

Dancers Coming For Civic Music

First concert scheduled for 1957-58 program of the Jackson County Civic Music association will be given Saturday, November 9, at 8 p.m. at the High school auditorium. It will feature Nora Kovach and Istvan Rabovsky, ballet dancers.

The two dancers will be remembered by many because of the story of their escape from behind the Iron Curtain in May 1953. Since that time they have performed in New York, Paris, London, Brussels, Lisbon and Barcelona.

They both studied at the Buda and were widely acclaimed in Russia prior to their escape.

Also appearing on the program will be Sonia Arova and Job Sanders. Miss Arova, who in private life is Mrs. Job Sanders, started dancing at the age of five in Bulgaria. She studied in Paris and appeared with the International Ballet, London's Festival Ballet, and Komaki Ballet in Tokyo. She is a member of Ballet Theater and last year was a guest artist with the Chicago Lyric Theater Ballet in Chicago and New York.

Mr. Sanders studied dance both in Holland, where he was born, and New York. He was a member of the Ballet de Monte Carlo and The Ballet Theatre, and is classed by many as one of the most promising of the younger choreographers.

Accompanying the dancers at the pianos will be Howard Barr and Julian Elbaz. The Steinway pianos will be loaned through the courtesy of Purucker's Piano house.

The other concerts scheduled by the Civic Music association include Robert Mueller, pianist, December 9; Pilar Lorenz, soprano, February 21; and Rudie Sinfonietta with vocal soloists and harpist, May 4.

Admission to the concerts is by membership tickets only.

Duchess Pears... a real adventure in eating is in store for you. Canned pear halves are at their juicy best when nestled in creamy chocolate filling in meringue shells. Chopped nuts do the finishing-off honors. If meringue shells are not available and you don't want to make them, use packaged individual sponge short-cakes.

Duchess Pears
1 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
3 tablespoons boiling water
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ cup whipping cream
4 meringue shells, or sponge shortcakes
4 canned pear halves
½ cup coarsely chopped nuts

Combine chocolate and water in saucepan; heat over hot water until chocolate is melted; cool. Fold in vanilla and whipped cream. Spoon into meringue shells and top with pear halves and nuts. Four servings.

Be adventuresome with these fillings for meringues, too:
(1) Pistachio ice cream and canned blueberries or raspberries.
(2) Lemon pudding with canned fruit cocktail or pineapple tidbits.
(3) Cubed cherry flavored gelatin folded into whipped cream with canned sliced peaches.

American Women More Modest Than Men, Publisher Declares

Chicago — American women are much more modest than the men. That's one of the first conclusions drawn by the editors of "Who's Who," now busy compiling the first edition of "Who's Who of American Women," to be published sometime next year.

"We've already had replies from over 12,000 outstanding women requested by us to supply personal data," says Wheeler Sammons, Jr., associate publisher of "Who's Who in America." "and, outside of their exceptional responsiveness to the idea of this new Who's Who for women alone, that's the big thing we've noticed about them: their modesty."

"Who's Who of American Women" is a book designed to honor upward of 20,000 ladies whose achievement is substantial but not quite on the level of the requirement for including their names in "Who's Who in America." Women VIP's already in "Who's Who in America" will also be included.

Mr. Sammons, who has spent over 20 years in the biographical reference field, adds: "Biographical sketches sent us by the men in 'Who's Who in America' contain all sorts of odds and ends of which the men are clearly very proud but which, if we included, would double the size of 'Who's Who,' already a huge book."

Know Your Library Month Is Observed

For the fourth consecutive year "Know Your Library Month" is being observed by many units of the General Federation of Women's Clubs during November, 1957.

Mrs. Robert F. Herring, librarian, Lincoln County Free Library, Libby, Mont., this year rounds out her second term as chairman of the GFWC libraries division.

The observance, a feature of the "Know and Grow" program of the federation, provides an opportunity for the 5½ million GFWC members to visit their public libraries to learn to know them better and finds ways to help them grow. Jackson county women's clubs have been invited to schedule library tours during the month, according to County Librarian Miss Helen Webster. Miss Webster also pointed out the library's selection of books written especially to help clubwomen, of which the most recently published is "The Clubwoman's Manual," by Kate and Isabel Monro.

As a special feature of the month the library plans to present a television broadcast of the film, "Books for All," the date to be announced later as the film becomes available on loan from the state library.

Among the many helpful manuals on business organization and management is J. Martindell's "The Scientific Appraisal of Management; a Study of Business Practices of the Independent Businessman, James Gemmell's "Business Organization and management," J. K. Lasser's "Business Management Handbook," and R. F. Neuschell's "Streamlining Business Procedures" are other recent books on the subject.

Recent material is also available on sales promotion, advertising, bookkeeping and accounting, personnel management, business law, business forms, business letters, and business taxes.

Any of the books may be borrowed through any agency of the Jackson county library system.
