Group Announces Study of Japan

"Japan"—an interdenominational foreign mission study, will be sponsored by Woman's Society of Christian Service of First Methodist church, with the first session being held Tuesday, November 12, from 9:30 to 11 a.m., in the library room of the church. Mrs. A. S. Feller, Oregon conference secretary of missionary education and service, will be the instructor. Mrs. Feller studied this summer under Dr. Hamako Hirose, president of the Hiroshima Girls School, Japan.

The study book to be used will be "Cross and Crisis in Japan" written by Charles W. Ingelhart, and copies are available at the church. The filmstrip "From the Church at Nishitrip" will be shown during the first session.

Purpose of the course is to have the students know the people in relation to the political, economic and social problems; to understand Christian missions; and to find ways of advancing the cause of Christ through cooperation with the United Church of Japan. Requirements of the course are attendance at all sessions, participation and the reading of the text. There will be no charges.

A free nursery will be maintained for pre-school children. Mrs. Feller urges all members of the society to attend and friends from other churches interested in the study are invited to come. Exhibits are being arranged of Japanese articles and art works.

Color Specialist Explains Effect of Bluing on Fabrics

Chicago — Adding bluing to the family wash actually reduces its brightness, but the clothes still appear to be whiter.

O. Harry Olson, a color specialist, said this happens because the bluing agent subtracts the light or reduces the reflecting quality of the fabric.

The over-all effect then becomes more natural, Olson said. Olson is a physicist at the Armour Research Foundation of the Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago.

Cakes Fail?

Test kitchens proved that some angel food cake failures are caused by oil or grease on bowls, beaters and pans. Margaret Spader, home service editor of the Gas Appliance Manufacturers association, recommends a thorough washing of all utensils used in making sponge type cakes. Use very hot water and generous suds for thorough cleansing. It is best to use metal, glass or crockery mixing bowls for these cakes as grease has a tendency to adhere to plastic, she states.

Washington — President Eisenhower in his annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation Saturday called on the American public to join with him Nov. 28 in prayers of thanks "for our manifold blessings."

"Let the happiness which stems from family reunions on Thanksgiving Day be tempered with compassion and inspired by an active concern for those less fortunate in our own country and in other lands," the President said in his proclamation.

Flu Epidemic Hits City Of Atlanta, Ga.

Atlanta — Health authorities and hospitals battled Saturday against a flu-pneumonia epidemic here that claimed 43 lives in a single week — more than eight times the normal death toll.

Charles Turner, statistician for the Fulton Atlanta County Health department, said 43 deaths were counted for the week ending Friday as compared with 22 deaths the week before. He said the average casualty rate this time of year for pneumonia and related ailments is about five to six per week.

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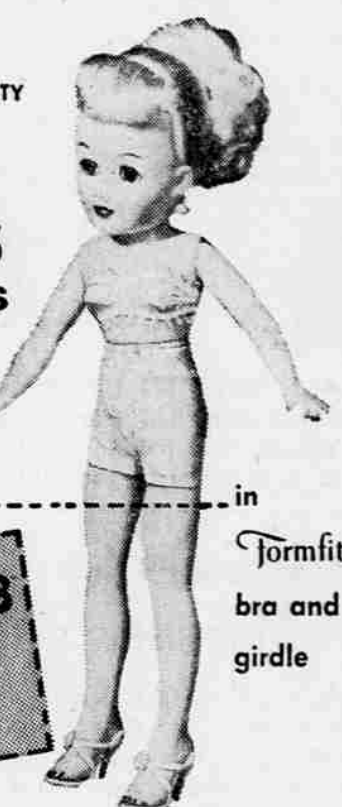
