

Oregon State Slight Favorite Over WSC

Corvallis — Oregon State, just a month ago the fifth-ranked college football team in the country, tries for its first victory in three starts Saturday in a Homecoming battle with Washington State, a team still nursing Rose Bowl hopes.

The Beavers have been established as slight favorites despite consecutive losses to UCLA and Washington.

But Oregon State still is not up to par physically. Guard Jim Brackins is out of the game with a dislocated shoulder. Fullback Nub Beamer and linemen George Enderle and Ed Kaohleuli are nursing hurts. And center Buzz Randall has had the flu this week.

Never Lost at Parker

Oregon State with try to keep intact Coach Tommy Prothro's record of never having lost a football game at Parker field.

Beaver halfback Sterling Hammack will be shooting at an all-time season punt return mark. Hammack has 222 yards while the record was set in 1940 by the late Bob Dethman who had 235 yards.

Washington State, with passers Bob Newman and Bunny Aldrich ready to throw, has lost but one conference game, that by one point to Oregon. The Cougars will miss Ed Stevens, the regular fullback out with an injury. He will be replaced by Jim Benfro, from Portland's Jefferson high.

Al Balding Golf Leader

San Diego, Calif. — The best way to shoot a good round of golf these days is to either get sick or injured or borrow a set of clubs.

Al Balding, the Canadian pro who isn't bald at all, but has a beautiful head of wavy hair, proved it again Thursday when he shaved eight strokes from par on a rain-soaked course to gain the half-way lead in the \$20,000 San Diego Open.

Balding, one of Canada's top experts in the golfing world now playing out of Miami Beach, Fla., shot a 64 to go with an opening round of 67 for a 131 total—13 under par for 36 holes.

In second place, tied with 133 scores were Fred Hawkins, the pleasant gentleman from El Paso, Tex., and Arnold Palmer, Latrobe, Pa.

At 135 were Masters Champion Doug Ford of Mahopac, N.Y.; Billy Casper, a home-town hero; Don Whit, slender young pro from Alameda, Calif., and Charles Sifford, the Negro champion from Philadelphia, Pa.

McLoughlin Takes Ninth Grade Title

McLoughlin Junior High school today laid claim to the Southern Oregon ninth grade football championship.

There is no official league but a victory by the Bulldogs, 33 to 7 over Hedrick yesterday completed an undefeated five game season. Other triumphs have been over Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and Crater.

Hedrick looked tough in the first quarter of yesterday's intracity conflict on its home turf but the Bulldogs smashed to three touchdowns in the second period to head 20 to 0 at half-time and scored on the second half kick-off and again in the fourth panel. The Hornets drove 78 yards for their lone TD in the final period.

Dick Bagdale's 38-yard punt return to the Hornet 17-yard line at the end of the first quarter set up the push into the end zone for the initial McLoughlin touchdown. Mike Hood punched to the 11 and then to the one-foot spot. Al Funston smacked the middle to score.

Long Pass Helps

The Bulldogs drove 55 yards in seven plays for the next marker. Big gain was Hood's pass to Larry Hammack good for 30 yards to the seven. Dennis Bauman hit right tackle to the two, then sliced that slot again for the score. Bob Custance toed the extra point. Hammack heaved to Funston for 54 yards and a touchdown as the half ended and Custance again booted the extra.

Ragsdale took the second half kick-off and reversed to Hood who swung wide and fought into the open, going down the west sideline to tally. Merle Hampton, Al Funston and Phil Baird converged on Hedrick kicker, Warren Parks, for a blocked punt to set up the last McLoughlin TD. The Bulldogs went 47 yards in seven plays with Phil Humphreys ripping off 23 and Funston going over right guard for the last three. Custance kicked the conversion.

Dan Sieg ran the Bulldog kick-off back to the Hornet 32 to open the Hedrick march. The promenade took 10 plays. The Hornets mixed the running of Sieg and the passing of Mike Monroe. Passes from Monroe to Art House gained eight and 24 yards and one to Bob McIntyre picked up six. Sieg skirted left end for the last 10 yards and ran over the extra point.

Bands Perform

McLoughlin had a 200 to 144 edge in net yards from scrimmage but Hedrick led eight to six in first downs.

The game has the festive air of senior high football with the bands and pep clubs of both schools combining for halftime entertainment on the field.

The junior high grid season ends Saturday with three 10 a.m. games. Hedrick eighth vies at McLoughlin. In the seventh grade intramural circuit two games are planned at the senior high practice field. The Hedrick Blues and McLoughlin Blacks meet for the title and the McLoughlin Whites face the Hedrick Reds.

Trapping Season Few Days Away

Portland — With the trapping season just a few days away, Oregon trappers may expect a good trapping season this winter and spring. Chet Kebbe, fur manager for the state game commission, said today. Populations of fur-bearing animals look good, and trappers can also look forward to greater monetary returns with a slight increase in the market fur prices.

Kebbe reminded trappers that the main season on marten, ring-tail cat, muskrat, beaver and otter will open on November 15, 1957 and run through February 15, 1958. The general season on mink will also open November 15 but will only run through January 15.

In Lake, Malheur, Harney, and Klamath counties the season on muskrat will be from November 1, 1957 through March 31, 1958. The early season opener in Lake, Harney, and Malheur counties will also be for beaver and otter, but the season will close at the regular time of February 15, 1958.

The Axemen ended Marshfield's reign as the state kingpin last Saturday with a 9-0 victory and are heavily favored to defeat North Bend and remain the state title favorite.

Other teams, which took on new hope with Marshfield's first loss in 41 games, will seek to continue their march to state playoffs. One vital game matches McMinnville and West Linn, two of the six unbeaten-untied class A-1 schools in the state.

Jefferson and Grant, Portland's two unbeaten powers, meet Franklin and Madison, respectively.

Other top games send Cottage Grove to Springfield, Benson to Lincoln, Tillamook to Grants Pass, Roseburg to Marshfield, Ashland to Medford, Klamath Falls to Crater, Pendleton to Baker, Hermiston to La Grande, Ontario to Vale, Corvallis to Albany and North Salem to Fort Vancouver.

Webb Opposes Vaughn Tonight

New York — Middleweight contender Spider Webb, seeking a little more lustre that might get him a shot at the 160-pound crown, fights Willie Vaughn at Madison Square Garden tonight.

The 10-rounder between boxer-puncher Webb of Chicago and left-hooker Vaughn of Los Angeles will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC at 7 p.m. (PST).

Both men — Webb, 26, and Vaughn, 24 — are rangy middleweights and skilled boxers who can fight from the upright or bob-and-weave. But the Spider is a long favorite over the unranked middleweight champion of California because of his punch and his ruggedness.

Coast League To Convene at Sacramento

Sacramento, Calif. — "All shook up," appeared to be the best way to describe the Pacific Coast league today as the 55-year-old circuit met to discuss realignment and how much damages it should get for major league invasion.

Leslie O'Connor, president of the league, said Thursday that "99 per cent of the meeting" would center around the notice of intent by the Giants and Dodgers to draft the league's key cities of San Francisco and Los Angeles.

In the meantime, Mayor Adiel F. Stewart of Salt Lake City planned to attend in a bid to obtain either the Los Angeles, Hollywood or Sacramento franchises which figure to get dislodged by the arrival of big time ball.

Technically, the league has to vote on whether or not to approve a transaction whereby the Giants bought the San Francisco Seals franchise from the Red Sox. It also has to vote on the Giants plan to shift that franchise to Phoenix, which already is a member of the Class C Arizona-Texas League.

Salmon Fishery At Winchester Has Top Year

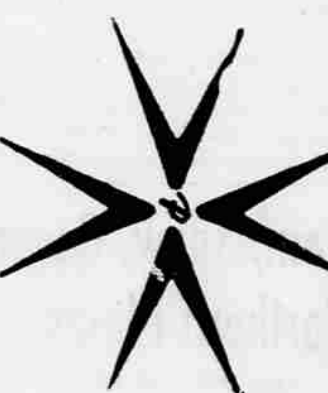
Portland — The salmon sport fishery at Winchester Bay this summer topped all previous seasons in total effort and catch by a wide margin, it was reported today by Bill Saltzman and Jerry Bauer, game commission fishery agents, who compiled the final statistics for this year's angling. The catch numbered nearly 50,000 salmon taken by some 46,000 angler trips.

A total of 45,829 anglers gave the big salmon a whirl at Winchester Bay and latched onto 49,789 fish. The fisheries began in earnest in May, built to a peak in July, August and September, and slackened off rapidly by the first of October.

Due to improved facilities, the largest number of anglers ever recorded participated in the Winchester Bay fishery. The widespread publicity and the \$1 per day angling license was a probable inducement for more people to fish.

The total effort and catch were obtained, as in former years, by projecting the catch statistics obtained by periodic creel census onto the total effort as obtained by the daily boat count of the U. S. Coast Guard.

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
