Cherry Nut Bavarian Is Fluffy, Rich Dessert

Cherry Nut Bavarian. Just the name makes one think of something light and fluffy, filled with crunchy nuts and bright bits of maraschino cherries. A dessert to delight family and friends from now on through the holidays.

1 tablespoon (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup sugar
2 eggs separated
1/8 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries (about 20 cherries)
1/3 cup chopped Brazil nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
Maraschino cherry juice

Soften gelatin in water. Combine milk, sugar, egg yolks and salt in top of double boiler; heat thoroughly. Cook over hot water until thickened, stirring occasionally. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add cherries, nuts and vanilla; mix well. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold in egg whites and whipped cream. Turn mixture into buttered custard cups or other molds and chill until firm. Unmold and serve with cherry juice. Makes six servings.

Sausage Stuffed Apples

Spicy pork sausage and seasonally plentiful apples are a winning team for cool weather meals. Here we stuff the juicy red apples with sausage and serve them for breakfast or as a supper dish.

Brown one pound pork sausage 10 minutes over low heat. Pour off drippings. Core six apples and pare a ring of peel from top edge. Stuff with sausage. Place in a greased baking dish and sprinkle each with one teaspoon brown sugar. Add one cup water, cover dish and bake in moderate, 350 degree, oven 25 minutes or until apples are tender.

Scrambled Eggs on Cereal Makes Sunday Brunch Fare

Late Sunday breakfasts are very special for the whole family. Some members have awakened early and enjoyed a Continental breakfast (fruit juice, coffee and roll) before church, while others may have caught extra winks, but everyone will be ready for a hearty later-in-the-morning meal. Start it off with frozen strawberries, snow-topped with a dusting of confectioners' sugar. Follow with tenderly scrambled eggs served with crisp, herb-buttered small shredded wheat biscuits for a change. Complete the menu with crisply fried bacon slices, a coffee cake, and plenty of hot coffee.

5 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon sweet basil
16 junior - size shredded wheat biscuits
8 eggs
1/2 cup milk
Salt and pepper
1/4 cup chopped parsley
1/4 cup grated cheddar cheese
Melt three tablespoons butter in skillet. Stir in salt and basil. Add cereal and stir until well coated with herb-butter mixture. Continue cooking over low heat, stirring almost constantly, until cereal is toasty brown, about five minutes. Remove from pan to hot serving platter.

Melt remaining butter in skillet. Beat eggs until bubbly. Stir in milk, salt, pepper and parsley. Beat well. Pour into skillet and cook over low heat,

stirring constantly, until eggs are softly scrambled. Spoon on top of cereal. Sprinkle grated cheese over eggs immediately. Makes four servings.

Quick Vegetable-Ham Soup

This hearty soup can easily and quickly be made. Dilute two cans consommé with an equal amount of water. Add one cup cooked ham cut into thin strips, one-half cup each of cooked large dry lima, carrot rings, bits of cauliflower, and any dabs of leftover vegetables you may have on hand. Simmer 5 to 10 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Serve with crusty, butter-spread rolls.

Best Buys for Budget Watchers Poultry, Pork, Dairy Products

Smart budget watchers will start planning now for the holiday spending spree that is just ahead. One place where money can be saved is on the grocery bills. By planning ahead several days, the homemaker can prevent waste of time, steps and nervous energy as well as cut her grocery bill by as much as 15 to 20 per cent. Another "saving way" with food is to plan on serving fewer dishes but in more generous quantities. By serving plain desserts, such as fresh or cooked fruit and including plentiful health giving dairy products in your diet by serving ice cream, frozen milk desserts, puddings and custards, you'll save on both calories and cash.

Poultry will continue to be a boon to the budget as both chickens and turkeys stay among the lowest priced protein foods. And speaking of chickens... reports on eggs indicate supplies and prices are good.

Pork Products. This is the time of year when pork is plentiful. Fresh and smoked pork cuts, sausage for frying and for use in zesty meat loaves, ham for dressing up for a party and for many a good "planned over" meal. Look for special buys in canned hams and put aside for future use. Remember, though, most canned hams must be refrigerated. Other meat buys include beef, with special attention given chuck cuts and ground beef.

Dairy products, ice cream and fresh milk have already been mentioned, but don't forget to look for bargain buys in cheese, "the food of a thousand uses". Canned milk and instant dry milk crystals can help cut that milk bill way down.

Produce Department. In the produce department, as in all others, cost comparisons will help your food dollar go further. Compare the price per serving of fresh, frozen and canned fruits and vegetables before you buy.

Best buys in fresh fruits are: a wide variety of apples and pears, small grapefruit and oranges, tangy tasting seasonal cranberries and clusters of colorful grapes. Pomegranates and persimmons are available and delicious. Bananas stay about the same.

Fresh vegetables in abundance are broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, squash, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, onions, peppers, and sweet potatoes.

Tokyo — The 20-month-old daughter of an American soldier was found unhurt in Yokohama Thursday 10 hours after a Japanese woman had taken her from her home 15 miles away "to buy a toy."

Spl-3 Floyd T. McLaughlin, 29, Spokane, and his Japanese wife, Hatsuko, 29, reported their daughter, Maria, missing from their temporary quarters in the Shinsekai Hotel near Camp Zama.

Mrs. McLaughlin told police she had talked with a woman identified as Mieko Koyama who had asked to take Maria next door to buy a toy.

She became alarmed, she said, when they failed to return after a reasonable time and she notified police.

A brother of the Koyama woman notified police when she showed up at his Yokohama home with the baby.

No charges have been placed against Miss Koyama, the Army said.

McLaughlin, until recently stationed with an Army supply center in Sagami, is scheduled to return with his family Friday to the United States.

Joseph Man Named 'Father of Year'

SURGEONS REPORT

San Francisco — Duke University surgeons, who studied small skin samples in chemical solutions, say human skin will remain alive for 26 hours after a person's death. Mrs. Nicholas G. Georgiade and Kenneth L. Pickrell told the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery conference Thursday that temporary grafts of skin from a dead person could save the life of another person who suffered extensive skin loss from injuries. But they said permanent grafts would have to be made from that patient's own skin.

Washington — Army Chief of Staff Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor Wednesday declined an invitation to go hunting in Alabama with Gov. James E. (Kissin' Jim) Folsom on Nov. 11. 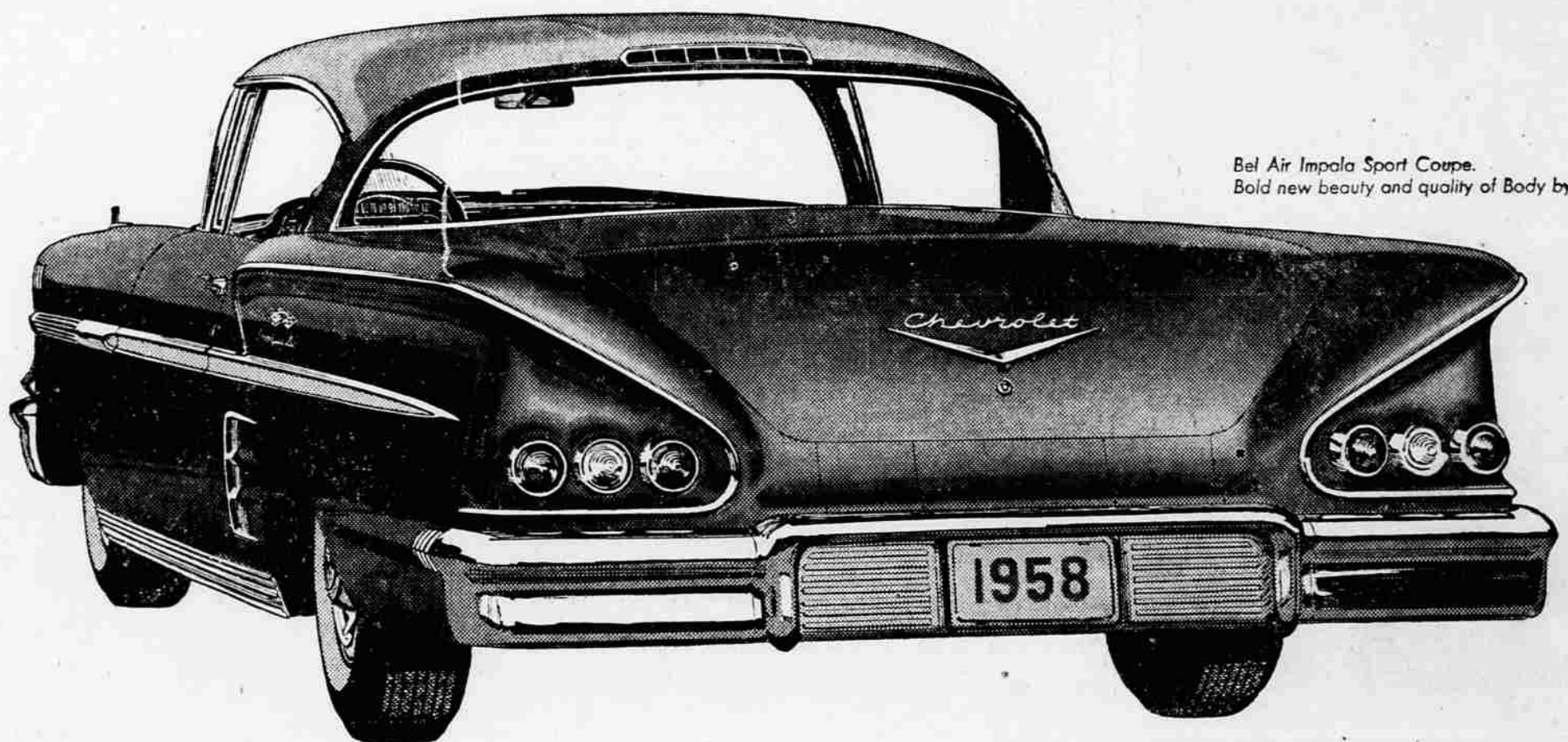
Philadelphia — Dr. Jane Leslie Kift, garden editor of the Philadelphia Inquirer and author and lecturer, died Wednesday.

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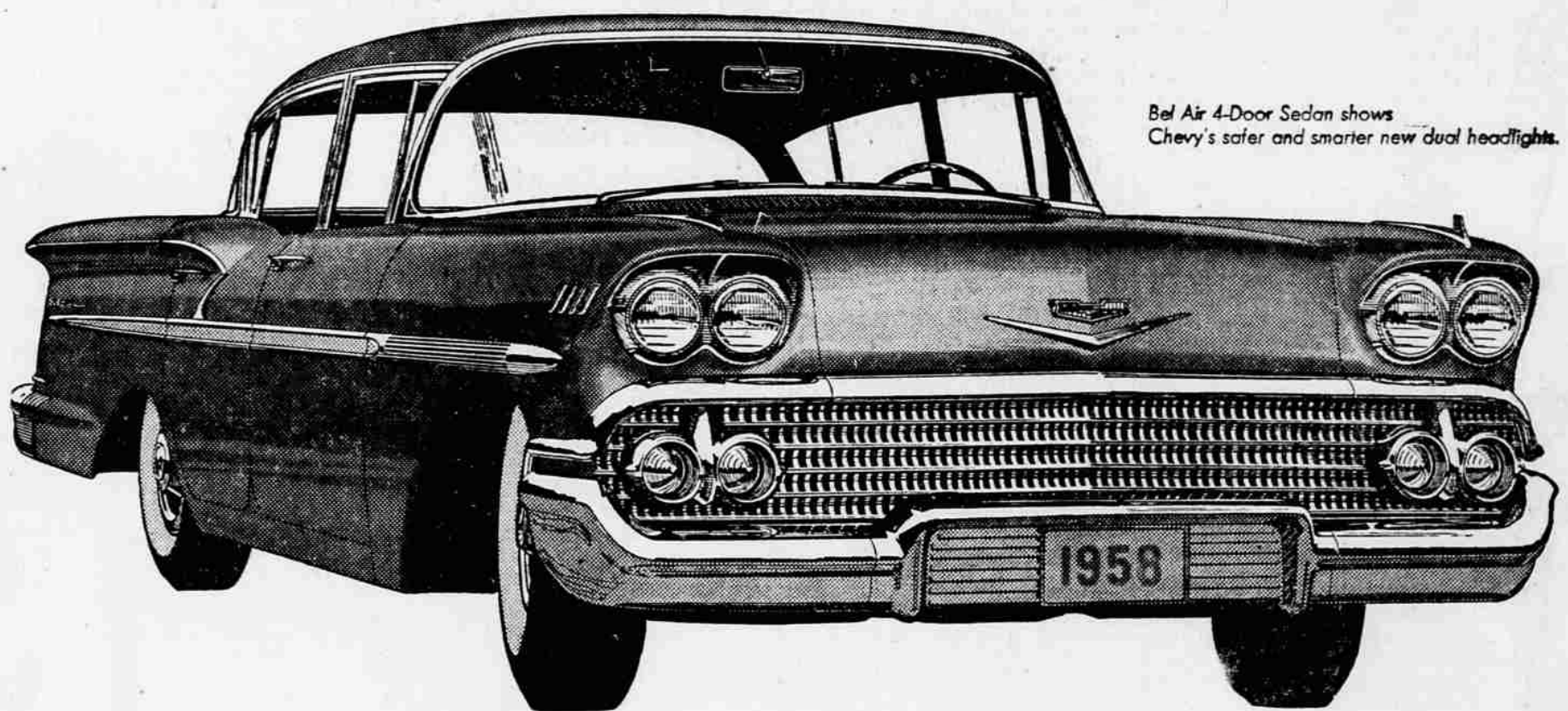
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
