Elmer Baker Funeral Held

Rogue River—Frank Elmer Baker, a resident of this community for the past 20 years, died at a hospital in Grants Pass Tuesday, Oct. 23, at the age of 79.
Mr. Baker was born Mar. 25, 1878, in Hale, Mo. His wife preceded him in death two years ago.
The deceased leaves a daughter, Esther A. Fitzgerald, Rogue River; two sons, Alva C. of Rogue River and Ira L. of Riverside, Calif.; two brothers, Louis, of Raymond, Wash., and Ralph, also of the state of Washington; two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Stewart, Centralia, Wash., and Mrs. Leland Fischer, San Jose, Calif.; two grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.
The funeral was held Friday at 2 p.m. in the Hope Presbyterian church, with the Rev. D. F. Barnett officiating. Interment was in the Woodville cemetery.
