of the field and gasoline apparently was used. Medford students were cautioned yesterday not to make any "reprisal" in Grants Pass. Oregon School Activities association regulation forbid such incidents. Rumors that a fire had been set in a grandstand at Grants Pass were quashed this morning. GP was also painted on the back of the Hedrick Junior High school building. Hedrick and Grants Pass eighth grades play Saturday. Possibility that the jobs were "local" seemed strong.

NCAA Group To Clarify Regulations

Kansas City, Mo.—Walt Byers, executive secretary of the National Collegiate Athletic association, said today a committee will be created to clarify NCAA rules on aid to prep students.

Byers made the announcement after officials at Annapolis admitted they might be breaking current NCAA rules by allowing prep students to receive aid from Navy alumni.

Committee members for the new group, set up at the NCAA council meeting in October, have not yet been named.

Naval academy officials have appeared before the NCAA council to discuss the problem, Byers said, but "it is not a case of the NCAA council attempting to find a solution for only one member institution."

At Annapolis, Rear Admiral William R. Smedley, Academy superintendent, said the Academy was attempting to work out its differences with the NCAA.

Involves Prep Students
Commander Marcy Dupre said the question involved prep, students at such institutions as Bullis Preparatory near Annapolis.

About 90 per cent of the Navy's students, he said, were graduates of schools such as Bullis or the Navy's School for Enlisted Men from the fleet at Bainbridge, Md.

Some prospective athletes at Bullis received aid from the Naval Academy Alumni association, Dupre said. However, under the Academy's understanding of the rules, he said, an individual can grant aid to a student but it is not clear whether a group, such as the alumni association, can do so.

Sooners Out To Nail Spot in Orange Bowl

The University of Oklahoma, battle-scarred in its last two football games but still boasting a 46-game winning streak, tries to nail down an Orange Bowl berth Saturday against up-and-coming Missouri.

Oklahoma is an 18-point favorite despite Missouri's 3-1 overall record and 3-0 in Big Eight play. Missouri has lost only to Texas A&M, which displaced Oklahoma this week as the nation's No. 1 team in the United Press ratings. Since Bud Wilkinson became Oklahoma coach in 1947, the Sooners have played 63 conference games without a loss.

The other Orange Bowl team is sure to be Duke, unbeaten in the Atlantic Coast Conference but a six-point underdog this week to Navy.

Bowl Possibilities

Other possible bowl lineups:
Rose: Oregon vs. Ohio State or Michigan State. Oregon, 5-0 in the Pacific Coast conference, is favored by 12 points over Washington. Ohio State, 4-0 in the Big Ten, is a seven-point choice over Purdue. Michigan State is picked by 14 points over Notre Dame, which shows signs of reeling under a murderous schedule.

Cotton: Texas A&M or Texas vs. Navy, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Tennessee or Georgia Tech. Favorites Saturday include Texas A&M by 12 points over Southern Methodist, Texas by 11 over Baylor, Mississippi by 11 over Louisiana State, Auburn probably the best team in the South but a bowl ineligible by 8 over Mississippi State and Tennessee by 7 over Georgia Tech. The most attractive Cotton Bowl pairing would be Texas A&M-Navy.

Sugar and Gator: The same teams in the running for the Cotton Bowl are possibilities here, too, except that Navy won't play in the Sugar Bowl because of Louisiana segregation laws. The Gator Bowl also might be interested in West Virginia, a six-point favorite over Pittsburgh this week. Boston College, a four-point choice over Boston University, and Syracuse, a seven-point favorite over Holy Cross.

Regionally televised games include Navy-Duke at Baltimore, Oregon-Washington at Portland, Ore., Purdue at Ohio State, South Carolina at North Carolina with North Carolina favored by one point, Arkansas at Rice—Arkansas favored by one point, and Nebraska at Iowa State with betting "even money."

Miami of Florida is the choice over Florida State Friday night in the first major game of the weekend.

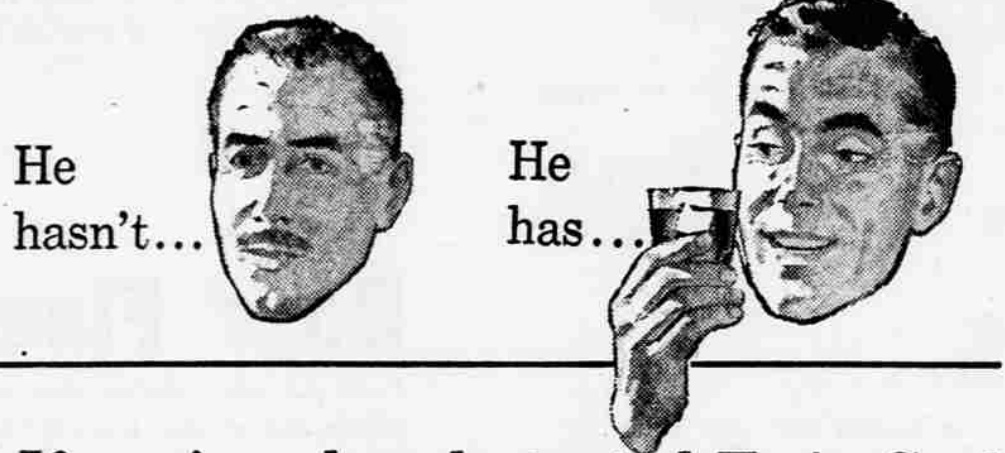

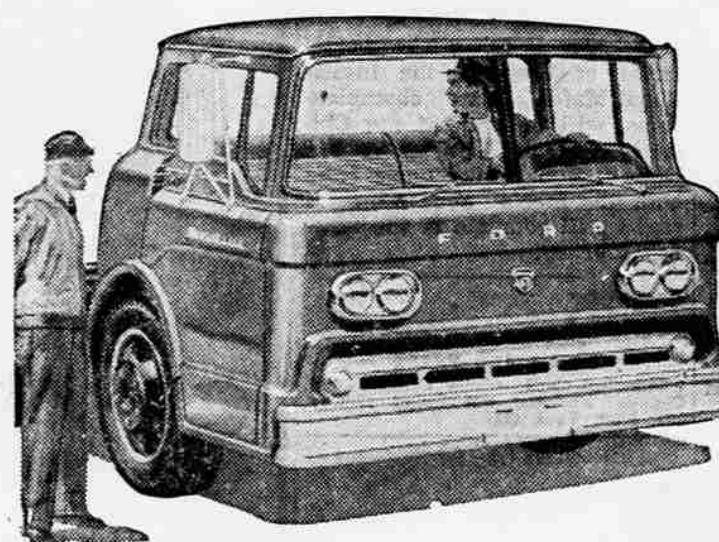

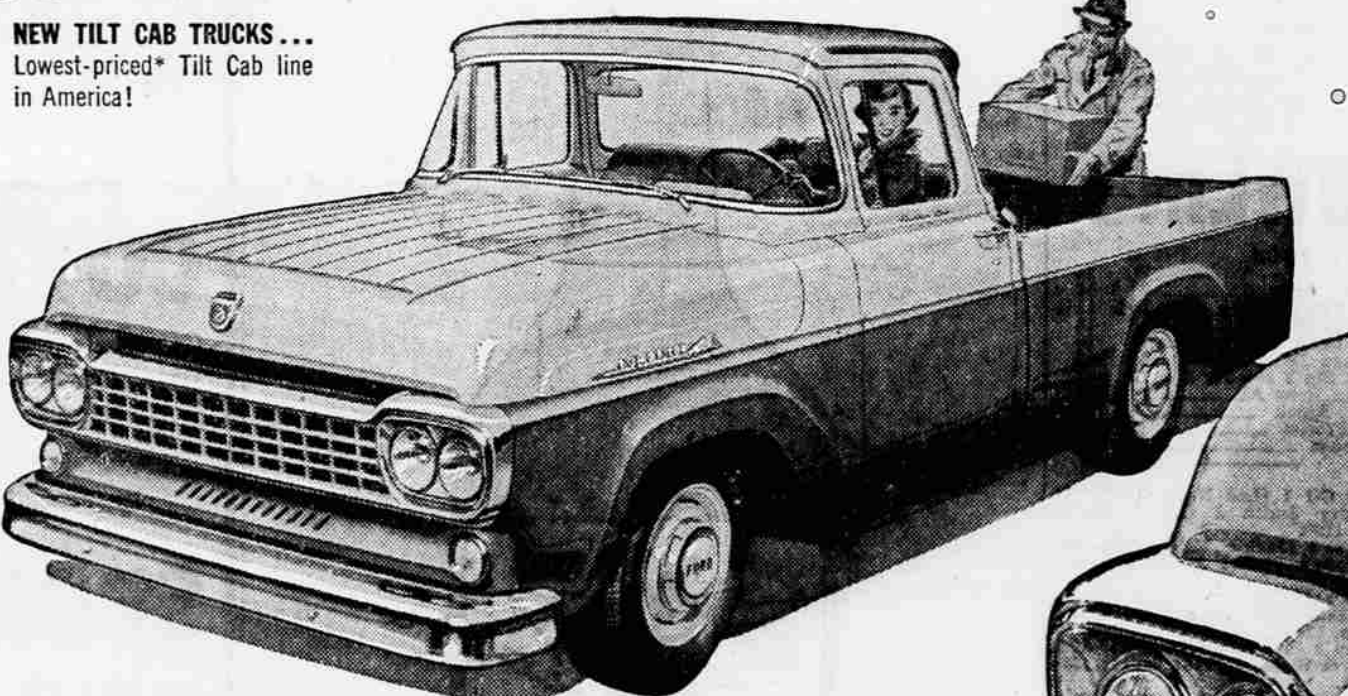
