

Ordinance Regulating Firearms Use in City Considered by Council

An ordinance regulating the use of firearms within the city will be considered a second time at the Nov. 12 city council meeting.

The ordinance passed the council 4 to 3, Thursday, but under council policy the measure must be brought up again if the ordinance is not adopted by a two-thirds majority at the first reading. The council approved an amendment to the ordinance which would permit the police chief to issue permits up to 30 days.

The ordinance provides that people living inside of the city limits who are bothered with "nuisance" type of animals can apply for use of a firearm permit. The number of days, type of weapon and location for use would be decided by the police chief.

Table Request

The council tabled a request for a change of zone from class 1A, single family, to class IIIA, limited commercial, for property at Crater Lake highway and Delta Valley rd. The property is owned by L. P. Older, who said he plans to open a boat garage building on the site. The planning commission recommended the change, but councilmen felt not enough notice had been given property owners in the area.

The council approved vacation of a projected alley near the Sears and Roebuck company property at 10th st. The alley is located between an existing alley and south alley and Riverside ave.

Dedication of an additional four feet on the north side of East Jackson st. was accepted by the council. The section extends from Biddle rd. to the Fruitdale addition. The property was deeded to the city by Butner and McCluskey.

Amendment Passed
An amendment to the sign ordinance to permit military service to use sidewalks in front of recruiting offices for display of signs was passed. The amendment provides that signs should not block passage on the sidewalk.

The council also renewed a street lighting contract with California-Oregon Power company on a year-to-year basis. A former 18-year contract expired last month. Under the contract, the city agreed to pay a cents per kilowatt hour with the city renting equipment and paying costs for maintenance.

An ordinance providing an assessment schedule for paving Lyman ave. was adopted. Plans and specifications for paving East Jackson st. from Biddle rd. to Genesee st., were approved.

The proposed paving would be a 32-foot street from Biddle rd. to Hawthorne ave., and 44-foot pavement from Hawthorne ave. to Genesee st. The council also approved plans and specifications for 10th st. from Central to Riverside aves.

Bus Loading Zone
City Manager Robert A. Duff said a report on bus loading zones would be available at the next council meeting. He said the committee still is studying the zones.

The council renewed several applications for liquor licenses and transferring licenses. The applications of Earl Neeling, owner of the Big Boy Super Thrift Market, was denied by the council on the recommendation of the police department.
City Attorney E. R. Bashaw was instructed to prepare several amendments to the city's bi-

cycle ordinance for consideration by the council at the next meeting. The amendments would permit bicycles on sidewalks in residential areas but prohibit bicycles in downtown areas. The council asked Bashaw to define "downtown area" when preparing the amendments.

Duff said a petition for vacation of an alley in the Consolidated addition would be on the next council meeting agenda. He also said the city has appealed the ruling of the state speed control board that Barnett rd. speeds be governed by the basic rule law. Duff said the narrow pavement and construction of the hospital were pointed out to the board in the appeal.

Power Man Predicts High Expenditures

Bonniers Ferry, Idaho — Growing requirements in the Pacific Northwest will require expenditures of nearly one million dollars a day for the next 10 years to keep ahead of the demand, Kinsey Robinson, president of Washington Water Power company said Saturday.

He said power for the future will be more likely available when it is needed if investor-owned utilities are allowed to go ahead with a "reasonable share" of northwest dam building. He said it takes from three to eight years to complete a hydro project.

Private utilities and other non-federal agencies have put on the line enough power to about equal the output of all federal dams built in the last 25 years, Robinson said.

Robinson, who also is chairman of the board of the Pacific Northwest Power company, said PNPL wants to place on the line more than a million kilowatts of new power from two dams proposed for construction on the middle Snake river. But he said license for the 234 million dollar project has been delayed more than two years by advocates of federal development who have intervened in the company's license application proceedings.

All Facts Needed, Says Sen. Kennedy

Reno, Nev. — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), has called on President Eisenhower to tell the American people "all of the harsh facts" about the U. S. lag in rocket and arms development and "not just some of them."

The 40-year-old senator told the Young Democrats Clubs of America convention Friday night, "I am certain that everyone here would join me in assuring the President that as Democrats and Americans we stand ready to face whatever harsh facts must be faced."

Kennedy said Democrats do not intend to make "political capital" out of national distress, but neither do they intend to forget their "responsibility as Americans."

MARTINEZ FIGHTS DRAW

Berlin, Germany — Jimmy Martinez of Glendale, Ariz., fought a 10-round draw with Bubi Scholz, the German middleweight champion, Friday night in a no-knockdown bout at West Berlin's Deutschlandhalle Sports Hall. Martinez weighed 160 pounds and Scholz 161.

Full-Dress Debate Given Tax Reduction

Salem — The Oregon Senate gave the amended tax reduction bill a full dress 2½ hour debate before passing it 17-13 Thursday.

Sen. Ben Musa, Democrat from The Dalles who joined Republicans in favoring a 30 per cent tax reduction, reviewed the huge increase over the years in Oregon's income tax collections, rising from \$1,679,000 in 1935 to \$68,789,000 in 1956 when the 45 per cent surtax was imposed.

Surplus Predicted

He also recalled that shortly after the 1957 Legislature adjourned, that he and some accountants from The Dalles predicted a \$50 million surplus at the end of the 1957 fiscal year.

Opposition to the amended bill was voiced by Sen. Alfred Corbett, Portland Democrat.

"This amended tax bill reminds me of a style show," he said. "There is Miss Republican wearing a low cut dress, dazzling her admirers with a 30 per cent tax cut before the exposed portions of her economy come into view."

Corbett said he did not deny that the program had much appeal.

Then he pictured Mrs. Democrat, wearing a lower gown than she wore earlier in the year and with sore feet from the weight of the surplus. He declared that Mrs. Democrat had a daughter in university, a son in a technical school and a mother in the state hospital. All she sees is a trade of a 30 per cent cut in taxes for a \$60 million tax increase.

Corbett said that the automatic increases in the cost of state government would raise the budget from the current \$277 million to \$310 million next biennium.

Sen. Lee Ohmart, Salem Republican, termed the Democratic tax reduction program "robbery today to care for tomorrow."

Emergency Funds Receive Increase

Salem — Before adjourning until 10 a.m. Monday, the house of representatives Saturday passed Senate Bill 12, increasing the state emergency board's fund by \$721,988.

Vote on the measure was 43-11. It now goes to the Governor's desk for signature.

Rep. R. E. Schedeen, Gresham Democrat and co-chairman of the ways and means committee, said the money was necessary to raise emergency board funds to \$1,500,000.

Funds were depleted by an appropriation to take care of construction costs at the intermediate penal institution here, forcing the appeal for more money.

Rep. George Annala, Hood River Democrat, voted against the measure and said he would continue to oppose more money for the emergency board until a better system of estimating the costs of the institution building was devised.

The emergency board fund is designed to meet unexpected demands for money when the Legislature is not in session.

Fire Destroys Cabin At Cave Junction Motel

Cave Junction — Damage estimated at several thousand dollars resulted from a fire early Thursday at Caves Park motel in Cave Junction.

A 24-by-24-foot cabin near the Redwood highway was destroyed when fire swept through the building about 2 a.m. Although rented by two employees of West Coast Steel company, no one was in the cabin at the time of the blaze, and all personal belongings were lost.

Thieves Break Into Vale Feed Store

Vale — Burglars broke into the Vale Grain and Feed Company during the night and made off with \$560 in checks and \$382 in cash, Police Chief Bob Ingraham reported Saturday.

He said the thieves also made out a check for \$112 on a check protector machine in the office. Meanwhile, Wallawa, Ore., officers were seeking burglars who punched a safe at the Shell Mercantile company here and made off with some \$2,300 in silver and currency.

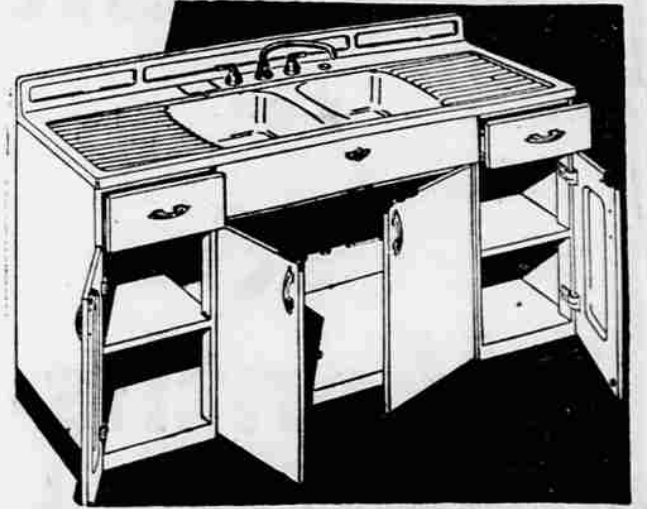
