Defense Spending Report Lifts Market

New York — Word that the government plans to spend an additional \$400 million on defense gave the stock market a lift today.

That small sum was seen as only the beginning of additional spending on arms, particularly missiles and anti-missile missiles. Aircraft, among the first to rise, showed gains ranging to more than a point. Coppers were the real stars on hopes for bigger demand and higher prices for the metal. Their gains ranged to more than three points in Kennecott.

Airlines got into action late in the day on unconfirmed reports the Civil Aeronautics Board will agree to passenger fare increases.

Buy Less, Ike Tells Housewives

Washington — President Eisenhower today advised housewives and other consumers to buy less to combat rising living costs.

At first, he said he was afraid he would have to beg off answering a news conference request for advice on coping with the cost of living, which has risen steadily for the past 13 months.

But then he added that about all consumers can do is to buy less in a period of higher prices and increase their purchases when prices are declining. He noted that the cost of living has risen between 5 1/2 and 6 per cent in the past 4 1/2 or five years, but said he believes living costs are steady now. He attributed the slow-down mainly to the administration's monetary and anti-inflationary policies, but conceded there has not been complete success.

He said rising prices are inevitable in a system of free government and free enterprise during a period of dynamic upward surge in business activity such as employment, construction and industrial expansion. In some ways, he said, it is a bit miraculous that prices are not higher.

80-Year Valley Resident Dies

State Capital Statue Sculptor Critically Ill

Salem — Ulric Ellerhusen, sculptor who did the pioneer statue atop Oregon's state capital 20 years ago, is critically ill in a Boonton, N.J., hospital, Secretary of State Mark Hatfield said today.

The "gold man" as the statue is often termed, is cast of bronze. It is 24 feet tall, weighs eight and a half tons and is covered with gold leaf. It faces north with its head turned to the west and symbolizes the pioneers.
