## Tax, Legal Experts To Get Testimony On Rackets Probe

Washington — The Senate Rackets Committee Chairman John L. McClellan said today portions of testimony given on anti-union practices by management will be sent to the Internal Revenue Bureau and Justice Department.

McClellan said the transcript should "interest" both tax agents and legal experts.

The Arkansas Democrat would up the management phase of the hearings Tuesday, declaring they had shown activities that "reflect a great discredit on some business firms in this country."

McClellan said there are no present plans to produce more witnesses such as Nathan W. Shefferman, whose firm—Labor Relations Associates, Inc.—was pictured as an instrument for management improprieties against labor in two weeks of testimony.

The chairman said, however, the committee will continue to expose any additional irregularities it finds involving business or labor.

McClellan commented that the committee's proposed inquiry into the labor dispute involving the Kohler Co., at Kohler, Wis., will involve charges of improper activity against management and against the United Auto Workers Union. He said hearings starting Tuesday on garbage handling in New York City will explore the role of management as well as labor.

The chairman said the committee, which has focused in the past on improper activities of labor leaders, is now on notice that some managements are just as "unscrupulous" and their practices just as "improper."

### FLY IN SERVICE

Frankfurt, Germany — The U.S. Army in Europe has reported 29,000 flu cases so far this year and the Air Force 12,600 as of Oct. 30, it was announced today. There have been no deaths due to flu among U.S. servicemen or civilians stationed with the armed services in Europe.

## GOP Warned of Elections Fight

Washington — The White House today warned Republicans that in the light of Tuesday's election results they would have a "fight on their hands if victory is to be achieved in the 1958 elections."

The White House statement, issued with the approval of President Eisenhower but not in his name, said two Republican victories in congressional races in New Jersey and Pennsylvania were a source of "real gratification."

The statement was issued by the acting press secretary, Anne Wheaton. It said:

"It is clear that the Republican party and its candidates have a fight on their hands if victory is to be achieved in the 1958 elections."

"In both New Jersey and Virginia, the gubernatorial candidates, Malcolm Forbes and Ted Dalton, waged a vigorous campaign."

"There is real gratification in the special election of two Republican candidates for Congress in New Jersey and Pennsylvania—Milton W. Glenn in the First district of New Jersey, and John A. Lafore Jr., in Pennsylvania's 13th district."

## Mars Flying Boats Offered For Sale

Alameda, Calif. — Christmas is just around the corner—so why not pick up a 74-ton Martin Mars flying boat for a friend.

The Navy announced Tuesday that four of the giant seaplanes will go on public auction at the Alameda Naval Air station in December.

There's a good chance you'll get a record holder, too. One of the planes set a still existing record by lifting a payload of 68,327 pounds and another holds the non-stop record of 4,728 miles from Honolulu to Chicago.

The seaplanes carried more than 200,000 passengers and 20,000 tons of freight without a single accident during their 10 years of service—but are now replaced by newer and faster Convair R3Y Tradewinds flying boats.

## Traffic Accidents Claim Four Lives In State Tuesday

Portland — Traffic accidents claimed the lives of four persons in northwest Oregon on Tuesday and another died in a hospital from injuries suffered in an earlier accident.

Robert Durward Hodge, 46, McMinnville, was killed and two others were injured in a collision at the intersection of the Sheridan-Willamina bypass and the Sheridan-Buell road. Hodge was president of the Hodge Brothers Lumber company, Grande Ronde. Injured were Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Edward Bourn of Dallas. Mrs. Bourn was reported in serious condition in a McMinnville hospital.

### Fourth Bypass Death

It was the fourth traffic death on the bypass. Two women were killed near the same spot about two weeks ago and a high school student died in a bypass accident in October.

Hanz Christensen, 86, Portland, was killed when struck by a car. State police said he walked in front of the vehicle.

Mrs. Theda Fae Black, 37, Oswego, was killed when her car struck a concrete post on SW Harbor drive in Portland. It was the city's 36th 1957 traffic fatality.

### Troutdale Man Dead

Clare Adair Birtchett, 35, of Troutdale, was found dead in his car at the bottom of a 13-foot embankment on Blue lake road just north of NE Sandy boulevard. Deputy sheriffs said he apparently lost control of the car or fell asleep at the wheel.

Forrest A. Anderson, 34, Government Camp, died in a hospital from injuries suffered Friday when his car skidded off the highway about a mile east of Rhododendron.

### TO REFLOAT LINER

Cork, Ireland — Work was begun today on the re-floating of the 10,000-ton Greek liner Neptunia which struck Daunt Rock off the coast of Ireland Saturday. A Greek line official said the liner, now settled in the mud of Cork Harbor, would be re-floated probably by Nov. 13.

## Lumber Industry Gets Shot in Arm

Salem — State Treasurer Sig Unander informed his Salem office Tuesday that Oregon's lagging lumber industry got a "shot in the arm" when the U.S. Budget Bureau apportioned an additional \$375,000 that will enable the U.S. Forest Service to speed up the sale of timber from national forests in Oregon and Washington.

Unander, conferring with administration officials in Washington, said the forest service can start immediately to process 400 million feet of timber for sale on public bid. The \$375,000 appropriation includes \$25,000 for processing sales and \$150,000 for roads, surveys and designs.

Although the appropriation is for region six of the forest service, covering Oregon and Washington, the major share of the timber to be sold will be in the Douglas fir belt of western Oregon where more of the forests are located, Unander said. There will be some pine involved.

Forest service officials said the appropriation will make it possible to increase the processing program by 40 million feet between now and June 30, 1958. Gross value of the timber involved was estimated at \$12 million.

## Boys Apprehended for Theft of Car Keys

City police apprehended two boys, a 14 and 15-year-old, Monday night in connection with the theft of 12 sets of car keys from Medford new and used cars lots in the past week.

Police said the boys were seen by employees at Dean and Taylor used car lot, 130 West Sixth st., sitting in parked cars. When the cars were checked, keys were missing they told police. Later in the day another car dealer reported keys were missing from several 1958 models which were on the showroom floor.

One dealer recalled the last name of one of the boys and police were able to trace the pair by their descriptions. Police said the boys were recently involved in a series of petty thefts.

## Portland Man Killed In Arizona Auto Wreck

Phoenix, Ariz. — Orion James West Smith, 54, a Portland, Ore., postal clerk, died from injuries suffered in an automobile accident here Tuesday night.

Police said Smith was riding in a car driven by his son-in-law, Charles C. Palmer, 26, Phoenix. The car was struck from behind at a downtown intersection.

## Mysterious New Space Signals Being Studied

Washington — Powerful radio receivers tilted skyward today to tune in on a mysterious new signal from space.

The Federal Communications Commission alerted its monitoring stations to try and fix the origin of the signal.

Ham operators across the nation reported hearing the signal on 14,286 kilocycles. The sound was variously described as a series of dots, a low moan, and "some kind of code group."

An FCC spokesman said the commission had received reports of "interference" on 14,286 kilocycles. The spokesman pointed out that the frequency is far removed from the frequency on which the Sputnik II radio operates.

### Not Classified

The spokesman denied reports that the information was "classified" or "declassified." He said it has no classification.

He also pointed out that all interference on radio frequencies is investigated by the FCC. He said he did not know why the interference had been linked in some reports with the new satellite, which broadcasts on 20 and 40 megacycles.

The spokesman said that when the Russians launched Sputnik I the FCC's 18 monitoring units throughout the country picked up the signals and other information and turned it over to the U. S. satellite project.

## Pilot Overdue At Pendleton

Pendleton — A California pilot was overdue today on a flight from Condon, Ore., to Pendleton and an aerial search was under way.

Missing was Lemuel Kelso, 30, an aerial photographer for the Mark Hurd Mapping service of Santa Barbara, Calif., the Civil Aeronautics administration said.

Kelso took off from Pendleton Tuesday at 10:45 a.m. for Condon with a minister from Pendleton, and landed there, starting the 80-mile return trip to Pendleton, alone about 11:15 a.m.

At 12:20 p.m. he radioed the Pendleton CAA tower, speaking in an excited voice and yelling instructions which the tower could not understand.

The plane, a single engine Cessna 172, belonged to Pendleton Skyways. Kelso was flying a chartered trip to take the minister to Condon.

Five search planes were in the air this morning.

## 'Warm Up' of No Value To Athletes

Santa Barbara, Calif. — The warm-up period long thought to be an assist to athletes has been shown to have no value. The "cold" athletes did just as well as the "warmed up" ones.

Even in specific test activities the warm-up did not help. For speed, the athletes were required to ride one-tenth mile on a bicycle ergometer; for strength to throw a soft ball the maximum distance; and for accuracy to score as many successful basketball free throws as possible in ten tries.

In all, 360 tests were tried by the researchers, but no proof that warming-up increases any of the three abilities was found.

## Mamie's Health Said Not Factor

Washington — The White House denied today that Mrs. Eisenhower's health is a factor in the President's decision not to pay a state visit to Britain this year.

Acting Press Secretary Anne Wheaton said the President probably will not be able to visit London in connection with his December trip to Paris for the NATO "summit" conference.

"The President would like to go to London sometime later on," Mrs. Wheaton said, "but it does not look as if he would go there on this trip." She said he will need to get back on the job in Washington immediately after the NATO meeting.

She pointed out that a London visit, repaying Queen Elizabeth's good will visit to the U. S. last month, never has been definitely scheduled.

Asked if Mrs. Eisenhower's health was the real reason for deferring the suggested London visit, as British government of-

ficials said, Mrs. Wheaton replied, "None whatsoever."

Mrs. Eisenhower underwent surgery last summer. She has appeared in good health in recent public appearances.

## Chinese Red Leader Warns Against War

Tokyo — A top Chinese Communist leader warned today that any war started by the West in the Mid-east would end in "ignominious failure."

The blunt warning to the "U.S. imperialists and their henchmen" was made by Liu Shao-chi, chairman of the powerful standing committee of China's National Peoples Congress.

Liu issued the warning in a major speech in Peiping where a mass rally was held to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Russian Revolution.

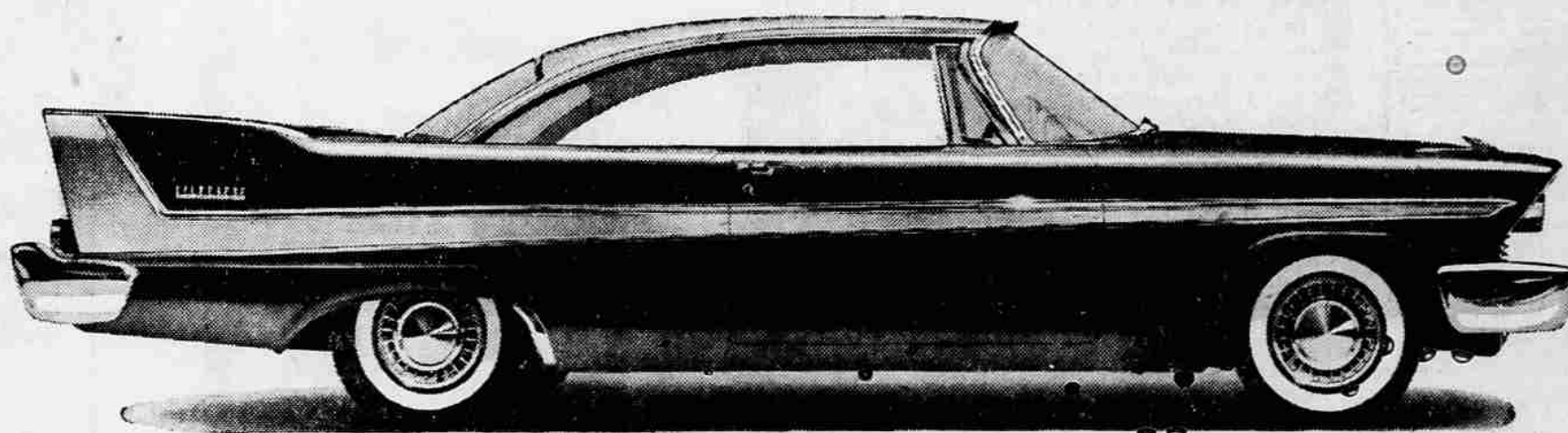
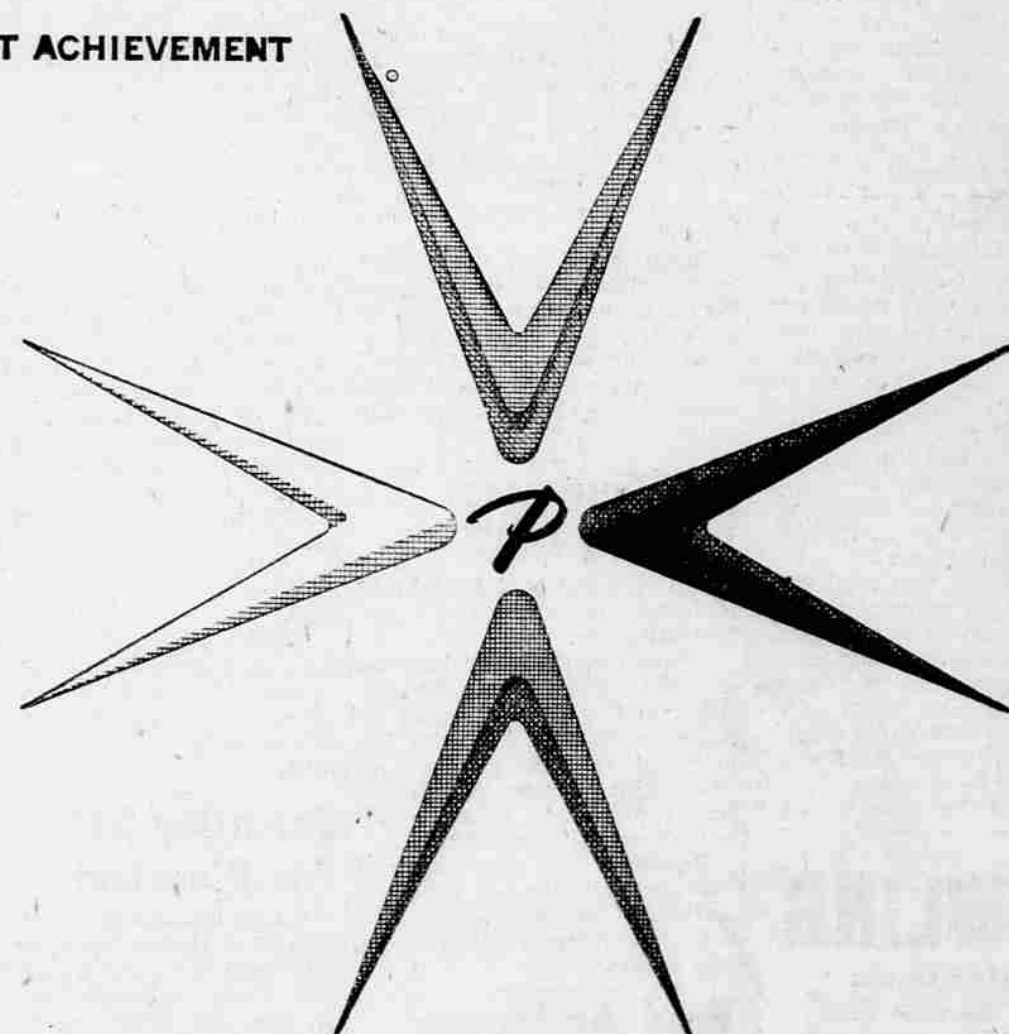
