Oregon State Gets Funds for Research On Heart Energy

Corvallis — How the heart gets its energy from the food people eat to pump 3,400 gallons of blood during its 100,000 beats a day is under study by Oregon State college biochemists.

Dr. Vernon H. Cheldelin, director of the Science Research Institute at OSC, said a maze of barely-understood chemical reactions take place to get energy from blood sugars.

To find the chemical pathways, Dr. Cheldelin and Dr. Robert Newburgh, OSC bio-

chemist, have been granted \$18,150 by the American Heart Association and \$2,500 by the Oregon Heart Association. OSC scientists have discovered an agent in beef heart which

is an important link in the complex process of converting food energy into muscular energy.

Catalyst Agent

This agent is called a catalyst. It speeds the blood sugar to heart muscle energy transformation by just being present, but doesn't change itself chemically.

Dr. Cheldelin estimates at least 50 complex reactions take place to convert blood sugar to heart muscle energy. Each reaction is controlled by a catalytic agent. The role these unisolated agents have in the reactions is being intensively studied.

This research will contribute knowledge on the behavior of heart tissue. Although it is too early to say, the research may eventually tell of ways to improve treatment of heart disease.

Washington — Brig. Gen. Anastasio D. Somoza, director of the Nicaraguan National Guard, is scheduled to arrive Saturday for a tour of military installations. Somoza's itinerary includes the Army Nike site at Lorton, Va.; Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md.; West Point, N.Y.; the Army Ordnance Tank Automotive Command at Detroit; the Air Force Academy in Colorado; Hoover Dam at Boulder City, Nev.; Ft. Bliss, Tex. and Ft. Sill, Okla.

'Realistic' Tax Cut Declared in Danger

Salem — Rep. Wayne Giesy, Monroe Republican, charged today that "tricky parliamentary procedure by Democratic-controlled committees in the House" is dooming any possibility of a "realistic" tax cut at the special legislative session.

Giesy said the House Taxation committee headed by Rep. Clarence Barton, Coquille Democrat, had given consideration only to the governor's bill and has refused to discuss GOP plans.

Barton countered that he was willing and eager to hear any tax ideas before his committee.

Giesy charged that parliamentary procedure was "engineered to defeat the Republicans and get by with as little tax relief as possible."
