



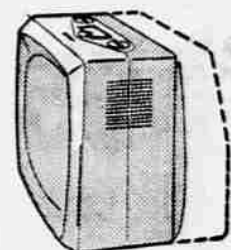

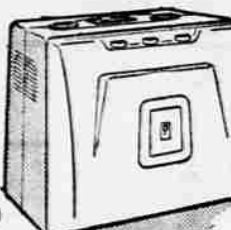


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GOLD HILL Students Visit Bakery

Police Officer Class Scheduled in Medford

The second basic police officer school will be held in Medford for five days, Nov. 11 to 15, in the basement of the Elk's Temple, North Central ave. and Fifth st., according to Medford Police Chief Charles P. Champlin.

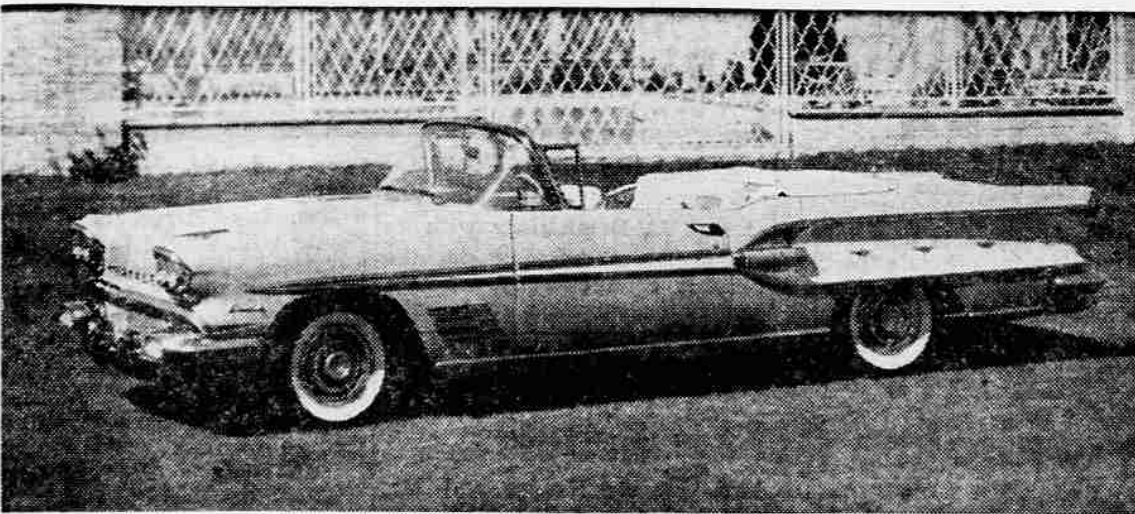
Champlin will be in charge of local arrangements for the school which will have students from southern Oregon law enforcement agencies. He said the course is for students who are now on police forces but have never taken the basic school.

Instructors will be from the Portland, Salem and Bend police departments, the Oregon State Police and the federal bureau of investigation. Two classes will be held each day, one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

Monday classes will be police career and laws of arrest, search and seizure. Tuesday classes will be mechanics of arrest and basic use of sidearms. Wednesday classes will be report writing, notebook general police duties. Thursday classes will be traffic laws, enforcement and juvenile traffic problems. Friday classes will be crime scene investigation.

Champlin said eight Medford officers would attend the school.

Garbage Dump Discussed at Gold Hill Council Meeting

Gold Hill—A petition signed by about 75 citizens of Gold Hill asking the city council to drop plans to locate a sanitary land fill garbage dump in the north-west corner of the city was presented at a council meeting last week.

Five or six petition signers were present, and Mayor Ernie Cooper called on them for suggestions concerning the issue.

Following the discussion, City Recorder Ferd Jones read a letter from Charles Clark, sanitarian of the Jackson county health department on the garbage disposal matter. In the letter, Clark said "due to the proximity of housing to the site, a sanitary land fill would be the only practical means of garbage disposal on this site. The employment of a land fill must therefore be commensurate with proper sanitary land fill operations." The letter also included specific directions regarding a sanitary land fill operation.

Report on Discussion

Jones reported on a discussion he had with T. M. Gerow, sanitarian of the state health department. Gerow pointed out that Oregon statutes prohibited the dumping of garbage within one-

fourth mile of any public road or any residence. While he favored the sanitary land fill plan, he doubted if the people were educated to the merits of the plan, especially when viewed in the light of the distance limitation stated.

The city recorder had conferred with Miss Noreen Kelly, city attorney, on the law regarding dumping garbage. He said the attorney agreed that the law as stated by Gerow was correct.

Since there is no location within the city where garbage could be dumped that would be outside the one-fourth mile limitation, and the present dump within the one-fourth mile limit, the council felt the only solution to the problem would be to have a garbage collecting agency assume responsibilities in the city.

Jones reported he had contacted a garbage disposal firm in this area and found the firm interested in taking over garbage collecting. This method was discussed at length by the council and residents attending the council session. Those present appeared favorable to the collection plan.

ed that the council take whatever steps necessary to take the city out of the garbage collecting business, turn it over to a private agency, clean up the present dump, and that this be done as soon as possible.

Councilmen agreed that whatever agency undertook the garbage collecting would also collect from Gold Hill residents whatever fees would be necessary.

The farm leader said he favored

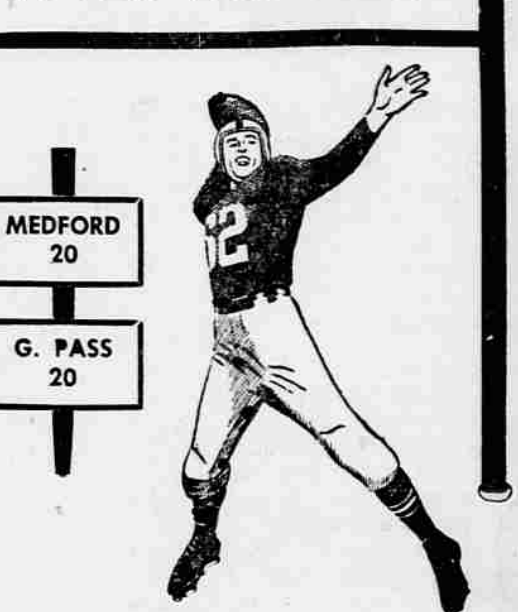

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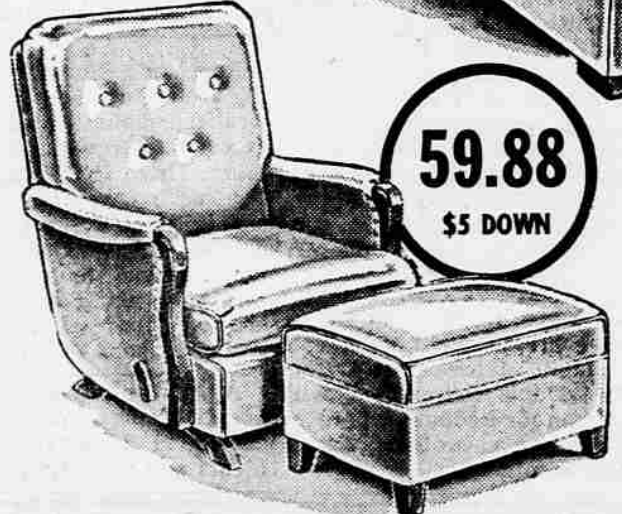
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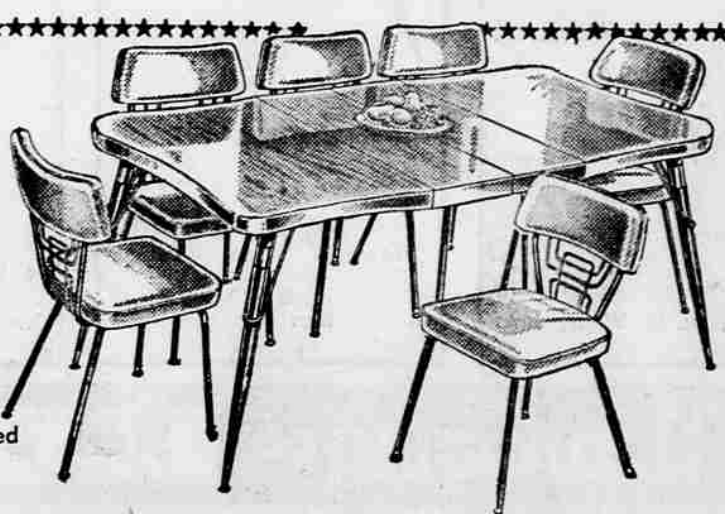
