

Oregon Webfoots 12 Point Choice Over Washington

New York—(U)—Texas A&M, Oklahoma and Auburn—the top dogs of college football—are favored to extend their unbeaten and untied records through another weekend of head-knocking.

The Aggies, who replaced Oklahoma as the top-ranked team in this week's United Press ratings, are picked to defeat Southern Methodist by at least two touchdowns.

Oklahoma is an 18-point favorite to make Missouri its 47th consecutive victim, and third-ranked Auburn is the choice by eight points over Mississippi.

All other members of the United Press top 10 are favored by at least one touchdown. Michigan State is a 14-point pick over Notre Dame, Iowa is 7 over Minnesota, Ohio State is 7 over Purdue, Army is a prohibitive "out" choice over Utah, Navy is 6 over Duke, Michigan is 6 over Illinois, Oregon is 12 over Washington, and Tennessee is 9 over Georgia Tech.

Three games were rated as toss ups—Nebraska at Iowa State, Villanova at Detroit and South Carolina at North Carolina. In games with one-point spreads, Indiana was favored over Cincinnati, Arkansas over Rice and UCLA over Washington State.

Here are the point spreads for other leading Saturday games by sections:

East—Boston College 4 over Boston University; Dartmouth 19 over Columbia; Brown 4 over Cornell; Princeton 14 over Harvard; Yale 7 over Penn; Syracuse 7 over Holy Cross; West Virginia 6 over Pittsburgh.

Sebo Said Out at Penn

Philadelphia—(U)—Although his contract has two more years to run, Steve Sebo will be fired as head football coach at the University of Pennsylvania at the end of the current season.

The United Press learned Tuesday that Sebo's status reached the university's highest echelon following Penn's defeat by Harvard last Saturday. It was Penn's sixth straight setback this year and the first time in 54 years the Quakers had lost to Harvard.

Last Straw Under Sebo, Penn has won only four of its last 33 games. And that loss to Harvard was the final straw, a source close to the Penn head office disclosed.

Named head coach at Penn when George Munger resigned at the close of the 1953 season, Sebo completed his first three-year contract last year. He was then reappointed for another three years in the face of bitter opposition by the alumni.

Bus Eaton Would Like Record Back

Roseburg—(U)—Bus Eaton, who lost his world's marathon bowling record this week, wants it back.

Tom Baird Jr., 35, Middletown, Ohio, went 286 straight games to pass Eaton's mark of 280 games set a couple of weeks ago.

Eaton, who is working for the city street department here now, said he wanted to try again. "I know I can do better," he said. It took him 49 hours and 15 minutes to roll his 280 games. Baird took 65 hours to roll 286 games.

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Red Raiders To Oppose Seattle Club

Ashland — "Seattle's top independent amateur football team," the Seattle Ramblers, will invade the domain of the Southern Oregon college Red Raiders, this Saturday at 8 p.m.

The Red Raiders, who have won three out of four games on Fuller field this fall and received their only loss of the campaign at home, expect perhaps their toughest game of the season.

Boasting personnel from all over the northwest, including several large universities and colleges in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, the Ramblers will arrive on the SOC campus with an unblemished record for the current season. Known as "the goodwill ambassadors" of football the Seattle club is in its 7th season as an independent team.

Don Sprinkle, head coach for the Ramblers, tutors as a hobby, and earns his paycheck as an assistant sheriff in King county, Wash. Taking a well earned rest from practice sessions the SOC Red Raiders were given Monday and Tuesday to recuperate from last Saturday afternoon's hard fought free for all with the Eastern Oregon college Mounties, after which Southern Oregon became undisputed Oregon collegiate conference champions.

Although the EOC club was able to hold the Red Raiders to a scoreless tie coach Al Akins said Tuesday that he was not dissatisfied with the teams effort. Akins said he believed the Red Raiders played a good hard ball game but were unable to gain a scoring opportunity because of ball control tactics of the EOC team.

"Let them have their moral victory, we'll take the Oregon Collegiate conference championship," commented Akins.

"Roadin' Ron Maurer, SOC's answer to Alan 'the Horse' Ameche, received several bruised ribs in the Eastern Oregon tilt but is expected to be ready to meet the Ramblers Saturday.

Saturday night's match will be the Red Raiders final home game.

Ted Bates Gets Praise

Corvallis — Coach Tommy Prothro singled out tackle Ted Bates for a little praise Tuesday as the Oregon State Beavers prepared for Saturday's game against the University of California Bears at Berkeley.

"Ted played the best game against Washington State last Saturday that I have ever seen turned in by a college lineman," Prothro said. "Our line dominated the game — and Bates dominated the line."

Joey Giardello Defeats Graves

Denver — (U)—Joey Giardello said today he did his best to make a fight of it in his simple unanimous victory over young Wilf Graves in a 10-round middleweight bout at Denver Tuesday night.

He couldn't say the same for his 21-year-old Canadian opponent who fights out of Pittsburgh. "It takes two to make a fight you know," Giardello said when questioned about the boozing that echoed through the Denver Coliseum. "I think I did my part."

Now, Giardello wants to meet one of the top middleweights—Champion Carmen Basilio or Gene Fullmer, former champion. Giardello is third-ranked contender behind Sugar Ray Robinson and Fullmer.

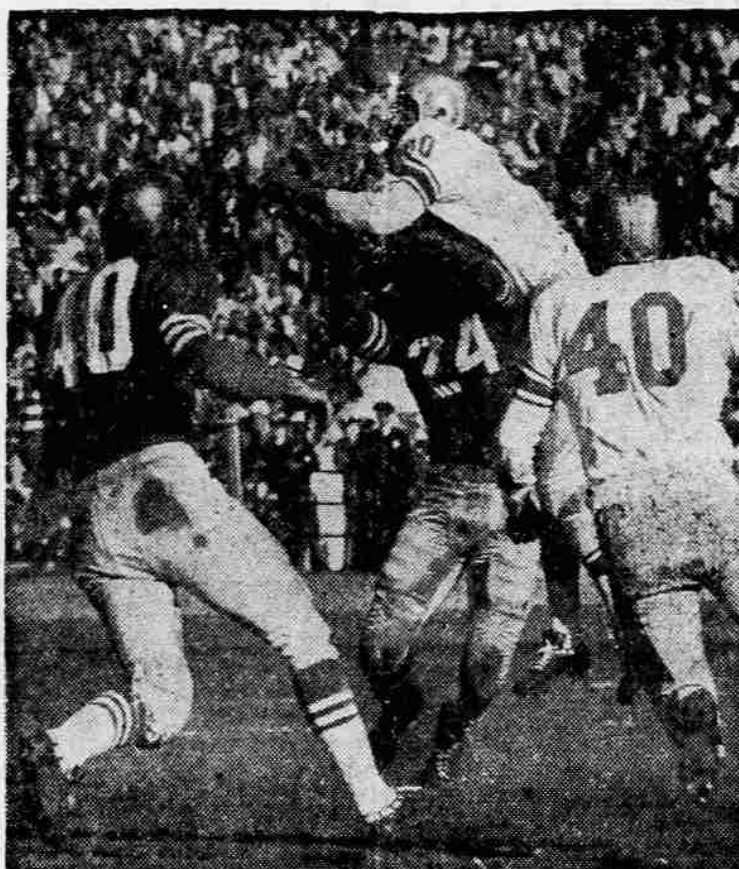
Prexy Optimistic About NW Loop

Bob Newman Has National Total Offense Leadership

New York — (U)—Bob Newman of Washington State reaped his reward today for his brilliant performance in last Saturday's 39-25 loss to Oregon State when he went into the lead in the major college individual total offense lead.

Newman, who completed 17 of 25 passes for 243 yards and three touchdowns, has amassed a total of 1,001 yards in seven games. That puts him 27 yards ahead of Utah State's Bob Winters and 43 ahead of Colorado's Bob Stranksy. Navy's Tom Forrestal ranks fourth and Iowa State's Tom Nichols is fifth.

Stranksy has taken a solid hold on the rushing lead with 764 yards in seven games compared to the second-place figure of 676 yards by Jim Bakhtiar, Virginia's Persian prince. Arizona State's Leon Burton is third and New Mexico's Don Perkins is fourth.

Baker Paces Passing Furman's Billy Baker is the current leader in passing but is likely to drop out of the No. 1 spot next Saturday because he does not play. Baker has completed 70 of 115 passes for 709 yards and five touchdowns.

Huskies Prep Defenses

Seattle, Wash. — (U)—The University of Washington Huskies devoted two hours to heavy contact work Tuesday to prepare a defense against Oregon's heralded running attack, which the Huskies face Saturday at Portland.

Coach Jim Owens named fullback Jim Jones and guard Whitey Core as co-captains for the game. They sparked the team against Oregon State as Washington scored its only victory of the season.

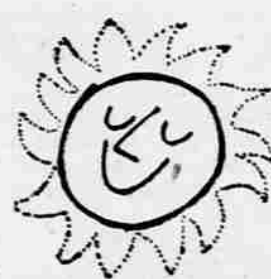

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Pro Squads Have Many Game Units

National Football league fans can add to their enjoyment by trying to check how many different platoons their various heroes play on during a game.

Take a good look next time if you think pro performers play only on offense or defense and have lots of idle time during a game.

The New York Giants merely dramatized a standard procedure last Sunday by using offensive line stars Roosevelt Brown and Jack Stroud on defense to help stop four Green Bay Packers smashes from the one-yard line.

New York has eight different lineups for various situations in each game. The other 11 NFL clubs have as many—or more.

Besides its regular offensive and defensive units, New York has a kickoff team, kickoff return unit, place-kicking team, punt return unit, a special defensive lineup for goal-line stands and one which they use on defense when they have a big lead. The latter features the club's fastest men to defend against a shower of passes.

Brown, a 245-pounder from Morgan State who was drafted 27th by the Giants in 1953, probably is their most versatile performer. He is listed as the offensive left tackle, where he won all-league honors last season.

The Cleveland Browns, who sometimes use a special offensive lineup of big men when inside an opponent's 10-yard line, are seven point favorites against the Pittsburgh Steelers at Cleveland in next Sunday's key game.

In Sunday's other games: The Giants are nine-point choices to beat the Chicago Cardinals at New York, the Bears are favored over the Packers by eight at Chicago, the Rams are favored over the San Francisco Forty-Niners by 2½ at Los Angeles, the Detroit Lions are favored by four against the Eagles at Philadelphia and the Baltimore Colts are one-point choices against the Redskins at Washington.

New Portland Skipper Arrives

Portland—(U)—Tommy Heath, hired as the Portland Beavers' new field and general manager, arrived in town Tuesday determined to get Portland out of the second division and to present a club with fan appeal.

Heath said he believed the Pacific Coast league would be strengthened in the upcoming realignment, although he said he didn't know just how many new cities the loop would acquire.

Tied In First Tuesday night's victory squared the Hawk's record at 3-3 and sent them into a first-place tie with idle Cincinnati in the circuit's Western Division.

The champion Boston Celtics ran their unbeaten streak to six games in the opener of the doubleheader at St. Louis' Kiel Auditorium by whipping the Detroit Pistons, 111-105.

The Celtics' sixth straight win enabled them to open up a two and a half game lead on New York in the Eastern division.

Moore, 192, floored Cotton, 177½, three times but was tired and blowing at the finish.

Moore forced the fight nearly all the way but had to go all out

to keep pace with Cotton over the last five rounds. The champion decked Cotton once in the third, and twice in the fifth, all for nine counts.

Ducks Out To Clinch At Least Tie Eugene, Ore. — (U)—The University of Oregon Ducks are working hard toward what they hope will be a big day Saturday—their first victory over Washington in 10 years in Portland's Multnomah Stadium, and at least a tie for the PCC championship.

Coach Len Casanova ordered a combination offense-defense workout for his squad and announced that sophomore guard Larry Newsom would replace center Dave Fish, who received a broken hand in the Stanford game.

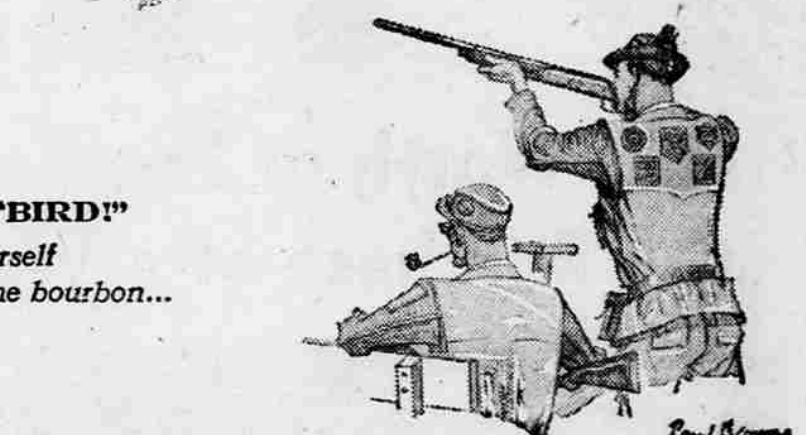
