Training Classes For Scout Leaders To Begin Tuesday

Training for Senior Girl Scout leaders will be held starting Tuesday, November 12, at the Girl Scout office, 500 East Main street, from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. This is for leaders of eighth and ninth grade and senior high school troops. Other sessions will be held November 18 and 25, also at the Scout House, at the same hour.

During the training sessions, which will be conducted by Miss Ruth Kibbourn, executive director, Mrs. Lois Baker, field director, and Mrs. Jerry Gastineau, area training chairman, those attending will discuss the Promise and Laws of scouting, and their meaning to teenagers; outdoor skills needed and how it fits in Senior Scouting; discussion of the five point program; national organization and world association; program planning; uniforms for leaders and Senior Scouts; and closing ceremonies.

During the third session a film strip, "Planning Program With Girls Through Troop Government" will be shown. Other things planned for these leadership sessions will be an exhibit by the leaders attending on co-ed activities for Senior Scouts; and an investigation of those new to scouting. 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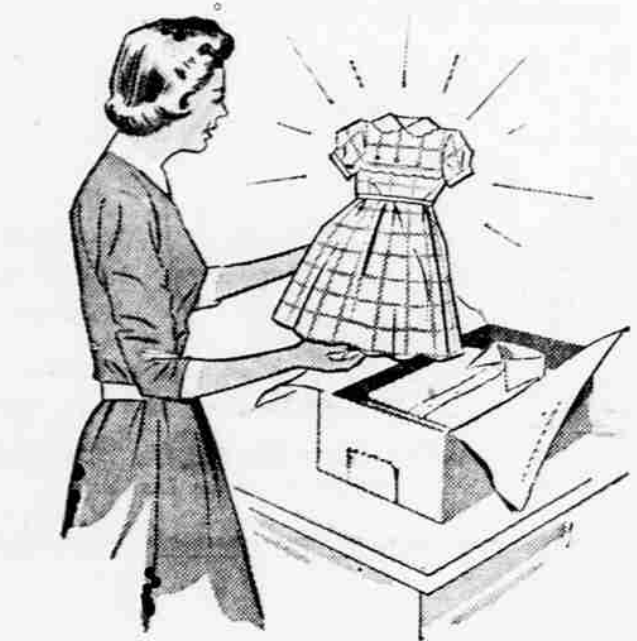
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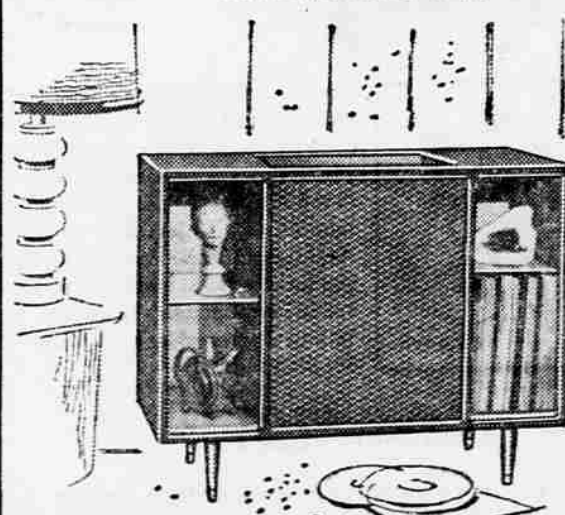
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
