Unidentified Voice
Jams Idaho Radios

Boise — An unidentified voice broadcast jammed the Idaho State Police radio system Thursday for three periods of five minutes each.

Thomas Harper, radio operator at state police headquarters here, said the voice sounded "like Japanese."

"It came in so strong that it blanked out our transmissions," he said.

Jim Bassett, state police radio engineer, who also heard the broadcasts, said it was "unlikely that it was a 'skip' from some distant point because it hit all of our stations throughout the state at the same time."

Amman, Jordan — Archeologists of the American School of Oriental Research have discovered an ancient city of the Canaanite period—1,750 B. C.—near Hebron, it was announced Wednesday. Items uncovered at the ancient city of Ithekah include pottery, copper and glass objects and an ivory statue of a sphinx which indicated a link between this ancient Jordanian civilization and that of ancient Egypt.

Chance Observations Out of Which Comes Cures for Disease

Every so often a physician will observe something that gives him an idea out of which comes a cure for some disease. For instance, some 160 years ago an English general practitioner, named Edward Jenner, was told that they did not have to get smallpox because, early in life, they had contracted cowpox from blisters on the udders of their cows. Jenner pondered on this, and finally inoculated his children with material from the cowpox pustules. Then he exposed the children to smallpox, and they did not get it. Because of Jenner's following up of his hunch, soon millions of persons throughout the world were being saved from suffering and death.

Similarly, years ago, a physician noted a fact that had apparently been known from ancient times, namely, that persons with a form of insanity called paresis, often regained their reason when they had an attack of malaria. He started giving such patients malaria, and the method worked so well that it was used until penicillin came along to help the persons get well in an easier and safer way.

Normal Blood Pressure

Many people ask, "What is normal blood pressure?" Actually, of course, in most cases it varies with age. In young people under 40 I think the systolic pressure (at the top of the pulse wave) ought to be between 90 and 130 mm. of mercury. Some physicians, when they see a pressure of from 90 to 110 mm. think it is so low it should be treated, but I never could share this view. I have seen too many healthy persons and even athletes with a pressure around 100 mm. I used to have such a pressure when in my twenties, every summer I would walk 20 miles a day through the California Sierras and climb mountains along the way. Today, my systolic pressure is 137 mm. of mercury and I am very grateful it is that low.

In a high percentage of cases the systolic pressure in both men and women tends to go up with the years. But here is an important point: In quite a few cases of both men and women, it never does go up. My father at the age of 84 still had a systolic blood pressure of about 130 mm. As I said, some of us physi-

cians think that such a pressure in an old person is too low and should be treated, but I just refuse to observe something that gives him an idea out of which comes a cure for some disease. For instance, some 160 years ago an English general practitioner, named Edward Jenner, was told that they did not have to get smallpox because, early in life, they had contracted cowpox from blisters on the udders of their cows.
