ILLINOIS VALLEY Seek Site For Fish Pond

Cave Junction — William J. McLean has been named as chairman of a committee to find suitable sites in the valley for a warm water fish pond.

Discussion of such a pond was conducted at a recent meeting of the Illinois Valley chamber of commerce. It was pointed out the State Game Commission has offered to take over the stocking problems. Blue gill and bass would be most practical and less costly, and would require only a dam across a small stream in an accessible place, where the fish would not escape into local rivers during high water.

It is believed a warm water fishing lake with boating facilities, would attract many tourists to this area.

Another possibility for fish ponds here is indicated by the Oregon Game Commission, who has asked the Chamber for suggestions on winter steelhead rearing ponds.

Nuclear Power Seen In Conventional Use

Denver — Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton predicted today nuclear power will compete with conventionally produced power throughout the nation within two decades "if present trends continue."

Seaton told how new scientific findings may improve water resources and aid other fields of conservation. He spoke before a convention of 1,000 delegates to the American Association of Landgrant Colleges and Universities.

"In large measure, nuclear power will be on the line tomorrow because of the teamwork of university, college and government scientists..." he said.

He said America's increasingly large consumption of its natural resources has called on science to produce new means of conservation.

Power of Garbage Collectors Told

Washington — A police captain told Senate investigators today that garbage collectors, aided by the Teamsters Union, are powerful enough to close any department store or restaurant in Los Angeles merely by refusing to haul away refuse.

"As soon as the rubbish (sic) started to smell, I don't think you'd have many customers," Capt. James E. Hamilton testified.

He said garbage collecting firms operate in "conspiracy" with a teamsters local in California's largest city and charge monopoly prices. The private rubbish collecting business there amounts to \$20 million a year, he said.

Fong Trial Again Delayed by Illness

Portland — The second-degree murder trial of Sherry Fong for the 1954 slaying of Diane Hank, 16, again was delayed this morning after the defense told the court the defendant still suffered from a sore throat.

A doctor was to examine the defendant to see if she would be able to appear this afternoon. The trial was halted last week when Mrs. Fong was due to take the stand. She is on trial for the fourth time.

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Manslaughter Case Dismissed by Judge

South Bend, Wash. — A case involving a manslaughter charge against Clayton A. Linsley, Long Beach, Wash., was dismissed by Judge John J. Langenbach in Pacific county superior court here Monday after the jury reported they were "hopelessly" deadlocked. The seven men and five women deliberated for more than six hours.

Linsley admitted the fatal shooting of Delbert Heiser, 22, last May. He contended Heiser was prowling on his beach property, and further claimed he shot only after shouting a warning after it appeared the man was advancing on him.

Man Makes Way Out Of Blue Mountains

Walla Walla — Edward Stier, 35, Seattle, hiked out of the woods about 30 miles from here Monday after spending Sunday night lost in the Blue mountains during a snow storm.

Stier, an elk hunter, disappeared Sunday night at about eight o'clock and companions notified sheriff's officers here Monday morning. A search party was organized and ready to make a trek through the mountains when Stier showed up.

Stier told officers he slept under a windfall during the storm and started hiking out at daybreak.

Heart Seizure Blamed For Death of Trucker

The Dalles — Coroner Kenneth Libby said today a Portland truck driver, Max Hutchens, 48, whose body was found about nine miles north of Madras Monday, died of a heart seizure.

Hutchens' body was discovered near his truck off the Warm Springs Junction highway Monday morning.
