Knowledge About Good Nutrition Showing Results

Washington, D.C. — Public application of nutrition knowledge is paying off in increased stature and weight and better health, according to D. W. H. Sebrell, formerly director, National Institutes of Health, U.S. Public Health service. He says children today are usually taller and heavier than parents were at the same age.

According to Yale university records, in 1893 the average Yale freshman was slightly older than 19, weighed 138 pounds and was 68 inches tall. In 1952 he was nearly a year younger, weighed 18 pounds more and was 2½ inches taller.

Dr. Sebrell pointed out that World War II drafted men were taller than those of World War I.

Good nutrition calls for a balanced diet including liberal amounts of animal products as well as cereals and fruits and vegetables. Dr. Sebrell points out the danger of eating too much carbohydrates. He says that such eating creates a tendency toward obesity and also is likely to preclude eating of other essentials.

Ashland—Cast selections for the November 22-23 production of "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial," the Southern Oregon College Players fall quarter production, have been announced by Argus L. Bowmer, director. This gripping dramatization of the trial scene from Herman Wouk's Pulitzer prize novel has long been a popular Broadway production and motion picture, according to Director Bowmer.

Several actors are included in the cast who have appeared in other SOC Players productions, while others are new to valley audiences. Rudolf Vest, Jr. who has been seen in a number of the college dramas, the Bishop's Players, and in the Ashland Shakespearean Festivals, will play the role of Lt. Barney Greenwald, defense attorney. Vest played the title role in "Aladdin" in addition to his Shakespearean Festival roles during the past season.

Two other members of the "Aladdin" cast will also be seen in this production, Leslie White, Eugene, in the role of Lt.
