Louis B. Mayer, Film Executive, Dies of Anemia

Hollywood — Motion picture mogul Louis B. Mayer, immigrant son of an ironmonger who became America's highest paid executive, died early today from the lingering effects of severe anemia.

Mayer, who was 72, had been suffering from the blood disorder since early this year and had undergone several transfusions recently. The reaction was complicated by a kidney infection.

Death came at 12:35 a.m. (p.s.t.) in the UCLA Medical Center.

Known As 'L.B.'

A rotund little man, Mayer—known to his intimates as "L.B."—was a one-man Horatio Alger story, starting as a seagoing junkman at the age of 14 and rising to earn a salary of \$1,296,503 in 1937, one of the largest individual paychecks ever reported by the U.S. Treasury Department.

At the height of his career as movie-maker and race horse owner, Mayer was acknowledged as the most powerful man in Hollywood. As boss of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios, the world's largest film factory, his merest whim was law to thousands and the elite of movietown respected his judgment.

Independent Producer

He resigned from MGM in 1951 and in recent years had worked as an independent producer while he waged a behind-the-scenes battle to regain control of the vast studio property at nearby Culver City through the directorship of its parent company, Loews Inc. There had been some critics who complained he failed to keep pace with the entertainment times.

He was born Louis Burt Mayer in Minsk, Russia, July 4, 1885, the son of Jacob Mayer and Sarah Meltzer Mayer. When he was two years old, his parents migrated to Canada's New Brunswick Province.

Southeast Gets Rare Cold Weather

The Southeast had the rare distinction of being one of the coldest spots in the nation overnight with readings hovering in the chilly 30s from the Ohio Valley and the Virginias southward.

Crossville, Tenn., recorded an early morning temperature of 28 degrees. By contrast, Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., usually one of the coldest spots on the weather map, basked in a mild 42-degree reading.

Southerly winds sent temperatures climbing an average of 10 degrees in the Southern Plains and the Middle Mississippi Valley and westerly winds brought the milder air over the Eastern Great Lakes region.

A high pressure area in the Southeast was responsible for the cold weather there. Wind circulation around the high brought readings into the 40s from Texas north through lower Michigan.

Mrs. Katie Sylvia Owens, 85, a native daughter of Jackson county, where she was born on Aug. 17, 1872, died in a local hospital on Monday.

She was the daughter of Miles and Sarah Wakeman and was married Nov. 10, 1893, to Charles Owens, who preceded her in death 14 years ago.

She had lived in Pleasant Creek valley in Jackson county all of her life. She is survived by one daughter, Miss Loretta Owens, at home.

Funeral services will be held at the Perl Funeral home at 10 a.m. Thursday. The Rev. William McLeod of the Sacred Heart Catholic church will officiate. Interment will be in the Woodville cemetery at Rogue River.

Flu Complications Fatal at Fairview

Salem — The first death from flu complications at Fairview home for the mentally retarded during the current outbreak was reported today.

Hospital officials said the person who died was 40 years old and had been in the institution since 1925. They added he suffered from a weak heart and that death was a combination of heart trouble and pneumonia.

There have been some 750 cases of some type of flu at Fairview home in the current outbreak, most of them mild and lasting only one or two days. Only one other patient of 433 still in bed was listed in critical condition.

The death is the second reported from flu in Oregon.

Potential Timber Harvest Estimated

Portland —(U.P.)—Oregon has more timber ready to be harvested than it suspected, according to W. D. Hagenstein, executive vice president of the Industrial Forestry association.

A recent Forest Service announcement said that Lane county had 97 million board feet of timber. In 1942 the estimate was only 64 billion.

"The importance of this," Hagenstein said, "is that the new Lane county timber estimate suggests that Oregon has more than 600 billion board feet of timber, rather than the bookkeeping estimate of 433 billion board feet made by the government in 1953."

The forester called for a speedy reinventory of Oregon's federal forests which have 60 per cent of the state's timber. If harvested each year, an increased allowable cut would bring federal timber prices down so that homebuilders would buy our products again, he said.

Last Maloney Witnesses Due

Portland —(U.P.)—Defense Attorney Howard Lonergan indicated he would finish calling witnesses today at the conspiracy trial of Thomas E. Maloney, now in its sixth week.

This would leave only state rebuttal witnesses, final arguments and instructions before the case goes to the jury.

The defense Monday recalled Raymond F. Clark, who testified he made a tape recording exhibited by the state as a three-way conversation among Maloney, ex-District Attorney William Langley and Joseph McLaughlin, Seattle cardroom operator.

Lonergan asked Clark if he did not tell Clifford O. Bennett, former after hours joint operator here, that he had altered some tapes "to make Langley back off." Clark declared he did not alter tapes and did not tell Bennett he had.

A tape recording which had been purposely altered was played for the jury Monday by Richard Leitner, a Los Angeles electronics engineer. It was of a two-way conversation which had been altered by deleting some of the statements. Bill Rohrer, a sound engineer, returned to the stand and said there was no foolproof method to determine whether a tape recording has or has not been altered.
