

AFL-CIO Suspends Bakery Union With 160,000 Members

Washington — The AFL-CIO today suspended the 160,000 member Bakery Workers Union for defying a clean-up order to remove bakers' President James G. Cross.

AFL-CIO President George Meany announced the suspension less than 24 hours after the bakers' Executive Board refused to reinstate Cross' leading critic, ousted Secretary-Treasurer Curtis R. Sims.

The bakers' board also defied an ultimatum from the AFL-CIO Executive Council by refusing to reinstate Cross' leading critic, ousted Secretary-Treasurer Curtis R. Sims.

Meany charged the board with "failure and refusal to comply" with the AFL-CIO directive.

The AFL-CIO high command had said the union would be automatically suspended if it failed to follow the clean-up orders. Meany's announcement confirmed the suspension.

Cross was accused of using union funds for personal gain in testimony before the Senate Rackets committee. The AFL-CIO Ethical Practices committee later found the bakery workers were dominated by corrupt influences.

Today's suspension, Meany indicated, will be followed by an Ethical Council recommendation that the union be expelled at the federation's December convention in Atlantic City unless the bakers do an about-face before then.

The charges against Cross were first raised by Sims, who later was fired from his \$22,500 a year post for bringing up the accusations in public.

Cross also was accused before the Senate committee of "extravagant" use of union money and of making collusive deals with employers.

'Tight Money' Is Blamed for State's Business Failure

Portland — The administration's "tight money" policy was blamed as a prime cause of business failure Thursday by several witnesses at a U.S. Senate hearing into Oregon's small business problems.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes was the first witness called by the Senate Small Business committee. He said the administration's tight money and high interest rate policy affected the market for lumber, Oregon's No. 1 product, and was crowding manufacturers depending on lumber and its by-products to the wall.

"The small businessman is faced with the need to borrow dollars that purchase less and less at interest rates greater and greater," the governor said. He added that small business cannot be healthy until a safe and generous loan policy is worked out.

Attacks Freight Rates Gov. Holmes also attacked discriminatory east-west freight rates and conflict among policies of federal government departments as causes of Oregon's depressed economy. He said that an increase in rural electrical interest loan rates would mean a decrease in the use of electricity, and added:

"The pity of the failure to do all we can to encourage and assist small business is that we are wasting resources."

Mayor Terry D. Schunk of Portland said that Portlanders were concerned with problems facing their city and state. He said many industrialists had told him they would locate factories in Portland if Oregon were able to promise firm power.

Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.) of Baker said small businessmen in his district had been strangled by tight money and high interest rates.

The two committeemen sitting in at the hearing were Sens. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) and Edward J. Thye (R-Minn.).

New York Police Question Gangsters

Alapachin, N.Y. — State police flushed notorious gangster Vito Genovese and more than 60 other "hoods and racketeers" from all over the country from a mountain-top barbecue here Thursday, set a road-block against their escape and questioned them throughout the night.

State Police Sgt. Edgar Crosswell said they were "a good cross-section of the nation's hoodlums." They told police, who hauled them out of some 25 new black limousines, that they'd been calling on a sick friend—Joseph Barbera, head of an Endicott, N.Y., beverage distributing firm, who has beat four indictments for murder.

Federal tax agents also took part in the questioning. Police said none of the men was armed but all carried large amounts of cash, up to \$10,000. In addition to Genovese, boss of a dozen rackets and said to be so high in crime that he gives order to Frank Costello.

Knock-Knees Are Common Among Young, Doctor Says

New York — A study shows that knock-knees are fairly common in the very young but that knees as they grow older are very much inclined to stop knocking together.

This conclusion was based on precise measurements of 1,000 pairs of knees ranging in age from 11 years down to infants who had just learned to toddle around without help.

Dr. A. J. M. Morley who recorded a "natural history" of knock-knees concluded that "toddlers' knock-knee can be allowed to join the growing group of developmental deviations which seldom need treatment."

He found that 26 per cent of the children he studied who were between 3 and 3½ years old had only a slight amount of knock-knees or none at all.

But 22 per cent of the children that age had definite knock-knees. Among children 7 years old or older, however, only 1 to 2 per cent had knock-knees of the same degree.

Knees get closer together up to between 3 and 3½ years and then start separating into normal spacing as the leg bones lengthen through natural growth, he found.

His study was thorough enough to dispel some of the ages - old superstitions about knock-knees. For one thing, he

found no relationship between knock-knees and flat feet. As a matter of fact, the feet of infants always look as though they were flat due to normal "fat pads."

No Link To Walking
Nor did he find any relationship between knock-knees and the age when the babe began walking, nor with how long the babe fed at the breast nor with whether the child's diet had been supplemented with vitamins during the first 18 months of life.

But there was an indicated relationship between knock-knees and weight, since the mean weights of children with the condition was greater than the mean weights of comparable

children without it. He concluded that knock-knees in children under seven "can probably be safely ignored unless it is excessive or unless an underlying cause is present," such as rickets or abnormalities in bone development.

Morley is attached to the famous Institute of Orthopedics and the Royal National Orthopedic Hospital of London. He reported to the technical journal of the British Medical association.
