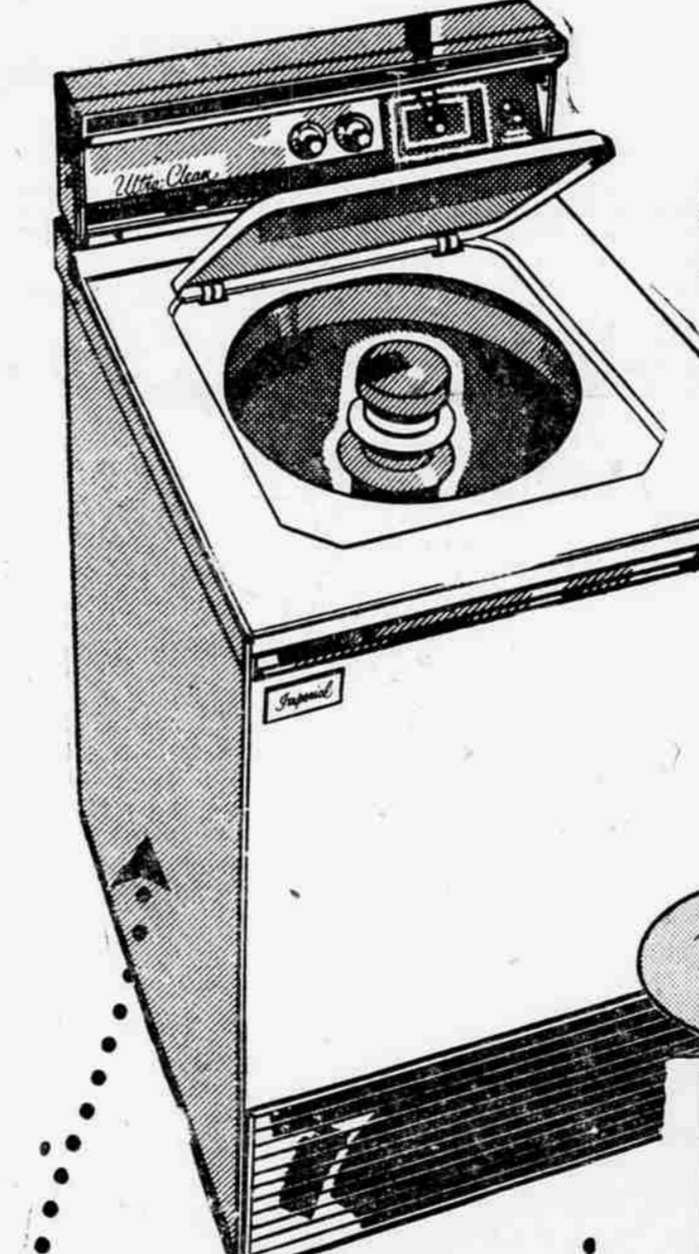
