New York — This week in Manhattan:

The Paris sack and the feed sack came together in a rare type of fashion show at a local hotel. High style designers turned their skills to "farmer" fabrics as a feature of the fifth annual national cotton bag sewing contest. Number one silhouette was the chemise, or sack, in a variety of paisley and floral prints. Ten thousand women entered the contest, co-sponsored by the National Cotton council and the Necchi Sewing Machine Company.

The three finalists, each of whom won a week in Manhattan and a new sewing machine, were Mrs. Fred Sowers, Winston-Salem, N.C., Mrs. Harold Vestal, Niangua, Mo., and Mrs. Carl Arnton, Columbia Heights, Minn.

All-Woman Investment House In Chicago Only One in U.S.

Chicago — Diamonds may be a girl's best friend, but one Chicago woman thinks interest bearing securities bring better returns.

Mrs. Lorraine Blair, a small bundle of feminine energy, has put her theory to work by opening what she believes is the only all-woman investment house in the nation.

Mrs. Blair has spent 30 years opening to women the doors of investment houses in Chicago's LaSalle Street canyon of business.

Twenty-two years ago she began to worry about the lack of concern financial houses showed for women who wanted to make investments. To combat this she started the non-profit Woman's Finance Forum of America.

"There were hundreds of clubs talking to women about art, science and literature," said Mrs. Blair. "But no one was telling them about the foundation for all their culture—sound finance."

Her new broker-dealer office has a staff of five women direc-

tors, eight saleswomen and a five-girl office.

The firm hopes to save women from such financial ills as worthless stock, sick bank accounts and flat wallets.

Strangely enough, said Mrs. Blair, about 30 per cent of her first clients have been men.

As for the women, Mrs. Blair said that from one to 14 they need good health; from 14 to 40, good looks; from 40 to 60, personality and charm; and after 60, cash.

She gracefully declines to tell which age category she is in.

In reply to questions on how it feels to be starting a career at an age when most people are

thinking of retirement. Mrs. Blair talks with the zeal of an evangelist.

"Women own most of the nation's wealth. They spend most of the earned income. They control the education of the children and on top of that they have more leisure time than men. It's time someone told them the financial facts of life," she said.

Balance Is Best

Mrs. Blair tells women not to be bashful about questioning their husbands on such matters as the location of safety deposit boxes, family stocks and bonds, insurance, wills and the probable size of the estate in event of death.

She also has some ideas on building and maintaining an es-

tate. As a rule of thumb she suggests 25 per cent of the income for shelter, 25 per cent for food, 15 per cent for clothing, 12½ per cent of savings and 10 per cent for upkeep.

"That leaves women 12½ per cent for everything else," she said with a smile.

She also said women should keep a reserve of at least two months income easily accessible as a "shock absorber."

After that, she suggested, a woman is ready to invest.

A balanced program of insurance, bank savings, government bonds, investment trusts, real estate and stocks, both common and preferred, is the best plan for a woman, according to Mrs. Blair.

Women shouldn't invest in common stocks unless they are prepared to lose, she said, but this adds "spice" to finance.

As a final word, Mrs. Blair said, "What I learned was from experience and if I learned other women can also."
